### Doctor Plans Office Move

Dr. John W. Christerson, who has practiced medicine in Klamath Falls since last March, is moving his offices from the Medical Dental Building to 4035 South Sixth Street. The Boston Pops four orchestra will present a concert of semi-classical and popular music on February 15. On March 21 the Songmasters, a relatively new male quartet now on its third national tour, will be presented and the concert season will climax on April 11 with Carol Smith, contralto.

All concerts will be presented in the Pelican Theater, and admission is by membership ticket only. Tickets will be in the mail to concert association members soon, according to Mrs. Lyle Keilstrom, membership chairman.

Mrs. C. F. Adams, vice president of the group, pointed out that the concert association has consistently made available to Klamath Falls audiences performances of the same caliber as those presented in Portland, Seattle and San Francisco.

### Navy Says Ships Avoiding Ice

SEATTLE (AP)—A Navy officer said all 58 ships of the fleet that sailed north of Alaska with cargoes for the arctic radar network are escaping the dangerous threat of Arctic Ocean ice.

Lt. Cmdr. Robert F. Hopkins made the report yesterday after his arrival here on the survey ship Requisite.

All the ships now are safely west of Point Barrow northernmost part of North America, on their return trip, he said. The ice knocked holes in four ships and took out the rudder of another, but all were able to proceed, he added.

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
