

Probation Given Zelda Pearson

Zelda Pearson, accused of being involved in an ill-starred "coming out" party for county jail prisoners, pleaded guilty to the charge Saturday morning and was placed on two years probation by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

The 26-year-old wife of Leon Gale Pearson and Phyllis Hill, 19, were accused of smuggling a cherry pie spiced with hack saw blades into the jail last June. The pair was arrested after County Jailor Fred Calfee found the blades in the pie.

Miss Hill was released from jail last Saturday on a motion by Deputy District Attorney P. Kenneth Puckett on grounds that the Oregon statute was not sufficiently broad to cover her actions.

The pair was originally accused of plotting a jail break for Leon Gale Pearson, who with Melvin Chiloquin has since been freed from assault charges arising out of the haircut killing of John Madrueno, 25-year-old railroad worker, last February at Chiloquin.

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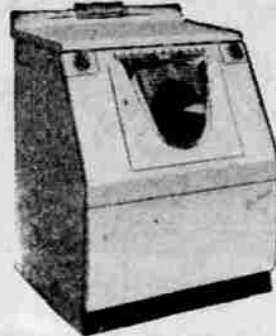


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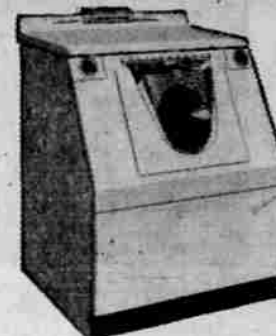
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
