COL. BOYD YADEN FIGURES IN ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT OF BAJA (LOWER) CALIFORNIA

Recent weekend guests at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Guy Hancock, 701 Pacific Terrace, were their son, Col. Boyd Yaden and his wife, Myrtle, Phoenix, Arizona, here to pick up their son, Boyd, 19, who had spent the summer with his grandparents.

Col. Yaden, AUS, retired, is Pacific Coast manager for the Washington D. C. firm of Thomas B. Bourne and Associates—and manager of the Ingenieria y Arquitectura Internacionales (International Engineers and Architects), which is associated with the worldwide Bourne organization. The Mexican firm's offices are in Mexico.

The firms are presently conducting studies leading to a master plan for economic development of Baja California. Contracts for the study were issued late last November by Governor Brailio Maldonado.

Since then, Yaden said, engineers, economists, transportation specialists and land usage experts retained by the firm have been conducting research.

Early this summer, Morrison-Knudsen Company, according to a spokesman for the National Harvester Association, offered to complete a trans-peninsular highway from Tijuana to San Jose del Cabo within two years—based on a 20 year concession for tolls and gas taxes.

Subsequent meetings with Mexi-

can representatives led to President Ruiz and his promise to arrange for the construction of the proposed inter-country travel route.

The survey is too involved and technical to be reviewed in this item—But Thomas B. Bourne and Associates, organized in 1946 by a group of engineers and architects with many years of government experience—as economic and technical consultants to the United States and other governments on an international basis—are completely qualified to fulfill the survey contract.

Col. Yaden, representing the Bourne group, has figured conspicuously in the Baja negotiations.

The Yadens and their family pet, King, a very "special" springer spaniel, drove directly to Phoenix so Boyd could get ready for the opening day of school.
