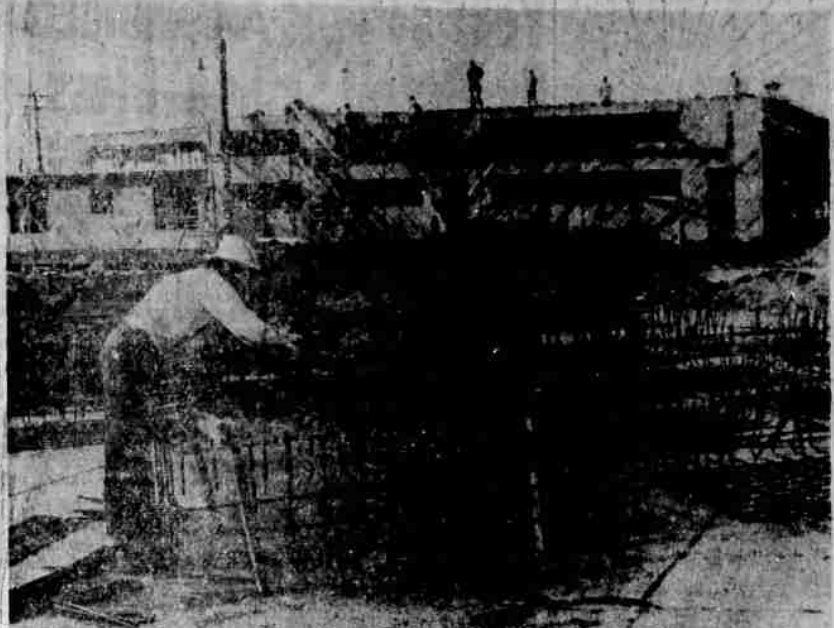
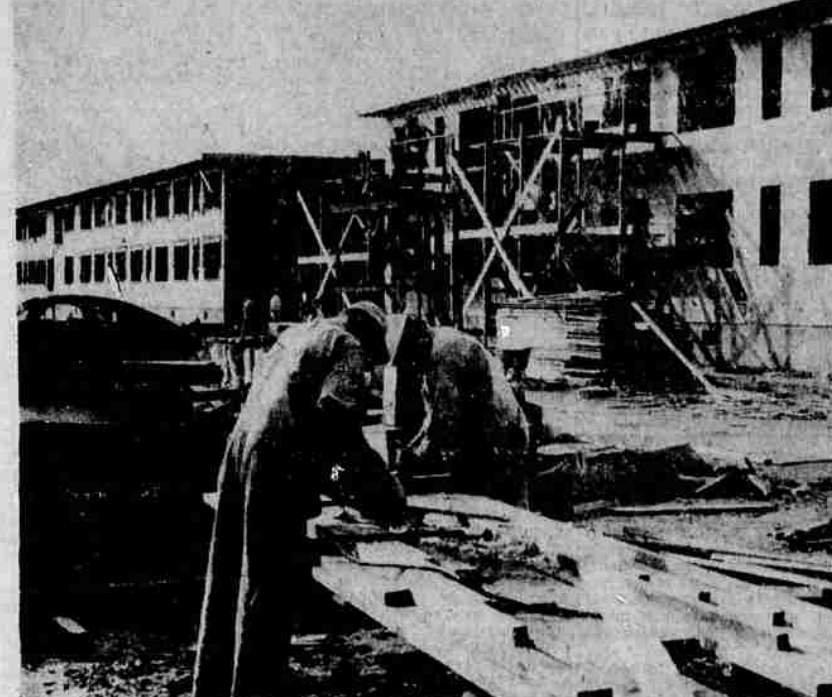
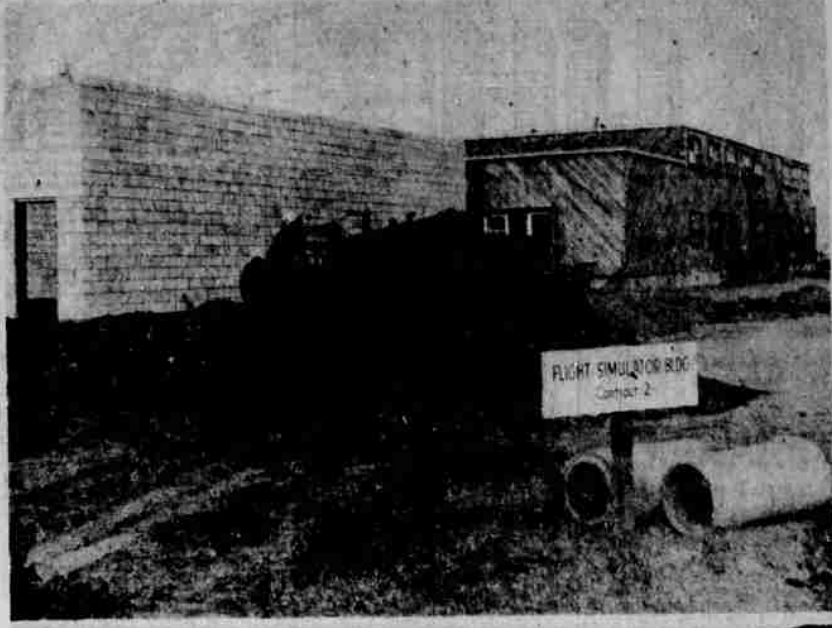

Trask, district highway engineer of Redding, and Clarence Piper, chief right-of-way engineer of the state department of highways, were present to discuss progress of freeway plans through Dunsmuir. They said about \$500,000 will be spent by the state during the next two years for the acquisition of rights-of-way but that the final determination of what properties would be affected had not been made.

Construction Companies Push Building At New Klamath Falls Jet Fighter Base

Project officials reported Saturday that construction of the Klamath Falls jet air base is on schedule.

The U.S. Air Force base is rising on the municipal airport site formerly occupied by the U.S. Navy air training station during World War II.

Air Force officials pointed out that the base will fill a strategic void in the air defenses of the West Coast which has existed between San Francisco and Portland.

The 28th Air Division, commanded by Brigadier General Mouro MacCloskey, Hamilton Air Force Base, California, will be the parent organization of the new base. The 28th is a part of the Western Air Defense Force.

The base is being built under the supervision of the U.S. Navy's 13th Naval District, Seattle. Navy Lt. D. M. Fenniman is the resident officer-in-charge of the construction. He has been at the base since work started last spring. Air Force Major Oscar D. Whitten, who will be the air installations officer when the base is completed, has also been in Klamath Falls for some time aiding Fenniman in an advisory capacity. The base will be turned over to the USAF by the Navy upon completion.

A small number of advance echelon Air Force personnel has arrived in Klamath Falls in the past few weeks to begin setting up the base facilities. Some of the buildings are scheduled to be ready for occupancy by January 1. As facilities are completed the USAF will assign more personnel to the base. The first aircraft are expected to arrive some time in the spring of 1956.

The building is being done by several construction firms. Morrison-Knudsen Co.'s Seattle branch office is building the runway rehabilitation, extension and lighting, liquid fuel storage facilities, four airman's (enlisted men) barracks and roads and storage areas (relocation of Alameda Drive and new entrance road to the air base.)

Donald M. Drake Co., Portland, is constructing the crew readiness building, cold storage building, non-commissioned officers' club, airman's club, multi-purpose recreation building and the post exchange sales store. This firm is also building the alert hangar, flight simulator training building, ready rocket storage building and three mounded concrete storage igloos.

J. G. Waits Construction Co., Salem, is building the airman's mess and has the contract for relocation and construction of an addition to the fire station.

Pinniger and Watkins, Klamath Falls, is rehabilitating the bachelor officers' quarters, the base communications building and the base operations building.

Intermountain Co., Boise, Idaho, has the job of building the steam distribution system and the utility extensions.

The 13th Naval District will accept bids until 2 p.m. October 13 in the District Public Works Office, Room 100, Building 232, U.S. Naval Station, Seattle, for the resettlement of the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation offices.

Bids will be let soon for the rehabilitation of the base maintenance hangar.

Other facilities to be constructed include:

Building and crafts supervisor 2, utilities helpers 4, apprentice electrician 2, electrician 2, electrical supervisor 1, apprentice plumbers 2, plumbing supervisor 1, heating specialists 6, refrigeration specialist 1, firefighting superintendent 1, firefighting supervisors 2, firefighters 12.

Purchasing and contracting officer 1, procurement specialist 2, procurement supervisor 1, passenger traffic specialist 1, general maintenance foreman 1, draftsman 1, sheet metal workers 2, construction helpers 4, roads and grounds specialists 2, construction equipment operators 6, mason-concrete worker 1, woodworkers 4 and painters 4.

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KF Jet Air Base Civilian Workers Job Titles Listed

Major Oscar D. Whitten, air installations officer at the Klamath Falls jet air base, today announced a proposed list of civilian job categories which will be needed at the base. Maj. Whitten stressed the fact that this list is tentative and job titles, or the number of openings, may be changed in the future.

The full complement of civilian workers at the base probably will not be needed, or hired, until some time late in 1956, when it is expected that the base will be in full operation. However, workers will be hired from time to time as they are needed. Some of the jobs have been filled now.

Any interested civilian worker must obtain a standard form number 57 from his post office. This form should be filled as completely as possible and mailed to the Civilian Personnel Officer,

Hamilton Air Force Base, California.

The following list shows the job title followed by the proposed number of workers which may be hired in that category. The jobs listed are: stenographic specialist 7, ground safety officer 1, apprentice stenographic specialist 1, personnel technician 1, accounting specialists 7, accounting technician 3, machine accountants 2, clerk 4, finance specialists 3.

Production schedule technicians 1, ground powered equipment technicians 4, machine shop supervisor 1, metal process specialist 1, apprentice jet engine mechanic 2, airframe repair technician 2, aircraft electrical repairman 1, aircraft instrument repairman 1, aircraft radio, navigation equipment repairman 1, aircraft radio maintenance technician 1, automotive mechanic 1, communications center specialists 3.
