

Omaha CD Officials Begin Two-Day Discussion Series

OMAHA, NEB. (UP)—Some 20 key members of the National Civil Defense Advisory Council opened a two-day series of discussions today at the headquarters of the Strategic Air Command.

Included in the discussions were briefings on operation of the giant bomber command which Civil Defense Administrator Val Peterson said would be "invaluable in helping us understand the type of world we live in."

A formal briefing was scheduled for tomorrow morning, SAC officials said.

The first closed-door session

opened at noon today. No newsmen were allowed to attend the conferences, and none will be able to attend tomorrow's briefing, officials said.

Council members expected to attend included Govs. Allan Shivers of Texas, Arthur B. Langlie of Washington, and Goodwin Knight of California. Gov. Victor E. Anderson of Nebraska also was invited to attend.

Peterson said he did not believe that presence of the governors would lead to any political conferences.

Vice President Richard Nixon arrived here at noon today to address the International Association of Fire Chiefs and Nebraska Republicans, but was not expected to attend the civil defense sessions.

Peterson warned that the smiles worn by Russian leaders "had better not have any effect on our defense." The civil defense chief said "until the Soviets back up their smiles with peaceful actions, it is extremely important that we keep our guard up."

Also attending today's meetings were Okey Patteson, former West Virginia governor and now general manager of the West Virginia Turnpike Authority, and Gordon Dean, former chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission.

Two 'Birds' Aid Defense

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Two new "birds" have been added to America's defense arsenal.

The Air Force and Navy yesterday gave the public its first look at two new guided missiles used in defending against enemy aircraft. The missiles are named "Falcon" and "Sparrow." They were displayed at the American Rocket Society meeting here.

The Falcon is a ground-to-air six-foot long missile developed by Hughes Aircraft Co. for the Air Force. The Sparrow is a 12-foot long air-to-air missile developed for the Navy.

The Falcon is fired from a ground mount and guided by electronic controls, while the Sparrow is fired from a plane.

Also shown for the first time at the rocket society meeting was a rocket propelled sled capable of running on a track at a speed of 1500 miles an hour. It was built for the Air Force by North American Aviation Co. and has been used at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif., for testing ejection seats and parachutes at supersonic speed.

More County 4-H Winners Listed

Several additions and corrections to the list of Klamath County 4-H winners at the Oregon State Fair were announced today by Francis Skinner, Klamath Falls 4-H club agent.

Skinner said that a revised report showed that Kay Merritt of Altamont was omitted from the list of blue award winners in cooking judging, and Michelle Brett of Langell Valley was omitted from the list of white award winners in the style revue.

Miss Merritt, originally listed as champion in senior bread baking should have been listed as an exhibitor award, he said.

Security Suits Call For Skill

LOS ANGELES (UP)—An attorney who headed a legal study of 350 security cases acted upon by government boards says the skill of the defense attorney in such cases is more important than in a "normal" court case.

Adam Yarmolinsky, of Washington, D. C., headed the study financed by a \$65,000 grant from the Fund for the Republic, sponsored by the Ford Foundation.

"It developed during our study of 350 cases that the skill of the defense lawyer is more crucial in these security-loyalty affairs than in a normal court case," said Yarmolinsky, here to address a conference on personnel security programs in industry.

"Our study of the trials of the security cases indicated that the accused employees who had the most skilled attorney usually were able to beat the charges and get their jobs back, while employees with less skilled defenders usually were fired."

Yarmolinsky said the study pointed up the importance of the defense attorney.

"Get the best lawyer you can find, no matter what he costs," Yarmolinsky said.

Mansfield Seeks 'Runaway' Installment Credit Curbs

WASHINGTON (AP)—Discounting Republican prosperity claims, Sen. Mansfield (D-Mont.) called on the Eisenhower administration today to take immediate steps to control what he termed "runaway installment credit."

"The handwriting is on the wall," he said in an interview. "The Eisenhower administration must improve strict credit regulations as soon as possible. If new legislation is needed, Congress should provide it."

Mansfield said he would favor credit regulations requiring one-third down and 18 months to pay the balance on major consumer durable goods such as automobiles and television sets.

Such restrictions were in effect during wartime, but the authority under which they were imposed

has since expired. The government is not now directly regulating credit terms. At the end of July, consumer credit reached a record high of \$32,900,000,000.

Mansfield expressed his views as he took issue with a weekend statement by Republican National Chairman Leonard W. Hall in which Hall said:

"More Americans are working at more jobs, making more money, with more take-home pay to enjoy more good things of life than ever before in our history."

"That sounds wonderful," Mansfield said, "but Hall should have also pointed out that credit is running wild, people are buying two of everything with only a few pennies down, the stock market is rampant and the farm economy is in a desperate slump."

Politicians Set For Long Hard Presidential Contest

Editor's Note—This is the first of a series on what is taking place along the national political front where both Republicans and Democratic national headquarters already have plunged deep into the fight for control of the White House and Congress in the 1956 elections.

WASHINGTON (AP)—A full 13 months ahead of the 1956 elections, Republicans and Democrats are mobilizing for the great battle for control of the White House and Congress.

Not in recent political history has there been such an early surge of activity along the national political front. One party worker commented:

"A short president campaign in 1956? Don't you believe it. The campaign already is under way as far as we're concerned. This is going to be one of the longest campaigns we've ever had."

The business of choosing a candidate and waging a barnstorming campaign is months away—but the struggle between the parties already has the politicians maneuvering their troops in the field.

L. Richard Guylay, publicity chief for the Republican National Committee, and Sam Brightman, who occupies a similar post in the Democratic national headquarters, are men who disagree on many things. But they agree on this point: the fight between the parties is developing far faster than it did in the last presidential election.

Four years ago, the early political skirmish was pretty much confined to candidates jousting among themselves for their party's nomination—and these contests

didn't develop to any great degree until the late winter and early spring of 1952. Once the candidates were nominated—Dwight Eisenhower by the Republicans and Adlai Stevenson by the Democrats—then the parties turned their guns full force against each other.

But now both parties are starting early to establish issues, and their national headquarters are pushing programs to organize precinct workers who will get out the vote.

The Democrats are stepping up their attacks on Eisenhower and his administration, bearing down on such issues as farm prices, public- versus private power, and what the Democrats say is Republican favoritism toward big business.

The Republicans are leaning heavily on the "peace and prosperity" slogan and Eisenhower's personal popularity which even the Democrats acknowledge privately is at a high level.

The Republicans already have held a "political school" for the 42 GOP state chairmen, discussing issues and techniques for getting out the vote in the '56 election. These state chairmen are arranging similar meetings in their home states for county leaders, and these meetings will be carried on down to the precinct level.

On Sept. 20, more than 30,000 Republican women will begin running doorbells across the nation, polling voters on how they will vote and what they consider to be the big issues in the campaign. They plan to call at all the homes in one precinct of each county in the United States.

"We think we know what the major issues will be," Guylay said, "but the poll will give us a good chance to find out what the people think about the issues—and what will influence their vote."

The Democrats also plan to take a voter poll of their own, and they will match the Republicans' "political school" with a meeting of national and state leaders to be held in Chicago Oct. 1.

The man in charge of this meeting will be Niel Stabler, Michigan state chairman, who is credited with setting up a grass-roots or-
