

Shaw Given AF Grid Post

DENVER (UPI) — Lawrence T. (Buck) Shaw, 56-year-old veteran college and professional coach on the West Coast who was fired in 1954 by the San Francisco Forty Niners because he failed to win a championship in nine years, was officially the first Air Force academy football coach today.

Shaw was named this past summer as civilian adviser to the military coaching staff at the academy which this fall will field its first team. But it was plain to everyone that the academy athletic director, Col. Robert V. Whitlow, almost idolized the tall, white-haired Shaw. It was thought originally that Shaw would not be officially signed as head coach at the academy until next year, when the sophomore team would be ready for intercollegiate varsity competition.

But Shaw signed a five-year contract yesterday, rendered by Lt. Gen. Hubert R. Harmon, the academy superintendent. Shaw's salary was not disclosed.

THE FALCONS
Whitlow will continue to serve as first-year coach. The fledgling Falcons—the name chosen by the cadets this week for their athletic teams—open an eight-game schedule against regional freshmen teams on Oct. 8, playing the Denver University frosh here.

Although the academy insists it has done no athletic recruiting, the first class of 300 odd cadets is loaded with exceptional high school athletic talent, including several young men who won national recognition on prep football fields. The academy has made it clear that within three or four years it intends to field a team competent to take on West Point, Annapolis, and other big teams in intercollegiate football.

SIXTH JOB
For Shaw, it is the sixth coaching job of a football career that began with three years as tackle for Notre Dame. The Irish lost only one game, to Iowa, 10-7, in those years of 1919-21.

He became head coach at North Carolina State in 1924, moved to the University of Nevada in 1925, and in 1926 was named head coach at Santa Clara in California. His Santa Clara teams won the Sugar Bowl classic in New Orleans in 1926 and 1927.

Shaw was named head coach at the University of California in 1945, and in 1948 was hired by the San Francisco Forty Niners. He was let go by the Forty Niners in 1954 because the owners—admitting his popularity with the players and the public and his exceptional coaching ability—were hungry for the professional championship which always eluded Shaw.

Martin, Campanella In Verbal Feud

NEW YORK (UPI) — A real-hot feud was simmering today between brash Billy Martin of the Yankees and normally easy-going Roy Campanella of the Dodgers in what threatens to erupt into the best.

Minneapolis Wins Little World Series

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (UPI) — Minneapolis, boasting home run power and iron-man hurling, reigned today as the Little World Series champion.

Blasting four home runs, the American Association entry whipped Rochester of the International League, 9-4, Wednesday night in the final game of the best-of-seven series.

The title was a nice sendoff for Miller manager, Bill Riney, who moves up to guide the parent New York Giants in 1956.

Home runs were the key to the Minneapolis triumph as the Millers blasted seven circuit clouts while winning the last two games.

Big Bob Lemon, who drove in five runs, slammed out two four baggers Wednesday night while Don Bollweg and Carl Sawatski added one each as the Millers tore into three Rochester hurlers for 13 hits.

Outfielder George Wilson hit two and Sawatski one Tuesday night when the Millers evened the series at three games each with a key, 4-3 10-inning win.

On the mound, big Al Worthington was the standout by far.

He was credited with the first three Minneapolis victories and completed a sensational series by blanking Rochester on three hits in the final 2½ innings Wednesday night.

It started back in the 1953 series and it flared anew yesterday when "Billy-The-Kid" tried to steal home in the sixth inning of the Yankees' 6-5 victory over the Dodgers.

As they arose from the pileup at the plate, the stocky Dodger catcher gave Martin an extra bump with his shoulder. "The Yankee pepperpot immediately shoved Campanella back.

"I wasn't sore," Martin said later in the dressing room. "I just don't like being pushed around. I might have punched him on the nose if it wasn't the World Series."

Campanella, still smarting from

some newspaper quotations attributed to Martin only a week ago, reacted just as angrily.

NEAR MISS
After revealing later that Martin had taunted him on the field with the crack "I didn't think you tagged guys at home plate," Campanella steamed.

"I missed him by about three inches. I should have tagged him on his big mouth."

The same two principals squared off two years ago when Martin tried to score from second base on a "suicide" run and wound up the final out in the fourth game of the '53 series. An easy out at the plate, Martin didn't even try to slide but barged into Campanella like a full-back in an effort to knock the ball out of his hands.

Only a few days ago, Martin was watching a Dodger game on television and allegedly observed with in earshot of newspapermen. "I see Campanella is still tagging runners high. What's the matter, is he spike shy?"

TAGGED
Martin insisted yesterday that

Campanella "tagged me on the neck and that's why I was sure I was safe."

The fiery Yankee infielder, after a half-hour of post-game reflection, conceded that he might have made a "dumb play" in trying to steal home, although Manager Casey Stengel refused to second-guess him.

The Martin-Campanella rhubarb recalled the last serious world series outburst in the hectic Cardinals classic 21 years ago. That was the classic in which Medwick squared off after the spike-flashing slide into third base. And it wound up with the late commissioner, Kenesaw Mountain Landis ordering Medwick out of the game following a fruit-throwing demonstration by Detroit bleacherites.

There's no doubting the aroused feelings of the two stubborn protagonists in this year's feud. And there's still at least three more games to be played.

Ronnie Knox, UCLA standout who still has a sore shoulder from the game with Maryland last week was sharp with his passes Wednesday as the Bruins went through a no-contact drill in preparation for the Pacific Coast Conference game against Washington State.

Coach Red Sanders looked at movies of the Maryland game and made two changes in his starting line-up for Saturday. He moved John Smith to left end and returned quarterback Bob Berdahl to the No. 1 blocking back spot.

The Washington State Cougars' hopes for a good showing against UCLA dipped when Bob Miller, 210-pound first string fullback, was ruled out of the game with a knee injury. Either Bill Kramer or Dewey Keith will take over.

The Trojans of Southern California pleased Coach Jess Hill with their last day of heavy work—emphasizing pass defense—as they made ready for Texas Friday night.

Hill said that backs Jon Arnett and Don Hickman stood out in pass interception. The Texas Longhorns were slated to arrive in Los Angeles Thursday.

Stanford's Coach Chuck Taylor is gearing his defense to try to derail Ohio State's star halfback, Howard Cassady. The Buckeyes, 38 strong, were on their way to the West Coast by plane. The Indians learned that Don Stoeckel will replace OSU's injured Dicky Guy at left tackle.

At Berkeley, Cal Coach Lynn Waldorf was disappointed in his Bears' showing in scrimmage and drilled them on defensive fundamentals. Tackle Murdo Nickelson, who has a hurt knee, may also miss play against Penn.

The University of Washington tried player shifts in stiff running scrimmage as Coach John Cherberg looked for an answer to Tom Crabtree, the Oregon Duck quarterback. Oregon went through

a heavy workout, with special attention to pass plays. The teams will meet at Portland Saturday night.
