

Tule Potato Labor, House Needs Told

TULELAKE — This year's housing and labor needs in the Tulelake area are expected to balance during the coming potato harvest season, his opinion was voiced by Cliff Jenkins, manager of the growers' association following a meeting September 21 with operators of private housing facilities in the Newell area.

Jenkins, who is on leave of absence from the growers' office to officiate as manager of the California state labor placement office during the harvesting season, said today that the usual facilities for housing both families and single men in the association's camp at Newell, will again be available.

Accommodations will be available for 90-95 families and 120 single men at an estimated total of 1,000-1,100 persons.

Some families are arriving in camp in anticipation of the start of the season which will begin on

a small scale the first of next week. Early operations will get under way in fields of white rose potatoes on the Bert Johnson, Charles Blumenthal and Otto Haynes ranches. Harvesting of Russets will be delayed for several days longer.

This is the first year that a labor placement office manager has not been sent into Tulelake for the season. Jenkins will operate from the growers' office.

Present for the labor camp meeting were Robert Stevens, Harold Black, E. Coe, farm labor placement representative, Sacramento; Charles Craig, manager of the Federal Prison Camp at Newell; Bob Jones, who operates some labor housing facilities here, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Withers who have private camp facilities, and Tulelake Growers Association directors, Ben Reimer, president, John Haley and Lowell Kenyon.

Faure Arrives For Talks

NEW YORK (AP) — French Foreign Minister Antoine Pinay arrived Friday to discuss "the great problems in the world today" with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and British Foreign Minister Harold MacMillan.

The ministers will meet informally next Monday, then hold formal conferences on the two days following.

Pinay said he also would participate in the work of the French delegation to the United Nations but that his visit would be "as short as possible because of pressing problems in France."

Another Frenchman, perhaps better known in this country than Pinay, arrived with him aboard the liner Ile de France—singer Maurice Chevalier.

Chevalier, now 67, plans to open a Broadway show next week, appear on television and make a movie.

Laborer Held For Grand Jury

Joe Charles Blansfield, 31-year-old laborer, who police say burglarized the Lost River Tavern at Merrill, waived preliminary hearing and was ordered held for the grand jury when arraigned late Thursday before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor. He was remanded to the county jail in lieu of \$2,000 bail.

Police Chief Dal Reed of Merrill reported the tavern was broken into on September 19, three hundred dollars in cash and a dozen bottles of wine were stolen. Blansfield was linked with the burglary after Klamath Falls arrested him on a drunkenness charge.

Abbott Lawyer To File Writ

OAKLAND (UP)—Stanley Whitney, chief defense counsel, announced today he intended to file for a writ of prohibition in California Supreme Court next week to halt trial of Burton W. Abbott, 27, charged with the kidnap-murder of Stephanie Bryan, 14, Berkeley school girl.

Whitney said he would seek to stop the trial set for Nov. 7 in Superior Court until a decision is reached on defense arguments that evidence presented to the Alameda County Grand Jury failed to connect Abbott with the slaying.

Abbott was arraigned on the Grand Jury indictment Wednesday and pleaded innocent to both kidnapping or murder of the girl. Superior Judge Charles Wade Snook rejected the defense arguments at that time that Alameda County lacked jurisdiction in the case and set the trial date.

The girl disappeared on April 26 while on her way home from school. Her body was found buried near the Abbott family's cabin at Wildwood in Trinity County on July 20.

BRITAIN-BULGARIAN PACT LONDON (AP)—Britain and Bulgaria have signed a new trade agreement. Bulgaria will buy about seven million dollars worth of British goods in the next year, including machinery, textiles, fish copper sulphate and woolen rags.

Britain will issue import licenses for about \$4,200,000 worth of Bulgarian fruit and vegetables. Bulgaria also agreed to settle British financial claims against her totaling \$1,120,000.
