Austrian Flags Up—VIENNA, Austria (AP)—Austrian flags flew Tuesday from public and private buildings in towns and villages of the East Zone. The Austrian Interior Ministry said the Russians kept their promise that no Soviet soldier would be left in Austria after midnight Monday night.

French Reform Morocco Rule

PARIS (AP)—The French resident general of Morocco returned Wednesday to his post with orders to put aside Sultan Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafa and set up a regency council.

Resident General Pierre Boyer de Latour de Moulins had orders from Premier Faure to execute the first steps in a reform program which the government hopes will stop bloodshed in the rich and strategic North African protectorate.

A big question remained: Will the sultan go? Faure and Pierre July, minister for Moroccan and Tunisian affairs, wrote out the instructions after the French Cabinet gave Faure's policies its unanimous endorsement in a show-down session Tuesday.

But the sultan's spokesman reiterated that Moulay Arafa is determined to stay on the throne.
