KUHS To See Gun Expert

Trick shooting of the "Two-Gun Annie" type that used to appear at county fairs and on vaudeville will be recreated for students of Henley and Klamath Union high schools when G. E. Damon, assistant secretary, National Association of Secondary-School Principals, and life member of the National Rifle Association, appears at their assembly on October 13. They will also see what Damon calls "the craziest ammunition" in America.

The demonstration will be for a more serious purpose than entertainment alone. In addition to trick shooting, Damon's program will include a complete explanation of the National Rifle Association's hunter safety program.

For many years Damon taught high school and college classes in gun, hunting and safety. He believes that everyone who wants to shoot a gun should be taught how to shoot accurately and safely. His book, "Gun Fun With Safety," was published in 1948 as a text and reference for this purpose.

Damon is in Oregon to attend the annual fall conference of the Oregon Association of Secondary School Principals in Salem on October 10 and 11. He will present his demonstration to the conference on Tuesday morning. The association sponsors a hunter safety program as part of its activities.
