President Eisenhower's condition continues to improve — which is wonderful. Every day that passes takes another step toward the critical period. Hopes are running high.

But—
There's always a cloud on the horizon.
The dispatches report this morning that Egypt's decision to BUY ARMS from communist Czechoslovakia has brought grave concern in Washington. The United States is described as having the makings of a first class crisis in its hands in the Middle East with the danger of a new Arab-Israeli war in the background.

I suppose things like that just HAVE to go with world leadership. It's too bad we can't turn both of them over our knee for a good spanking.

The National Safety Council reports today that heavy summer vacation travel has boosted the nation's TOTAL traffic death toll for the first eight months of this year. The figure up to September 1 was 23,476 as compared with 22,430 for the same period in 1954.

On the basis of mileage the council reported a more favorable figure. For the first seven months of 1955, the death rate was 5.4 for each 100 million miles, which is the lowest seven-month figure on record.

Uranium Ore Shipment Set

LAKEVIEW — Freight cars have been ordered by the Lakeview Mining Company owned by the Thornberg Brothers of Grand Junction, Colorado, and the first shipments of uranium ore should leave Lakeview the first of next week, Vance Thornberg announced here today.

The first shipments will go to the White King and Lucky Last locations in the state. They have core drillers at both operations.

Last week their geologist, Joseph G. O'Brien of Phoenix, Arizona, arrived and is laying out the drilling program at the two mines. Ed Johnson, superintendent of the Thornbergs' Seven-Mile mine at Moab, Utah, will arrive soon to be mine superintendent of the Lakeview Mining Company, it was announced.

Thornberg Brothers have leased office space in the Marcus Theater Building to conduct their Lakeview business operations.

Janet Lashes Vera Cruz

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The Weather Bureau announced that Hurricane Janet, with an estimated death toll of 350 to 400 already, lashed at the Mexican coast, a little north of Vera Cruz, Thursday. It said winds of 119 miles per hour blew along the coast at daybreak, with the eye of the storm not due for several more hours. The Bureau said 16 inches of rain had fallen in 12 hours but that the apparent course of the year's 10th hurricane will carry the center past major populated areas. The region north of Vera Cruz is sparsely populated.

The U. S. Navy dropped a battery operated radio on Swan Islands, off the Honduran coast, and received reports that the islands suffered no deaths or serious injuries but that some of all buildings had been destroyed.

Eisenhower Spends 'Very Good Night'

DENVER (AP) — A bedside bulletin reported Thursday that President Eisenhower had "a very good night" Wednesday night.

A report from two of the chief executive's physicians said that: "The President had a very good night. He slept almost continuously under the oxygen tent from 9 p.m. to 6:15 a.m."

This was from Maj. Gen. Howard M. Snyder, the President's personal doctor, and Col. Byron E. Pollock, chief chest specialist at Fitzsimons Army Hospital where Eisenhower has been confined since his heart attack last Saturday.

The doctors have been saying that rest and sleep are essential to repairing the chief executive's damaged heart and putting him on the road to recovery.

Thus the some nine hours of sleep Wednesday night appeared to be an encouraging sign.

There still is an inclination here to say that the President probably will cut himself loose from politics and turn down any attempts to induce him to try for a second term in the White House.

Small Boy Drowns In Canal; Irate Citizens Plan Protest

A grief-stricken mother sobbingly asked an oft-repeated question Thursday after Patrick Thomas Callahan, 3, 1261 Crescent Avenue, was drowned in the "A" Canal.

The mother, Mrs. Arthur Callahan, wanted to know how many more children will perish in the ditch before safeguards are provided.

While police, sheriff's deputies and firemen dragged the canal Wednesday afternoon, Mrs. Callahan stood weeping on the bank.

"You can't reason with a 3-year-old child," she said. "You can't warn him against a danger like this."

The body was recovered shortly after 3 p.m.—45 minutes after it was found. A mongrel dog plunged into the swift flowing water. The dog climbed out of the ditch. A few minutes later a playmate, Timmy Amuchastegui, 5, ran screaming from the canal bank. He had seen Patrick and the dog fall down the embankment.

Fire Chief Roy Rowe, one of the first officials to reach the scene, said the search was hampered by darkness.

Prison Strikers Refuse Meals
WALLA WALLA, Wash. (AP)—Thirty-seven inmates at the state penitentiary passed up their fifth successive meal last night in protest against outmoded quarters and the possibility of punishment for rioting in July and August.

The men are drinking large quantities of water, apparently to assuage the hunger pangs, and a prison physician is checking them regularly.

Warden Lawrence Delmore Jr. said when "they come to their senses, I'll talk with them again and they can eat whenever they are ready."

Copco Offers Deal On Water

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UP)—Land owners in the Upper Klamath Basin had qualified assurance to deny it. Neuberger told a crowd of 1,600 the largest so far to attend the debate.

John C. Boyle, Copco vice president and general manager, told members of the California and Oregon Klamath River commissions the assurances would be given to them and the two state engineers "as a matter of public record."

He read to the commissions a draft of a letter he said would be sent to them.

"On condition that pending opposition is withdrawn," the draft said, "Copco is willing to agree that for the term of its contract no Klamath water shall be used by Copco when it is needed or required for domestic, municipal or irrigation purposes in the Upper Klamath Basin provided that nothing shall curtail the water rights of Copco having a priority earlier than May 19, 1905, and provided that all drainage water flows be returned to the river above Keno."

Boyle, however, was adamant in his refusal to incorporate the provision in a pending contract with the bureau of reclamation which would renew the power company's control of the Link River Dam and Upper Klamath Lake.

The provision closely paralleled the provision which the two commissions had asked Copco and the bureau to insert in the contract.

"I think this will go a long way toward satisfying the objections of the commissions and the water users," said Neuberger, chairman of the Oregon commission. He said, however, he would not agree to okay the entire contract without further consultations.

Bert D. Phillips, chairman of the California commission, said he was "very pleased" with the company's action. He asked further conferences to iron out other features of the contract. He said he particularly wanted assurances the company would construct afterbay storage at the same time it builds its Copco Big Bend No. 2 plant. The contract clears the way for its construction.

Hurricane Levels Guatemala State
GUATEMALA (AP) — Dispatches received here Thursday said Hurricane Janet leveled most of Guatemala's banana plantations, leaving only three buildings standing. The reports said six persons were killed and many injured. Authorities are evacuating residents, they added.

Radio calls by the colonial government asking medical aid were heard here. All Northern British Honduras was reported damaged, with communications severed and highways closed.

Neuberger Accuses Coon In Private Utility Bill Debate

PENDLETON (AP) — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) accused Rep. Coon (R-Ore.) Wednesday night of introducing a power partnership bill that had been written by private utilities.

The accusation came in the third of 10 public debates between the two on the merits of Coon's bill for partnership between the federal government and local interests in construction of John Day Dam on the Columbia River between Oregon and Washington.

"I say flatly that private utility interests authored the bill and gave it to Rep. Coon to introduce, and I challenge the congressman to deny it," Neuberger told a crowd of 1,600 the largest so far to attend the debate.

Coon said he worked on the bill before going to Washington, and had consulted with government departments and other interested parties.

"Maybe the senator doesn't prepare legislation that way, I doubt it," Coon retorted.

KBES-TV Gets Antenna Okay
GRANTS PASS (AP) — Television station KBES, Medford, will move its transmitter to Soda Mountain, 13 miles southeast of Ashland, next spring, Ed Malone, Southern Oregon Broadcasting Co. manager, said here Thursday.

The Federal Communications Commission approved the move Wednesday and authorized the station to go to full picture power of 79.4 kilowatts. Present power is 25 kilowatts.

The shift to Soda Mountain will place the antenna 6,203 feet above sea level, compared with its present height of about 2,900 feet above sea level at its location near Gold Hill.

Shows surveys will be made this winter on the mountain in preparation for the move next spring, Malone said.

The move was opposed by KFBI Broadcasting Inc., Klamath Falls, which has held a license to build a television station since last December.

Malone said the move and power boost will greatly increase the area served, including Yreka and Dunsmuir, Calif.; Klamath Falls, Medford, Ashland, Grants Pass and surrounding areas.

Southern Oregon Broadcasting Co. owns radio station KUN here in addition to KBES.

Tommy Byrne Stops Brooklyn In 4-2 Tilt

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York Yankees shelled Bill Loe for four hits and four runs after two were out in the fourth inning Thursday and beat the Brooklyn Dodgers 4-2 behind the steady pitching of Tommy Byrne for their second straight world series victory.

Byrne, the second lefthander to face the Dodgers, limited the Dodgers to five hits.

With the Yanks two up, the series moves to Brooklyn's Ebbets Field Friday where righthander Bob Turley of the Yanks is slated to face Johnny Podres in the third game.

The Yankee scoring was limited to the one big inning as Karl Spooner came up with a one-hit relief pitching job for three innings. But that inning was enough for the crowd of 64,707 that jammed into Yankee Stadium.

The Yank made only three hits off Loe and were trailing 1-0 with two out in the fourth when they suddenly caught fire.

Brooklyn's third double play apparently had snuffed out a scoring chance when Yogi Berra dropped a single into short left. Joe Collins, Wednesday's home run hero, walked on four pitches and Elston Howard drove a hard single to left, bringing in Berra with the tying run.

Ferry Billy Martin smacked another single and Collins scored. The Dodger fielders looked rather bad on both hits. Jackie Robinson tried to cut off Junior Gilliam's throw to the plate on Howard's hit and slowed the ball enough that there was no chance to get Berra, then Gilliam failed to make a throw as Collins sailed.

Eddie Robinson, batting for Phil Rizzuto, who hit by a pitched ball and the bases were full. It was Byrne who drove in the third and fourth runs and sent Loe to the showers. It was a hard drive in center for a single that scored Howard and Martin. Don Bessent then relieved Loe and forced Cerv to ground out.

Cerv had come in after the second inning when Hank Bauer was forced to retire. Bauer had pulled a muscle sliding into second base in the first inning.

Brooklyn had scored a run in the first half of the fourth on Peeewe Reese's double and Duke Snider's single to go into the lead. The Dodgers got another in the fifth on a home run by a walk, second on Duke Snider's single and reached third while pinch-hitter Frank Keller was grounded into a double play. Gilliam brought home home with a single.

That ended the scoring as Spooner took over for Brody at the start of the fifth and checked the Yankees' batters as effectively as Loe had done in the first three innings. He yielded only one hit and fanned five in his three-inning stint. Clem Labine finished.

Each team made three double plays and the total of six established a new World Series record for two teams in a single game.

Gilliam went down swinging. Reese swung at the first pitch and raised a soft fly to Bauer in right center.

Bauer came in fast for Snider's fly to right which was held back by the wind.

The wind started to blow hard from center field toward home plate.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Yankees First
Bauer smashed a hard grounder past Robinson into left field for a single.

The count to McDougald went to 2-2 and Loe seemed disturbed by Umpire Egan's calls.

McDougald struck out and Bauer was doubled up trying to steal second on Campanella's perfect peg to Zimmer.

Noren flied to Snider.

No runs, one hit, no errors, none left.

Dodgers Second
Campanella fouled to McDougald in front of the Dodger dugout. Furillo flied.

Dodgers flied to Bauer in soot right.

Rizzuto scampered out to short left and made a back-to-the-plate catch of Robinson's high pop. The shortstop reached out for the ball just as it appeared to drop between Noren and Howard.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Yankees Second
Berra was hit on the right arm by a pitched ball.

Collins struck out, missing a sharp breaking curve.

Howard struck out on a full count Berra going on a hit and run appeared caught at second on Campanella's perfect throw but Zimmer dropped the ball for an error as Berra slid in safely. Credit Campanella with an assist on the play.

Martin became Loe's third straight strike out victim, missing a fast 1-2 pitch.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Dodgers Third
Bob Cerv went into centerfield for the Yankees. Noren switched to left and Howard to right with Bauer leaving the game. Bauer had pulled a muscle in his right leg sliding into second in the first inning.

Zimmer was called out on strikes.

Loe bounced out. Rizzuto to Collins.

Gilliam flied deep to Noren in left center.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Yankees Third
Rizzuto rapped a long single into

the leftfield corner and only fast fielding by Gilliam kept it from going for extra bases.

Byrne hit a hard grounder to Zimmer who turned it into a double play, Zimmer to Reese to Hodges.

Cerv looked at a sharp breaking curve for a third strike to become Loe's fifth straightout victim.

No runs, one hit, no errors, none left.

Dodgers Fourth
Reese rapped a double over Collins' head into the right field corner for Brooklyn's first hit.

Snider slashed a drive into the right field corner, scoring Reese but was out trying to stretch the hit into a double on a fine throw from Howard to Rizzuto.

Campanella walked on four pitches.

Furillo sent a high fly to Noren in shallow left.

Hodges flied to Noren in deep left.

One run, two hits, no errors, one left.

McDougald lined a single to right.

Hodges grabbed Noren's sizzler inside the first base line, stepped on first and threw to Reese who tagged the sliding McDougald to complete a double play. It was

Berra dropped a single over Reese's head in short left.

Collins walked on four pitches. The first was tossed by Loe.

Howard smashed a single to left, scoring Berra with the tying run as Collins stopped at second. It appeared Gilliam's throw toward the plate might have had a chance to nip Berra but Robinson, attempting to cut it off, slowed up the ball.

Martin hit a ground single past the sprawling Reese into left field scoring Collins and sending Howard to second. This time Gilliam did not try to throw the ball to the plate and held the ball with the runner half way to home.

Manager Walter Alton came out of the dugout to talk to his pitcher but allowed him to remain in the game.

Eddie Robinson batted for Rizzuto. Loe's first pitch hit Robinson on the back, filling the bases.

Jerry Coleman ran for Robinson. Byrne rifled a single past Loe's ear into centerfield, scoring Howard and Martin with the third and fourth runs as Coleman stopped at second. That was all for Loe.

Don Bessent went in to pitch for the Dodgers.

Cerv hit the first pitch on the ground to Zimmer who threw him out.

Four runs, five hits, no errors, two left.

Dodgers Fifth

Robinson walked on a full count. Zimmer lined a single to left. Robinson stopping at second.
