Medford District Timber Sold Over Appraised Price

The six tracts of timber totalling 19,500,000 board feet which were offered for sale by the Medford District of the Bureau of Land Management on September 15 for \$414,622.95 were sold to five purchasers for \$667,024.39, or 61 per cent over the appraised price. Jackson Creek Lumber Company of Medford submitted the highest of eight bids received for the only tract offered for sealed bid. The tract of 2,499,000 board feet located on the North Fork of Little Butte Creek was purchased for \$77,171.59. The highest price ever offered for Douglas fir timber in the Medford District was bid by Oregon Veneer Company of Medford in competition with four other concerns for a tract located on the Ragdale Butte Road in northern Jackson County. The tract of 3,844,000 board feet was nearly all Douglas fir. The record-breaking bid was \$48.50 per thousand compared with an appraised price of \$23.40. Oregon Veneer Company was also the successful bidder for a tract located on West Fork Trail Creek of 4,089,000 board feet. Four other bidders also competed for that tract. A tract of 1,498,000 board feet located on Tyner Creek, near the Oregon Caves Highway was sold to Cabax Mills of Grants Pass. They made the highest offer of the four bidders competing for that tract. Southern Oregon Plywoods, Inc., of Grants Pass was successful over

four other bidders for a tract containing 4,403,000 board feet in the West Fork Williams Creek area. The last tract offered for sale was purchased by Multnomah Plywood Corporation of Glendale. It was located on the West Fork of Cow Creek in southern Douglas County and contained 3,159,000 board feet.

NEW WHEAT FAILS TESTS

OREGON STATE COLLEGE -- A Northwest wheat, known as "New Improved Forty-Fold," has failed to pass commercial milling and baking tests, and plans are underway to recommend it for "discount" under the U.S. Department of Agriculture's price support program. The warning to Oregon farmers was issued today by the Oregon Wheat Growers League and the Oregon State College agricultural experiment station following a report that the variety made "an extremely poor showing" in tests last week at "Igleheart Brothers mill at Pendleton. Tests were made at the request of Francis Wade, Elgin farmer, who reportedly increased the seed from selections grown on one of his fields. The variety is being grown on several farms in eastern Oregon and Washington for seed distribution purposes. Failure of the variety to meet milling standards brought a recommendation from F. E. Price, O.S.C. experiment station director, that growers "reconsider any intentions to plant this wheat," which he believes will be placed on the government's list of inferior varieties.
