## Civil Service Posts Offered

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for securities investigator for filling positions paying \$3,440 and \$5,390 a year in the Regional Offices of the Securities and Exchange Commission located throughout the United States.

No written test will be given but applicants must have had appropriate experience or a combination of education and experience.

Further information regarding the requirements, and application forms, may be secured at many post offices throughout the country, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D.C. Applications will be accepted by the executive secretary, Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, 425 Second Street, N.W., Washington, D. C., until further notice. However, persons who wish to receive early consideration should apply not later than October 27, 1955.

## Post Office Chief Named

Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield announced today the appointment of Samuel G. Schwartz as regional director for the Post Office Department with headquarters in Portland, Oregon, effective Monday, October 3, 1955.

The Portland regional office will direct all postal activities in the State of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana, and the Territory of Alaska. With this appointment, the Post Office Department is bringing all phases of postal business under one field head in this area. There are six postal district offices functioning under the Portland regional office located in Portland, Oregon; Boise, Idaho; Butte, Montana; Spokane and Seattle, Washington; and Anchorage, Alaska.

The Portland regional office was opened on Monday, July 12, 1954. The new regional director is presently regional operations manager at Portland. Schwartz is a native of Portland, Oregon, with 34 years of postal service. He entered the postal service in 1921 as a clerk and was appointed a post office inspector in 1930. He served as manager of the Cleveland, Ohio, district operations office prior to his appointment as regional operations manager of the Portland region on July 12, 1954.

Schwartz served as a colonel in the Army Postal Service in World War II, and was awarded the Legion of Merit. He resides in Portland with his wife, two daughters, and one son.

Of these 50,000 are white fronted and snow geese with some cacklers and a fair population of Canadian honkers. Water in all the water areas is at a favorable level for hunting.
