

Brazil Boasts Of Frogs That Crackle, Snap, Pop

WASHINGTON (UP)—Frogs are funny things. All we hear here are croaks. But down in southeastern Brazil they have frogs that crackle like hens' grunts like pins, quack and waddle like ducks, caw like crows, and make noises like crickets.

West Fears Arms Offers

WASHINGTON (UP)—Diplomats feared today that Russia's arm and Czech offers to sell arms to Egypt are aimed at stirring up new trouble in the strife-ridden Middle East.

Diplomats said the offer thus seems to expose as two-faced the Soviet's post-Geneva policy of seeking to relax world tensions.

The United States and Britain have set out to correct the impression that the United States plans to supply weapons to Egypt to forestall the Communist offer.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and British Foreign Secretary Harold MacMillan issued a joint statement in New York that both governments want to avoid any arms race which inevitably would increase tension in that area.

The impression that the United States itself would supply weapons to Egypt started over the weekend with a report the United States had offered arms to Egypt.

Jerusalem dispatches quoting Israeli sources made it evident Israel believed the reports and that the United States had made such an offer through fears Egypt might be drawn into the Soviet orbit.

The British Foreign Office said Tuesday the Egyptian government had accepted a Soviet offer to sell arms. Egyptian Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser said in a speech Tuesday night Czechoslovakia had agreed to supply arms in return for cotton and rice, but he did not clarify whether Russia would supply arms.

There also were reports other Arab nations were willing to buy arms from the Soviet Union.

from the Smithsonian Institution. Our authority is Dr. Doris M. Cochran, an associate curator of reptiles and amphibians in the U.S. National Museum, which is connected with the institution.

Dr. Cochran has been with the museum for 36 years and has been correlating information from a recent expedition into Brazil.

The gray-haired, hazel-eyed lady—with all that experience—knows how to separate one frog from another.

"Don't undersell the frog," she said. "They can be of great help. Take the 'Bufo Marinum.' Those caught down there were transferred to Guam and other parts of the sugar countries. The 'Bufo' ate himself fat on beetles and other insects that were eating the leaves of sugar plants like mad. Saved those people hundreds of thousands of dollars."

Also, said Dr. Cochran, there are the giant toads, whose headland secretes adrenalin.

The space is too short to describe the frog that crackle like the egg-layer. But we can give you something on the frog that goes like a pig.

"This one," Dr. Cochran said, "is 'Aparashphenon.' This critter is about three inches long and is almost purple in color. Its voice, a sort of baritone, sounds like the grunt of a frustrated boar.

"It's kind of a slow grunt," said Dr. Cochran. "It sleeps in the daylight in the large leaves of bromeliads—trees of the pineapple, in the dark of night the frogs hit for the ponds to look for bugs, and while looking, grunt like pigs to keep the rest of the population awake all night."

The mating calls are something to hear. There is for instance, the chorus of what Dr. Cochran and the rest of the frog experts like to call the "tin-pan frog." These clowns, the males, gather each night for a chorus. Their idea of a chorus is to gather in a throaty "ensemble" and give off a booming metallic sound which, according to the lady museum expert, sounds something like "a bunch of blacksmiths using hammers on the anvils."

Sometimes, Dr. Cochran said, this business lasts all night, which must be pretty awful for neighbor frogs that work hard for a nap in the daytime.

And then, according to the expert, there is the "Hyla Similia"—the one which quacks like a duck and waddles like one. These amphibians swam like bees. They sometimes gather for a meeting—hundreds to the same tree.

Japan's Glamour Girl Shuns Cheesecake, Measurements

tional beauty who has no use for measurements or cheesecake. Machiko Kyo is the entrancing star of "Rashomon," "Ugetsu" "Gate of Hell"—three fine motion pictures that pushed Japan into the major leagues in "art" theaters around the world. Her fourth picture, "Yang Kwei Fei," will open here soon.

Southwest Air Gets Approval

WASHINGTON (UP)—The Civil Aeronautics Board yesterday granted Southwest Airways, Inc., permanent authorization to serve 16 cities in California and Medford, Ore.

The California cities are Los Angeles, Burbank, Oxnard-Ventura, Santa Barbara, Santa Maria, Monterey, Santa Fe, San Francisco, Oakland, Sacramento, Marysville, Santa Rosa, Chico, Redding, Eureka-Arcata and Crescent City.

The CAB denied the airline its request for permanent certification to serve San Luis Obispo, Santa Cruz-Watsonville, Ukiah, Ft. Bragg, Red Bluff, Yreka and Stockton.

The board said there was sufficient traffic to and from these points to warrant only a temporary three-year certificate. It authorized one.

The board rescinded the temporary suspension of United Air Lines authority to serve Monterey, Santa Barbara and Eureka. The board said the increase in traffic to and from these points is enough to justify United service as well as Southwest service.

It also authorized Southwest to operate a shuttle service between Sacramento and San Francisco; to serve Paso Robles, through a common airport with San Luis Obispo for three years, and to operate for three years between San Francisco-Oakland and Los Angeles-Burbank via San Jose, Monterey, Bakersfield and Palmdale-Lancaster.

It denied renewal of Southwest's authority to serve Oroville, Coalinga, Vallejo-Napa, Dunsmuir-Mount Shasta and Long Beach.

It dismissed its investigation of the possible merger of Southwest and Bonanza Airlines of Las Vegas, on grounds that there was no indication that the two airlines would agree on a merger.

The board denied proposed extensions of Southwest or Bonanza routes between Reno and Sacramento, Stockton, Oakland and San Francisco and between Las Vegas and Bakersfield on grounds that they would be economically unfeasible.
