Gridder Returns To Buffs

BOULDER, Colo. (AP)—Some 28,000 fans at Folsom Field last Saturday probably didn't notice the 265-pound University of Colorado guard on the four plays and one kickoff he was in against Arizona.

Neither did his coaches or fellow players notice when Joe Connors, tired of bench-riding in the second half, walked to the dressing room, changed clothes and disappeared.

For the first time since then, the 23-year-old Pittston, Pa., second stringer showed up for practice Tuesday and told assistant Coach Ray Jenkins: "I made a mistake."

Connors' disappearance first was noted when head Coach Dal Ward called on him to re-enter the Arizona game during the third quarter.

Other Buffalo players recalled his presence during the halftime dressing room session, and said he returned to the bench at the outset of the third period. After the game, coaches found Connors' uniform in its locker but no other trace of him.

The 6-foot, 2-inch sophomore told Jenkins Tuesday he merely had returned to his campus apartment where he and his new bride have lived since last Friday. University officials did not know Connors' new address and had been unable to locate him there.

"I made a mistake Saturday," said the former Marine, who played in 1950 with William & Mary. "I was unhappy about not playing more than I did and foolishly left the field. After I got home in Boulder I realized my mistake, and found I did not want to quit the team."

"When I saw all the fuss being made in the papers I realized I was making Coach Ward look bad. So I came back and hope I can be of help to the team."

Jenkins said he told the young player that, in his view, "You've not done anything particularly drastic and the squad needs you."

To reports, Jenkins said: "We've lost players the day before a game and a week before a game, but never during a game."

Before the game ended, Thomas rushed 141 yards in 17 attempts. It was obvious that the 22-year-old Evanston, Ill., senior was no Ameche. But the 53,000 fans and several Marquette defenders could testify that seldom had they seen 219 pounds and a football move so far so fast.

NO SLOW POKE
Thomas, named Midwest Back of the Week for his show did not develop his speed suddenly. The 5 foot, 10-inch Negro youth was a relay runner in high school and in the Big 10 weight man's 100-yard dash last spring finished second by a step in just over 10.5 seconds.

Among those behind Thomas in that race was Michigan's Ron Kramer, no slowpoke himself.

Thomas is also no newcomer to Wisconsin football. For two years he languished in the shadow of Ameche and the few times he put in more than fill-in service showed a dismaying tendency to fumble the ball.

GIVES PRAISE
Badger Coach Ivy Williamson thinks that is cured now and was not surprised that Thomas made a good showing Saturday.

"He's been running well all fall," Ivy said. "He made good use of his first opportunity."

Pro Teams Overcharged For TV Games

DETROIT (UP)—Detroit Lions General Manager Nick Korbaw predicted today the National Football League "can't live without television," but he charged the NFL network telecasts had been "priced out of existence."

Korbaw said he and other club officials have been trying to find a way to replace the regular Saturday night network telecasts which were dropped this year.

"The Dumont Network started carrying our Saturday night games in 1953 on an experimental basis without much revenue. Last year, at the last minute, the sponsor canceled out and the network sold the program on a co-operative basis," he said.

"We looked for a more stable set-up this year. But now the network has gone out of business."

"The big problem now is to get a network to carry the Saturday night games. The league has tried to stage its own network show. But we would have to pay \$1.20-a-mile for cables that the networks can get for 13 to 40-cents."

"We've been priced right out of existence," he said.

The general manager of the NFL's defending western division champions said revenue from the network telecasts "amounted to about 18 2/3 per cent of the individual clubs' receipts."

"And anyone knows that if a corporation can return a profit of 10 per cent at the end of the year it is doing well," he said.

Korbaw said the Lions-Green Bay Packers Thanksgiving Day game here will be the only one carried on a national television network this fall.

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Strader, Tittle Conversational Topic After SF's Loss To Rams

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Two fine gentlemen of the gridiron, Coach Red Strader and quarterback Y. A. Tittle of the San Francisco Forty Niners, may jump from the frying pan into the fire if the Cleveland Browns lick the local club on Sunday.

Not since the disastrous first year in the National League, 1949, have the Forty Niners lost the opening game of the season.

And San Francisco professional football fans have become accustomed to watching a club that usually is in the running for the divisional crown until the final week or two — when it always loses out.

They are grumbling now—right out loud.

When the 60,000 fans filed out of Kezar Stadium last Sunday after watching the Los Angeles Rams post a 23-14 victory, the complaints were long and loud.

MISTAKE
"That (Tony) Morabito made a mistake when he let (Buck) Shaw go," said one fan. "Shaw never fielded a team like that."

And another one complained: "Why don't the Forty Niners get a quarterback who can take over for Tittle when he has a bad day?"

Tittle can be one of the best—or worst — quarterbacks in the country on any given day. Last Sunday probably was the worst in his career.

"He's still my man," says Strader. "The best baseball pitchers in the world sometimes have a day when they can't find the strike zone. Tittle just had an off day."

Strader isn't a bit pessimistic. **OPTIMISTIC**
"We'll beat Cleveland on Sunday," he says. "We can afford to lose that game to Los Angeles, but we can't afford to lose two in a row."

Strader blamed the loss on the forward wall of the Forty Niner offensive team. But even when Tittle had plenty of time to make his passes, he was in trouble. Five interceptions in one game may not be a league record—but it must be pretty close.

The sparkplug of the team, of course, is halfback Hugh McElhenny. He played his first full game of the season and, although he has trouble cutting now the way he used to, he still looked very sharp and should be much better against the Browns.

If McElhenny, the most feared ball-packer in the league, can keep the Brown defense off balance, then San Francisco may have a chance.

But if the Browns win — the faithful fans are going to be hollering already for not only Strader's scalp, but that of Tittle.

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
