Oregon Gets Freight Cars

SALEM (AP) — Lumber shippers on Southern Pacific lines in Western Oregon were able to get 87 per cent of the freight cars they ordered last week.

This figure, released by Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Helzel Friday, was up from 78 per cent the preceding week. The improvement resulted from the fact that mills were closed for Labor Day, causing them to order 1,000 fewer cars than in the preceding week. At the same time, the railroad provided almost 300 fewer cars than during the week before.

Child Molester Pleads Guilty

WEED — At the September 13 trial hearing of David Leroy Doss, 28, Weed, in the Weed Judicial Court, the defendant upon the advice of his attorney, entered a plea of guilty to charges of molesting a child under the age of 18.

Judge Kenneth Stone sentenced Doss to six months in the county jail. The time was suspended and the defendant certified to the superior court for a sanity hearing.

Doss is now serving a six month term in the county jail in Yreka for like charges to which he pleaded guilty following his arrest in Mount Shasta August 26.

He was originally arrested in Weed May 31 and at the time of his arrest in Mount Shasta, was at liberty on \$250 bail, having pleaded not guilty.

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Officials Try Info Clamp

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon has come up with another device to keep control of information which bears no military security stamp.

It says, in a regulations on industrial defense now in circulation, that managers of industrial plants should be "encouraged to exercise considerable caution prior to the release of economic or technical information (unclassified)."

U.N. To Hear Arms Ideas

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Proposals for inspections to enforce disarmament from all the Big Four powers were before the U. N. disarmament subcommittee Friday following Britain's submission of a practice check plan.

Prime Minister Eden's proposal to begin inspection of East-West armies in a limited area was put before the subcommittee formally Thursday by British Minister of State Anthony Nutting.

Nutting said it was presented because Britain thought it was time to take action—even if on a limited scale—instead of just talking about disarmament, inspection and controls.

Under the British plan, representatives of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) and the Soviet Bloc troops would make up a supervisory commission. Commanders on each side would decide on a territory to be opened for checking and furnish information on what land, sea and air equipment and installation strength they had in the area. Mixed inspection teams would then tour the areas and check on the declarations.

The plan does not include inspection of nuclear weapons. It was described officially as a try-out in inspection and not even for arms control. Germany—where NATO armies face Soviet troops—appeared to be the likeliest place to try the plan out on a large scale.

Under the regulation, firms will be "encouraged" to avoid discussion of such things as contract awards, production methods and sources from which component parts are obtained.

The regulation says that "this material, when assembled, collated and evaluated could contribute materially to an accurate appraisal of the strategic intentions of the United States."

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
