Typhoon Louise Moves To Japan

TOKYO (AP)—Typhoon Louise, the year's most violent storm in the Pacific, boiled steadily toward Japan today as Air Force technicians worked to repair the U. S. base on Iwo Jima flattened by the storm Sunday.

Three Air Force planes took food, mail and equipment to repair the shattered buildings on Iwo Jima. A mercy plane Monday found the base nearly demolished. The 300-man Air Force and Coast Guard garrison escaped with minor injuries, the Air Force said.

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Too Slow, Too Fast Charges Levelled On Hell's Project

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Power Commission has been criticized as being too slow and too fast in the Hells Canyon controversy.

FPC Chairman Jerome K. Kuykendall soon may be called before a Senate investigating committee to explain why the commission's decision to license private power dams in the Snake River wasn't announced before Congress adjourned its last session.

And lawyers for public power groups advocating the federal Hells Canyon Dam in the Columbia River tributary criticized the commission, by implication, as being hasty.

FPC announced Aug. 4—two days after Congress adjourned—it had approved applications of the Idaho Power Co. for license to build three dams in the Hells Canyon reach of the Snake River. These projects would flood the site of the proposed federal dam.

The commission order indicated the decision had been reached July 27, and Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) demanded that Kuykendall be called before the committee which is investigating, among other things, the Eisenhower administration's electric power policies.

Bills to authorize the proposed federal dam were before committees of the Senate and House at adjournment time.

Attorneys for public power groups, asking a rehearing in the case, said in a petition filed with FPC:

"The decision is not, nor does it purport to be, grounded upon the whole record. It is predicated upon little more than fragments selected from the 19,000 pages of transcripts, 400 exhibits and numerous other documents that com-

prise the record" (compiled during a year-long hearing). Although their petition didn't say so specifically, the lawyers feel the FPC didn't take time to study the bulky record—one of the biggest in the commission's files.

FPC is expected to rule this week on the rehearing request.

The Hells Canyon case, which has been pending several years, went to the commission May 6 when FPC examiner William J. Costello issued his initial decision. The initial decision became, in effect, a recommendation after the case was appealed to the commission, which heard oral arguments July 6.

Freak Accident Downs Jet Plane

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—A high-flying target, the Air Force says, "shot down" a plane in an aviation freak yesterday.

The F4U Sabre Jet came roaring in on the 20-foot, nylon streamer at 30,000 feet. The pilot, Lt. Col. Walter E. Williams Jr., placed the target in the sights and squeezed off a burst.

One of the 50-caliber slugs ricocheted off the metal tow line that fixed the target to the towing T33 trainer. It caught the Sabre Jet in the nose. Williams Jr. force-landed at nearby Nellis Air Force Base.
