Police Capture Tacoma Escapee
 TACOMA, Wash. (AP)—Harvey John Collins, 29, a convicted murderer who broke out of the Pierce County Jail with six other inmates Sunday, gave himself up last night to Sheriff Harold Rind.

The capture of Collins left only three of the seven escapees still at large. Three were taken into custody yesterday.

Collins was convicted of the Samuray sword slaying of a Tacoma motel operator last March. Police said he also admitted slaying two other persons, including Mrs. Edna Iona Hall on the Ft. Knox, Ky., military reservation in 1953.

Prison Board Seeks Policy

PORTLAND (AP)—The state Board of Control was asked by the Oregon Prison Assn. Monday for a statement of policy on transfer of prisoners to out-of-state penitentiaries.

The request was made as a result of the recent transfer of Donald "Punchy" Bailey from the state prison at Salem to Alcatraz.

Bailey, described by Warden Clarence Gladden as a trouble maker, was moved to the California institution under a new law authorizing the Board of Control to board convicts at other prisons.

Directors of the prison association, a private organization, approved a resolution stating that the association wants to be represented at any hearing on this or other such transfers and that it wants to know what the procedures for such transfers are to be.

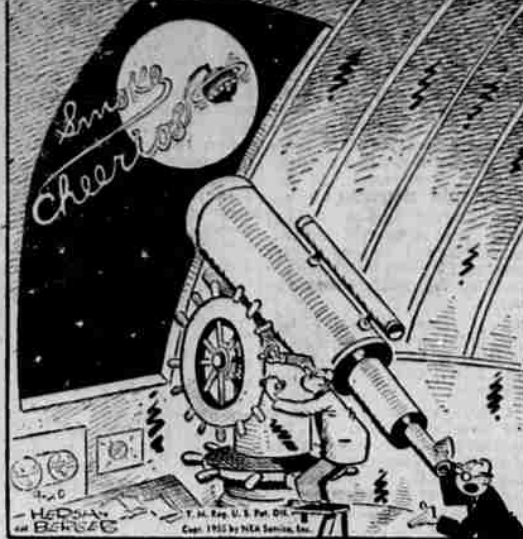
The Rev. Rene Bozarth, Gresham, president of the association, said such transfers might deprive a prisoner of usual privileges—visits by relatives and parole board reviews—and also that it might cost Oregon taxpayers an excessive amount to maintain convicts at other prisons.

US Must Keep Watch To Avoid Mera War

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The United States can avoid a major war for 200 years if it keeps its guard up, says former Navy Secretary Dan Kimball.

Kaiser Wilhelm, Hitler, Tojo and the Chinese Communists were tempted to attack the United States because of its lack of military forces, Kimball told a meeting of the American Rocket yesterday.

Kimball said the United States has assumed England's onetime role of keeping small wars from spreading.

Knowland told the Los Angeles World Affairs Council yesterday that the same basic causes for world tensions which existed before the Geneva "summit" meeting still exist.

They will confront Secretary of State Dulles and the foreign ministers when they convene at Geneva again next month," the senator said. "Russian violation of major treaties and agreements in the last 20 years certainly raises doubts as to the value of any additional agreements with the Soviet Union."

"The satellite governments have prevented these citizens from contacting our embassies or consulates and denied our consular officers access to them," Knowland charged.

Knowland claimed that "more than 200" Americans still are being illegally detained in Russia and its European nations. He said the Americans have been trying

to leave since the end of World War II.

The senator urged "a redoubling of efforts" to have the Americans released from Eastern Europe before the next meeting of the foreign ministers in Geneva.
