S. Salem, Corvallis Top Ballot

South Salem and Corvallis, who loomed as top contenders for the district championship, also are ranked as Oregon's best high school football teams by the state's sports writers.

They tied at 161 points in the first Associated Press poll of the season. South Salem, the 1954 co-champion, received six first-place votes to three for Corvallis, but the Spartans drew more support in runner-up balloting. Both teams are unbeaten in two games and will not meet until later in the season.

Marshfield got the most first-place votes—eight. But despite two impressive early victories the Pirates were a comparatively weak third with 110 points.

Gresham, a district 3 power which crushed Oregon City and Medford in its first two games, was fourth with 88, drawing one vote for No. 1. Pendleton looked impressive enough in two victories to gain No. 5 ranking with 74.

North Bend, also unbeaten and looking like a challenger to Marshfield and others in district 5, won two first place votes and wound up sixth with 64 points.

Milwaukie, district 3 champion last year, was No. 7 with 59 and Jefferson, defending Portland city league title, was eighth.

Bend placed ninth and Eugene, and Astoria, conqueror of Longview last weekend, tied for No. 10. Milwaukie goes to Astoria Friday night for one of the top games of the weekend. Grants Pass tests Marshfield while South Salem hosts Sweet Home and Corvallis is at home to Lebanon.

Springfield will try for an upset at North Bend. Bend, playing at home, is expected to have its hands full with Albany. Gresham hosts Parkrose.

Jefferson meets Cleveland and Franklin plays Roosevelt in attractive Portland league games.

Other Friday night contests include: Beaverton at McMinnville, Hillsboro at Oregon City, The Dalles at Prineville, Burns at La Grande, Dallas at Mt. Angel, Central Point at Redmond, Vale at Baker, Molalla at Silverton and St. Helens at Scappoose.

Washington State center John Clark was ruled out for six weeks after X-rays showed he suffered a broken leg in Saturday's 50-12 beating by USC. WSC ran through kicking and tackling practice. The squad leaves Friday for the Kansas game.

Idaho finished off an offense workout with a 45-minute scrimmage. Coach Skip Stahley said the team should be in better physical shape against Utah at Boise Saturday than it was when losing the season opener 14-7 at Washington.

Oregon skipped scrimmage for the blackboard and then drilled on defense. The Ducks planned to fly to Los Angeles Thursday for their game against USC.

At Oregon State, worry over whether tailback Joe Francis would play Saturday just about ended as his injured ankle began to respond. It seemed certain he would play although there remained some question whether he would be in good enough condition for the whole game.

Dempsey Sees Marciano Tough, Suggests More Fights For Rock

(Editors — Here's how Jack Dempsey, one of the greatest heavyweight champions in history, analyzed Rocky Marciano's knockout victory over Archie Moore Wednesday night.)

NEW YORK (UP)—Rocky Marciano proved to me that he is a mighty tough cookie, but he'll be an even better champion with a few more fights under his belt.

Marciano did a methodical job on game, old Archie Moore but I'm convinced he could have finished him sooner than the ninth round if he would have fought more to the body instead of the head.

The only way Rocky will learn how to finish a man quicker is through experience; and the only way he'll get that experience is by fighting more often.

TRIBUTE TO THE BABE
BROOKLYN (U) — "I hope nobody ever breaks Ruth's record." These were the emphatic words of the Dodgers' Duke Snider whom many baseball experts think has a good chance of breaking the mark (60 homers in one season) within the next few years.

His teammate, pitcher Carl Erskine, said: "I feel the same way, too. But I'm afraid that some day some greedy club owner will rig the park so that it will be broken."

Snider nodded his head and remarked: "Of course if anyone ever does hit more than 60 I would like it to be me. But I'd hate to see that record go. Ruth means too much to this game. His mark should stand forever."

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Marciano's inexperience showed up several times Wednesday night at Yankee Stadium. He had Moore in a bad way four or five times but kept sharp-shooting for his head. Had he gone for the body instead, I believe the fight would have ended sooner.

Moore demonstrated that he was a great boxer, much better than Rocky, and used his experience to great advantage. He made Marciano miss repeatedly and came back with as nifty a counter punch as I've seen in years.

Marciano is a tough, rugged fellow who keeps coming all the time. He keeps worrying his opponent with his swinging rights and lefts but a lot of his punches weren't landing Wednesday night. I noticed he was tiring himself out by missing so often.

I certainly would like to congratulate Rocky on a fine victory and take my hat off to Archie also, for his courage and absolute refusal to quit even when he was hurt badly.

I think Marciano will be the champion a long time. But if he takes my advice, he'll fight more often. That's the only way for a fighter to keep sharp. Regardless how great a fighter a man is, he loses his timing and coordination if he doesn't go into the ring at least once every six months.

This was really the first time I

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ever saw Rocky fight up close from ringside. The only other time I saw him work was on television against Jersey Joe Walcott two years ago. From what he showed me Wednesday night, it's going to take an awfully good man to lick him.

What impressed me particularly was the tremendous enthusiasm of the crowd at Yankee Stadium. There was a certain feeling of excitement in the air. I could feel it the minute I walked into the place. It was good to get that "old fight feeling" again.

It merely goes to prove there's nothing wrong with the fight game today that a few more bouts like the one Wednesday night wouldn't cure.

Yanks' Series Ducats Sold Out

NEW YORK (UP)—Don't waste that three-cent stamp if you haven't already ordered World Series tickets from the New York Yankees.

The Yankees announced Wednesday that all box and reserved seats for the anticipated four games at Yankee Stadium are sold out. Standing room tickets at \$4.50 and approximately 14,000 bleacher tickets will go on sale on the day of each game.

"We are oversold and are accepting no more orders," a Yankee official said. "We thank our fans and regret there are no tickets left for sale."

3 S. W. Conference Schools Admit Faults

DALLAS, Texas (U) — At least four members of the Southwest Conference appeared Thursday to be involved in athletic recruit violations, the evidence for which was supplied by a group of private eyes.

Three schools—Texas, Southern Methodist and Baylor—have admitted it; a fourth, Texas A&M, already under probation, says it wouldn't be proper to comment now, and a fifth—Rice—has denied the charges.

The other two members of the league, Texas Christian and Arkansas, haven't been mentioned in the investigation and one writer, Flem Hall, sports editor of The Fort Worth Star-Telegram, commented that it might be these two schools would decide the Cotton Bowl team when they meet since all the others would be ineligible.

When Texas A&M was placed on probation by the conference in its spring meeting for violating the recruiting rules, it was stipulated that A&M could not participate in a post-season game even if it won the conference championship. The conference champion is host team in the Cotton Bowl.

Conference secretary Howard Grubbs last week announced that the faculty committee would hold a special meeting next Sunday to discuss recruiting practices in general but would give no details. The Dallas News Wednesday said five schools were involved in recruiting violations and would be put on the carpet at the meeting. Those named were Texas A&M, Baylor, Rice, Texas and Southern Methodist.

SMU, Texas and Baylor readily admitted they were guilty of technical violations, these having to do with transportation of athletes by the coaching staffs. A&M declined comment and Rice athletic director Jess Neely said his school had broken no rules.

A&M alumni reportedly hired a private investigator to dig up evidence of rules violations on the part of other members of the conference. The conference office itself reportedly hired detectives to get evidence on the members.
