

E. German Boss Threatens Traffic Squeeze On Berlin

BERLIN (AP)—Deep in Communist territory, West Berlin today nervously eyed the new Russian-East German treaty.

In Moscow, where the new pact was signed yesterday with the announced purpose of restoring East German sovereignty, East Germany's Communist boss Walter Ulbricht threatened a new traffic squeeze on West Berlin.

1. Pledges of mutual respect for the sovereignty of both countries, with "no interference in internal affairs."

2. East Germany was proclaimed "free to decide questions concerning its domestic and foreign policies, including relations to the (West) German Federal Republic, and also the development of relations to other countries."

3. Russia agreed to release Germany was primarily still held by the Soviet Union, the same promise made to West Germany.

4. Russian troops will continue on East German soil as long as American, British and French troops remain in West Germany.

5. The two countries "respect the obligations" both have under international agreements "concerning all of Germany." This is considered as plain acknowledgement of the four-power status of Berlin.

Storms Strike In Midwest

Skies were clear over the eastern quarter of the country today as Hurricane Ione continued north-eastward over the Atlantic, but widespread and rather violent thunderstorms struck sections of the mid-continent.

The storm activity extended through the northern and central plains eastward into Iowa and Minnesota. Showers were in prospect for most of the middle part of the country during the day.

Rainfall was heavy in some areas, with nearly 2 inches at Lemmon, S.D. and Lincoln, Neb. Showers also were reported in the northern Rockies and they changed to snow at the higher elevations. Cool weather continued in the northern Rockies as well as

in New England and the Middle Atlantic states. It was moderately cool over the northern half of the Mississippi Valley, the northern and central plains and most of the Far West. It was warm in the Gulf states, Florida, the Southern Plains and the Far Southwest.

Alert Nation Urged By Veep

OMAHA, Neb. (AP)—Prospects for peace are better than they have been at any time since World War II, but it's no occasion for relaxing vigilance, Vice President Richard Nixon said last night.

He told the International Assn. of Fire Chiefs there are three important factors leading to his conclusion. He cited the military strength of the free world, the potency of atomic weapons which confront a potential aggressor with disaster if his initial attack fails to destroy the ability of his adversary to strike back, and the fact people "desperately want peace."

But he asserted the government is not being lulled into a false sense of security by the recent conciliatory moves of Soviet leaders, adding the United States and the free world "are strong enough to meet and defeat attack by any potential aggressor."

Dewey To Leave On World Tour

NEW YORK (AP)—Former Gov. Thomas E. Dewey will leave Saturday on a plane trip around the world.

The two-time Republican presidential candidate said yesterday the four-week trip will be "entirely personal and not official in any way."

He will visit five countries for the first time — Turkey, Pakistan, India, Burma and Thailand. He also will stop in Italy, Israel, Jordan, Lebanon, Japan and Hong Kong.

Court Ponders Bridge Tolls

OLYMPIA, Wash. (AP)—The Supreme Court was faced Wednesday with the problem of deciding who is right in the argument over whether Washington legally can again impose tolls on the Columbia River bridge at Vancouver and whether it would consider its decision binding on the state of Oregon.

Arguments on the question were heard by the jurists Tuesday in the second stage of steps being taken to test the validity of a contract between the two states for building of a second bridge at Vancouver.

The contract calls for Oregon to design and build the bridge and Washington would finance and operate it. State Auditor Cliff Yelle has charged the contract, contending Oregon cannot delegate its authority to this state.

RELIGIOUS BURGLAR

Aged Sisters Claim Swindle

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP)—Attorneys are preparing briefs in a case in which blind, 97-year-old twin sisters claim they were swindled out of land. They seek \$365,000 damages.

The sisters, Mrs. Inez Garcia Ruiz and Mrs. Aniceta Garcia Barrera, testified through an interpreter yesterday in their suit against a nephew, Benigo Barrera of La Rosita.

They claimed he persuaded them in 1926 to sign a deed for 13,125 acres of Starr County land now believed to contain valuable uranium deposits. They said they thought they were signing a permit for erection of a fence on their land.

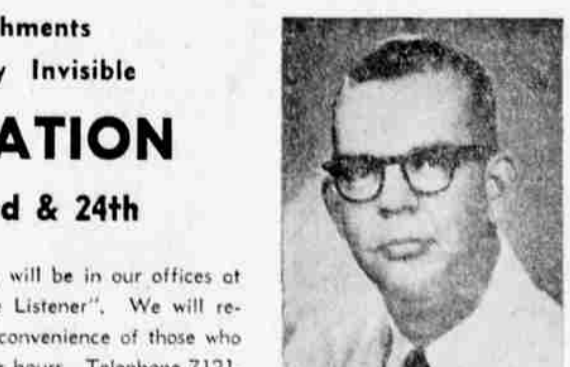
