Israel To Oppose Troop Removal

JERUSALEM (AP)—Authoritative sources here say Israel in effect will reject the U.N. truce supervisor's request that she immediately pull her troops out of the El Auja (Nizana) demilitarized zone. Canadian Maj. Gen. E. L. M. Burns, head of the U.N. truce supervision organization, asked both Israel and Egypt Monday night to get their troops out of the area, along the Egyptian-Israeli border 80 miles south of Gaza.

Israel sources said their government would inform Burns that Israel will get out of the zone only if Egypt does the same and "honors its other obligations under the armistice agreement" for the area.

There was no immediate Egyptian response to Burns' appeal but the Egyptians previously had said they had no troops in the area.

TRAVEL RECORD SET

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Commerce Department said today Americans apparently are setting another record for foreign travel this year. The department's "Survey of Current Business" estimated Americans would spend about 1 1/2 billion dollars on travel in 1955. The present record is \$1,358,000,000, set last year.

Chicago Cops Try Public Relations

CHICAGO (AP)—Traffic policemen in Chicago today were urged to take the positive approach giving tickets for traffic violations and to disregard such phrases as "Where's the fire, bud?"

A police training outline on public relations advises officers to take a polite, impartial attitude—something like this:

"Good evening, sir. I stopped you because you were exceeding the speed limit. May I see your driver's license?"

The brochure also asked police to avoid nicknames and sarcasm. "Many people object to being called 'bud,' 'chum,' 'pop' or by their first names." And the brochure added, "They don't want to be called 'wise guy,' 'jerk' or 'dope.'"

Eisenhower Team To Keep Legal Machinery Running

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Eisenhower team worked today on plans for keeping the government running smoothly while the President recuperates from a heart attack.

A National Security Council meeting was scheduled for Thursday and a Cabinet session the following day, both under the gavel of Vice President Nixon.

Nixon announced yesterday these two top-level conferences would be concerned with matters "of a normal routine nature." But the question of how much presidential authority can be parceled out while Eisenhower is unable to perform his full duties was almost certain to arise.

A formal opinion on the delegation-of-authority matter was awaited from Atty. Gen. Brownell, who was due in New York after cutting short a vacation in Spain to return home and handle the problem.

Before leaving Spain by air, Brownell promised yesterday to

give the matter "urgent attention." Justice Department aides said the attorney general's formal opinion can be expected late this week.

Meanwhile, the possibility arose that Eisenhower may be able to resume some of his administrative work within a few weeks.

Dr. Paul Dudley White, the Boston heart specialist who attended the President, said last night Eisenhower "will be much better off to take up some of his duties than to worry over neglecting them while he recovers."

Nixon, Acting Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers, Chief Presidential Assistant Sherman Adams and other top administrative figures conferred at the White House yesterday for nearly three hours before announcing the upcoming Security Council and Cabinet meetings.

Their discussions dealt with ways and means of keeping the government functioning in Eisenhower's absence. It was obvious the delegation-of-authority question was considered.

An unofficial opinion on this is-

sue came from J. Howard McGrath, who served as attorney general under former President Truman.

McGrath, whose views were solicited by newsmen, said there is no precedent under which the vice president took over the reins of government while a president was still alive.

McGrath said the law is not clear on the point and he suggested that a situation could arise whereby the Supreme Court, as the recognized interpreter of the Constitution,

would be called on to say exactly how disabled a president would have to be before his vice president could legally assume direction of the government.

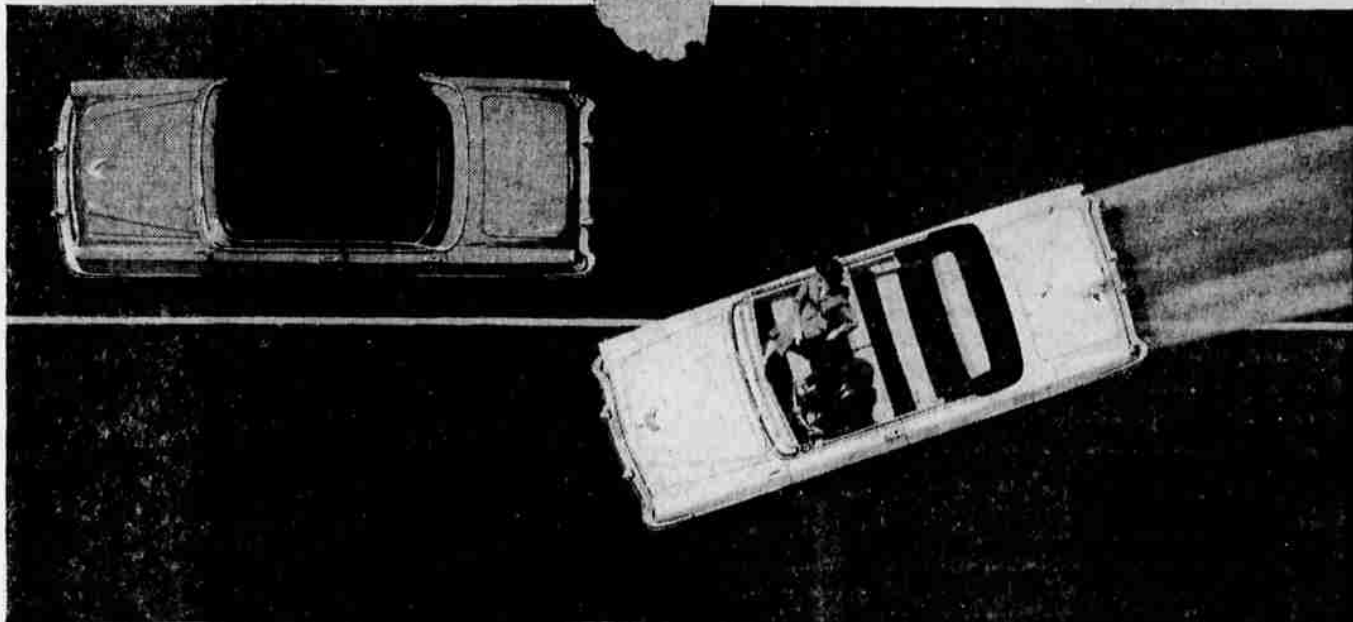
