Uranium Hunters Recovering From Mt. St. Helens Ordeal

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP)—A couple of perky oldsters who defied the wilderness for a week on a can of beans, a bit of jelly and a small packet of powdered milk are recovering from exhaustion and hunger in a Vancouver hospital.

Charles Allger, 85, of Tacoma, Wash., and Charles Dickens, 70, of San Diego, Calif., became lost while prospecting for uranium in the growth-tangled foothills of Mt. St. Helens. They had been given up for dead.

Three woodmen found them through the forest growth and waded waist deep in icy water. Attendants said the two men were in "pretty good" condition. When the stretcher party reached them, Allger refused at first to ride. He tried a few staggering steps, however, and gave in.

"We couldn't have made it through another night," Dickens said.

He and Allger were grimy, bearded and brush-whipped when found Saturday night by R. S. Berry of Vancouver and Al Robbins and his son Morton of Woodland.

"When I saw their red hats I knew my prayers had been answered," Dickens said.

Allger was sitting motionless on a rock. Dickens, who had injured his leg, was lying under a fir tree. Al Robbins thought they were dead. "Then," he said, "I saw one of Allger's fingers move."

Berry hurried out to seek aid. The Robbinses stayed with the two exhausted men, giving them what food they carried and tending fires to keep them warm through the night.

West Says Germany Must Be Included In Any Treaty

WASHINGTON (AP)—Top diplomatic officials said today that any European security treaty proposal which the United States supports must include Germany as a full and active member.

Agreement on the scope and other provisions of a security pact will be sought among the United States, Britain, France and West Germany in talks beginning here today.

These secret talks are aimed at working out a package deal by which Western leaders will hope to persuade the Soviet Union to agree to German unification on Western terms.

The Western talks will spread over a period of several weeks and up to the time that Secretary of State Dulles, British Foreign Secretary Harold Macmillan and French Foreign Minister Antoine Pinay meet with Russia's V. M. Molotov at Geneva Oct. 27.

Dulles returned to his desk Saturday after two weeks of vacation. He began intensive planning of Western strategy for the forthcoming Geneva foreign ministers' conference which is expected to produce hard bargaining on Germany and other European problems despite the soft talk exchanged by President Eisenhower and Soviet Premier Bulganin at the Big Four summit sessions last July.

Kerr Claims Farm Issue Not For GOP

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Kerr (D-Ore.) says he doesn't believe the Republicans can run successfully in 1956 on a "prosperity" platform so long as the nation's farmers are operating in what he calls a recession.

"Even Secretary of Agriculture Benson now recognizes there is a farm recession," Kerr said in an interview before leaving today for Oklahoma.

Benson has said he is not satisfied with farm prices and that specific recommendations for supplementing the present farm program will be submitted to Congress.

But he added yesterday: "I think we are going to see some improvement in farm prices as we get a better balance between production and consumption in this country."

He said in an NBC television interview that public opinion polls indicate "most farmers feel their income this year will be as good if not a little better than last year."

Vice President Nixon said in a speech at the National Plowing Contest in Wabash, Ind., Saturday that "there is no farm depression in the United States."

"Our agriculture economy is basically sound," he added, "but farmers are undeniably caught in a squeeze. The prices of the things they sell have gone down faster than the prices of the things they buy."

He pledged "unceasing" administration efforts to correct this. Commenting on Nixon's statements, Kerr asserted that "the Eisenhower-Benson program has reduced the farmers' percentage share of the national income to where it now is substantially below what it was in the depths of the Hoover depression."
