Happy Is The Bride On Whom The Press Shines!

The mother of the bride, caught in the whirl of activity and the endless details attending her daughter's marriage, will find one set of her problems—practically solved in "Happy The Bride The Press Shines On!" which has just been published.

A "first" in its field, it will prove equally helpful to the bride who wants to make sure that her "great day" is duly noted by the newspapers.

Emily Post contributed the foreword. Lucy Rosser, the author, practically takes the "wedding publicity novice" by the hand and guides her through the mysteries of the unknown realm of newspaperdom. She describes, step by step, the procedures for informing the press of seven happy events. Engagements, parties, showers, announcements of wedding plans, weddings, births and christenings.

The author is ever down to earth and practical. She tells what to say, how to say it, where to send it, how to send it and when to send it. She has included several sample "news releases" for each event. These require only the inserting of the names of those concerned and changes in details of the affairs described.

She also deals at some length with photographs. In the section headed "All About Pictures," she discusses proper size, finish, pose, background, methods of handling and the like.

Her checklists can be life savers in case any detail has been overlooked. She even included a glossary of newspaper terms and practical hints on how to cooperate with newspaper people in general, and society editors in particular.

Lucy Rosser evidently took unusual precautions to make sure that her job was complete and properly done. In her acknowledgments, she gives both credit and thanks to the newspaper people, especially the society and women's page editors, who reviewed the

Ideas IN Paint & Wallpaper

Modify Apparent Dimensions

To increase the apparent size of a room, you would use a light tint for walls, ceiling and woodwork—often keep the floor light, too. And you would use a dark shade if you wanted to reduce the room's apparent size. If you desired to make the room appear to be a different shape—a narrow room look wider, a square room seem to be rectangular—then you might use a combination of light and dark.

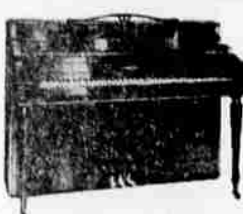
In the room sketched, one end wall has been painted a deep shade of green. This has the effect of bringing the wall forward, making the room appear shorter... and wider. Other walls have been painted a pale chartreuse. Here by the simple use of color the room's apparent dimensions have been modified and variety has been introduced.



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
