

The Klamath Basin's Migrant Ministry program for workers who arrive in this area for the annual potato harvest was given impetus at an organizational meeting of representatives of the Klamath Council of Churches at the Mt. Laki Church on September 15. Present also were Betty Whitaker, supervisor of the National Council of Churches' Migrant Ministry for Oregon, Idaho and Southwestern Nevada, Florence Fairhall, representative of the Oregon Council of Churches and her assistant Betty Blanchard. The Rev. William Anley, pastor of the Mt. Laki Community Church is chairman of the local program.

A tentative outline of services to be offered to the two migrant camps in the basin, one at Newell in Siskiyou County, the second at Malin were announced by Miss Whitaker and the Rev. Ainley.

Present plans call for a nursery and lunches for children of mothers who will be working in the fields; Red Cross home nursing and mother and baby care classes; thrift; sales of bedding and clothing; a recreational program of games and movies; family nights; Sunday school classes and informal religious Sunday night programs for adults.

Several families who will remain in the area for the duration of the harvest have already arrived in the two camps.

The Red Cross mother and baby care class, taught by Mrs. George Chin, Klamath Falls, started in the Malin camp Tuesday, September 20. The Red Cross home nursing course taught by Mrs. Carl Coulson is tentatively scheduled to start in the Newell camp on September 28.

The play school center is expected to be opening in both camps in two or three weeks.

Women in the various churches of the basin have started work on the thrift sales and sewing program. Bedding and clothing in good repair, is sold to the workers for a minimum sum.

Church youth and adult groups throughout the basin are planning projects to extend welcome and help to aid the migrant families.

Volunteers wishing to work on the program should contact their own church groups or call Mrs. Ross Ragland, migrant chairman for the Council of Church Women, phone 8397. Good clothing or bedding for the thrift sale may be left at the Methodist Church, Klamath Falls, where articles will be sorted under the supervision of Mrs. E. B. Redman and taken to the camps to be sold at nominal prices. Women who would like to help with the thrift sales may contact Mrs. Redman or Mrs. John W. Berg, sale chairman.

Equipment for the play schools may also be left at the Methodist Church or may be loaned or donated by calling the Rev. Aimey. All kinds of play and recreation equipment in good condition is needed. A used car for the transportation of the staff workers during the six weeks period is also needed.

A minimum of \$525 must be raised to cover the cost of the program, according to the Rev. Ainley. About \$125 of that amount has been received in Migrant Sunday Emphasis collections in the various churches. Persons wishing to contribute are asked to contact Walter Bingham, treasurer of the Klamath Council of Churches, 1155 California Avenue.

Several hundreds of adults and children were benefited by the migrant program last year which was also supervised by Miss Whitaker. Church women of the basin contributed hundreds of hours of work to caring for children from infants to school age, too young to work in the harvest fields.

The Newell program was carried out in the recreation building once used by the relocated Japanese at the War Relocation Center.

Attending the meeting at Mt. Laki Church Thursday night were the Rev. William Ainley, chairman, Miss Betty Whitaker, migrant min-
