Eugene Axemen Top Klamath

WEEKEND WRAP UPS !!!
Just a few odds and ends that we have scattered here and there for today's portion of BYLINES FROM THE SIDELINES.

First of all, this coming Tuesday evening in New York, there is scheduled probably the most talked about boxing match since the block-busting days of Joe Louis back in the '40s. Heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano tangles with the ancient Archie Moore for the world's most prized possession as far as the boxing picture is concerned, the world's heavyweight title.

This fight will be a dream come true for Moore, who has been after a bout with Marciano for a long time, but Al Weill, the champ's manager has driven a straight course away from the 38-year-old (or so he claims), and preferred fights with Don Cockell and Ezzard Charles instead of the present light-heavyweight title holder.

Moore's last ditch effort came as he took his case to the people of the sports world before the demand was strong enough to draw Marciano into the same ring. It will be interesting to see what a boxer-puncher such as Moore can do with a hard-hitting and slugger "bull" like Marciano.

We have always maintained, and will continue to do so unless he makes some big changes in his fighting style, Marciano is not a great champion, or even a half-great title holder. But the question always comes back to this issue: Who is going to beat him?

Your guess is as good as ours. Maybe it will be Moore next Tuesday evening, or maybe Floyd Patterson the up and coming Negro youth from New Jersey will turn the trick. That is the \$64 question that has yet to be answered.

The whole secret is that we do not have, at the present time, an outstanding heavy-weight fighter around. Not taking anything away from the Rock, who has won 48 straight fights including 43 knockouts, but he is not the Joe Louis, Jack Dempsey, Gene Tunney or Jack Johnson type, who combines punching power with good boxing. As far as picking a winner you handle the 15 rounds, the full Our feelings are these: If the fight should go with a crown, for Rocky distance, Moore may very well come out with a crown. For Rocky to win he will have to get to the "old man" before the 11th with a knockout punch. One thing to remember is that with the punching power of these two, anything can happen.

KLAMATH FALLS MUST be the home away from home as far as Snuffy Bellevue is concerned. Snuffy is one of the several well-known handlers that took part in the recent Shasta Cascade Retriever Trials, in fact the pint-size dog won the largest prize of all, the Open-All-Age Stake, a handling dog with the largest prize of all, a black Lab, Bellevue just shaded Jim Stilwell's Ty far top honors in the advance class. The win gave him a clean sweep of the local trials. Last spring, Snuffy handled Nicole's Black Candy, another Lab into the first place of the annual spring trials held at the Geary Ranch.

If this wasn't enough to make Bellevue talk kindly of the Klamath Basin, one of his other dogs won it's bench championship in the Labor Day Dog Show held here. Katy McDonald, Snuffy's cousin, turned the trick as she handled Bellevue's Ra-Pete Solo in the bench show.

Powell Leads Eugene Over Whitebirds 13-6

EUGENE (Special) . . . Led by an unstoppable fullback, the Eugene High Axemen powered their way to a 13-6 triumph over the Klamath Union High School Pelicans in a non-conference football encounter at Civic Stadium here Friday evening.

Hard running Dave Powell, a two-year veteran at cracking opposing lines for the Eugene eleven, and a stalwart defense by the Axemen's line proved to be the downfall of the Pelicans from Klamath Falls as they fell before the tide of white and purple jerseys in Friday's grid battle.

Coach Hank Amick's Eugene club evened their season's win-loss record at 1-1, the same as the Pelicans in moving over, around and through the Klamath defense. In the opening period of play Klamath failed to capitalize on a break when they recovered a wild pass from center on an attempted punt by Eugene on the Axemen's 28 yard line. On the second play of the game for Klamath, Dave Leeling moved to the 19 yard stripe, but fumbled and Eugene recovered.

Eugene didn't move far and was forced to punt. On the second play, Dave Powell sliced off-tackle from his own 29 to the Eugene 37 for a 34-yard gain. Lee McGill, Pelican halfback scampered through the Eugene defense to the 15 on the next play, but an offside penalty nullified the gain. The quarter ended at this point with Klamath in possession of the pigskin.

On the very first play of the period quarterback Butch Kilmington shot a pass downfield to McGill, but Eugene's defender Martin Langley intercepted the ball and Klamath's drive was stopped. **INTERCEPTION** It was this interception that gave the Eugene club the key to their first score. On the fourth play of the series, quarterback Ed Bennett found Powell for a perfect pitch and Powell powered his way to the Klamath five yard line before being fumbled to the turf. Bennett tried the Klamath line for two quarter-back snaps, but the ball rested on the five and a half yard mark after an offside penalty against the home club. Bennett then pitched a third-down aerial to end Craig Bushman for the first touchdown of the game. Time on the clock showed 12:35 minutes and 45 seconds remained in the half. Mel Olson's placement for the extra point was good and Eugene carried a 7-0 lead, which eventually proved to be the winning margin.

Midway through the third quarter, Klamath made another breakthrough for themselves, but was unable to cash in on a blocked punt by tackle Keith Cooper on the Klamath 47. Eugene's line held and Kilmington was forced to kick. Mel Olson took the punt on his own 10 yard line, and fell to the ground as he tried to elude a Klamath tackler. But Olson's failure to pick up yardage on the punt was justified on the next play.

Bennett handed off to Powell, who broke like a charging bull off his own right side and scampered through several Klamath tacklers into the open for what looked like a sure touchdown for the Axemen. Brown crossed the middle stripe with Tom Ferrell in pursuit and the chase continued until the Klamath halfback knocked Powell off his feet on the Pelicans' 31 yard line after a gain of 59 yards.

CRASHED From this point, a five yard penalty against the Pelicans and six tries in a row by halfback Roger Peter at the left side of the Klamath line, (the very same play each time) gave Eugene its second touchdown as the 180-pound Axemen broke crashed two yards on the final carry for the score. Olson's try for the extra point failed and Eugene led 13-6 with 44 seconds left in third period.

On the third series of the fourth and final quarter, Klamath began to move like they did a week ago against the Grant Gen-

ERALS and marched downfield 64 yards in 13 plays for their first and only score.

On the first play of the series Kilmington threw three to the Klamath 23, but on the next play flipped a pass to Leeling who moved forward to the 43 yard line. McGill, Peppie and Ferrell took turns in moving the pigskin downfield in rapid order. Ferrell ripped off 11 yards in one jaunt and Peppie accounted for a total of 27 yards in seven tries at the Eugene line. The drive netted Klamath four straight first downs with the fourth one starting from the Eugene 12 yard line.

EXTRA POINT Peppie picked up two yards to the 10, and on an end run around his own left side, Ferrell carried over the Klamath TD. The extra point try field and Klamath trailed 6-13 with only 1:35 remaining to play.

Eugene took the kickoff and moved straight upfield with a series of seven ground plays before the final gun sounded a victory for the Eugene High Axemen.

Powell and Peppie staged a two-way show on offense, with Powell coming out with decided advantage. The big Eugene back carried the ball on eight occasions for a total of 110 yards. Peppie had 82 yards in 15 tries. Bob Harshberger led the Klamath defensive game, while Eugene's John Wilmer, John Gustafson and Don Lawrence all were thorns in the sides of Klamath's backfield men through the four quarters.

Next week the Pelicans of John McGinnis return to their home grounds and meet the Redding High School Wolves. Redding is reported to be fielding another of their strong ball clubs for the 1955 season. The game will be played Friday evening at Modoc Field.
