FPC Resumes Gas Hearing

WASHINGTON (AP)—Characterized by attorneys as one of the Federal Power Commission's most confusing cases, a hearing resumed Monday into proposals to import Canadian natural gas into the Pacific Northwest.

The hearing involves an application by Pacific Northwest Pipeline Corp. to bring in 300 million cubic feet of Canadian gas for its area, and various proposals by El Paso Natural Gas Co. to increase deliveries to its California, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico and Texas customers.

A hearing in July became more confused when California utilities refused to take delivery of Canadian gas El Paso proposed to buy from Pacific, and Pacific refused to deliver gas to El Paso from its wells in the San Juan Basin of New Mexico and Colorado as desired by the California utilities.

The commission clarified matters somewhat last week by dismissing those parts of four El Paso alternatives and a related Pacific plan involving sale or delivery proposals between the two companies.

Power Company Constructs New Line Along West Side

Before snowfall this year the California Oregon Power Company expects to have a line extension along the west side of Upper Klamath Lake as far north as Rocky Point recreational area. A mechanical hole digger started at the Geary ranch on Saturday, and will open up the holes on five miles of pole line rebuild as far as the Geary pumps.

The new extension proper will take off from the power line at the Geary pumps, following more or less along the old west side secondary highway, past Bear Wall and Aspen Lake, and back to the new highway at the Lamoreaux ranch. The line will continue northward along the new Klamath Lake highway to the Lake of the Woods junction, with one branch going on to Rocky Point and the second to the Pelican Guard Station toward Lake of the Woods. Twenty-four miles of line will be built.

Electric service will be provided on a year-round basis under the regular filed rates for three resorts, Rocky Point, Harriman Lodge and Frontier Guest ranch; also two private subdivisions which houses built and ready for service, and the U.S. Forest Service Rocky Point recreational area where there are many summer cottages.

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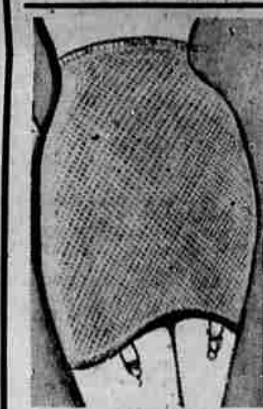
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
