Bow Hunt Interest Increases

LANSING, Mich. (AP)—Bow and arrow hunters are taking to the woods in Michigan this weekend in search of deer.

Conservation officials say they are the fastest growing group of sportsmen in the state. In 1937, there were 300 archery licenses, last year 33,000 and this year the conservation department expects 35,000.

What explains the spectacle of men hunting with ancient weapons in the atomic age? G. A. Ammann, a Conservation Department game expert, has been making like Robin Hood since 1937. He says there's plenty of attraction in the sport from the standpoint of its challenge to use one's own skill and strength in manipulating a weapon.

But for Ammann, there's something even more important: Archery hunting is a good way to get a deer. Since 1937, he has brought home seven—a record that many a gun hunter would envy.

Ammann has some pointers for bow and arrow hunters. In addition to concealing yourself, he says, you have to have almost superhuman patience to wait until the deer comes within range.

"To get a killing shot you pretty much have to be within 30 yards," Ammann says. "But an arrow can kill as far as it can shoot. A man in Utah killed a deer at 713 yards and the arrow was dropping as it hit the animal's back."

In spite of the difficulties, archers have happy hunting. They killed an estimated 1,800 deer during the five-week season last year. Some 600 of these were bucks, the remainder fawns and does.

BROOKLYN (AP)—Who's the big man on the New York Yankees? Yogi Berra, if you want to accept the opinion of Brooklyn shortstop Pee Wee Reese.

"He's the ball club," Reese said.

"He makes it. He's trying to beat you in a million ways and he does it too. He even tries to talk you out of the ball game. I told him before yesterday's game: 'Don't open your big mouth to me, you little so-and-so. Just let me alone.'"

"You get up to the plate and Yogi will say: 'Gee, it's kinda hard to see the ball today, ain't it?'"

He's trying to plant that idea in your head, so maybe you'll really think it's hard to see the ball."

Hank Bauer pulled a thigh muscle in yesterday's 4-2 victory over the Dodgers and had to retire in the third inning. He was a sad ex-Marine indeed.

"It's something like Mickey Mantle's leg injury," he said. "I rested all night and applied ice packs."

Without Bauer in the lineup, the Yankees would be short two thirds of their regular outfield.

Even Irv Noren, the third member of the regulars, has a swollen and painful right knee.

"I really belong in the hospital," said Irv, "but I'm not even going to think of it until after the series and the sooner it ends the happier I'm going to be."

Before he was forced to retire, Bauer amused himself kidding Dodger right fielder Carl Furillo, who has been complaining about a cold.

"Please stay out of right field," cracked Bauer. "You've got the place full of germs."

The Brooks' veteran catcher Dixie Howell had an explanation for the Brooks' miserable showing.

"We caught them hot," he said. "Just when they were playing their best ball. We were like that too during the season. But our streak ended and so will theirs."

Carl Erskine, who set a series record by striking out 14 Yankees in one game in the '34 series, has been ailing, which explains why he didn't get the No. 3 assignment.

"Carl is not yet 100 per cent," explained Alston. "So I know I can get only one game out of him. I can use others in the early games and have them come back later."

Most of the Brooks' regulars think Erskine has more stuff than any member of the pitching staff.

Rock Reaches Public, Contenders Eye Bout

NEW YORK (NEA)—Now that Rocky Marciano has finally "reached" the public, Al Weill may give the personable young man from Brockton an opportunity to get around and meet the people.

For a long time there has been a lot of us feared that Marciano would box out of boxing with a better record and less attention than any heavyweight champion. He means business to be hidden away between fights. He should be kept before the patrons like any other entertainer.

While Marciano gets reacquainted with his family and sells himself (we hope) to the fans, three heavyweights of sorts scramble for the right to be belted by him next June. They are, of course, and not necessarily in the order of importance, if any, Nino Valdes, Bob Baker and Hurricane Tommy Jackson.

Meanwhile, Marciano has the perfect gimmick with which to build and maintain interest in himself, an air of suspense in connection with his retiring.

It has been suggested that Valdes, Baker and Jackson meet in an elimination contest. The danger there would be all three eliminating themselves.

A much better idea would be for Marciano to fight all three the same night—five rounds apiece. That way, we might get 15 rounds out of The Rock and see him at his best. He's a slow starter, you know.

Because he has a sense of history and wants to go down as an all-time great, Marciano, now 31, may wait a couple of years for Floyd Patterson, the Olympic champion who is now 29 and a light-heavyweight, to grow up. He has said that he would not hang 'em up while there was anyone around whom the public considered entitled to a crack at the crown. He's not going to be charged with ducking anybody.

Another rather bright prospect for the future is Willie Pastrano, out of New Orleans and the same age and weight as Patterson. Pastrano and Pastrano would be an excellent match, by the way.

It is no secret that Manager Weill preferred Baker to Moore, despite the difference in the bucks office magnanimity. Those well versed in the strange ways of prize fighting today say Baker will be Marciano's next opponent because of the friendship between his manager, William "Duke" Belton, New Kensington, Pa., plastics manufacturer, and Weill.

Patterson Flattens Foe In 3rd

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Floyd Patterson, who hasn't found an opponent this year that could last the distance against him, prepared today to go to Los Angeles where he will fight Cal Brad Oct. 13 in another attempt to get more experience.

The Brooklyn better had an easy time last night with Dave Whitlock, a San Francisco heavyweight whom he stopped in 52 seconds of the third round. It was Patterson's seventh straight victory and the seventh time this year that he has met an opponent who could not go the distance.

His record now is 29 wins and 1 controversial loss to Joey Maxim.

Whitlock, who scaled 161 to 175½ for Patterson, got over one good right to the jaw in the first round, but was on the way out from there on. Patterson dropped him for an eight count with a right to the jaw in the second round and Whitlock sagged seconds into a sharp flurry to take a nine-count after he had gotten up.

While a house that crouched 184½ boomed in apparent disgust, Whitlock collapsed from a right to the head early in the third round and Referee Jack Silver halted the lop-sided contest.

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Economy Sized Ends Give Hill Best Team

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Two of the biggest intercollegiate ends in captivity, added and abetted by a flock of other top-flight talent, are in the act of giving Coach Jess Hill of Southern California his finest football team.

This club, unbeaten and scoring 92 points against 27 for its opponents in the first two games, gets its first real test of the season to night against University of Texas, a club that is one of the favorites to win the Southwest Conference crown.

The big ends are Leon Clarke, six foot, four inches and 219 pounds; and Chuck (Elephant) Griffith, six foot, seven inches and 253 pounds. These two men have done a fine job of smothering all the opposition coming their way, and at the same time have been standouts on the offensive.

While Hill took his club to the Rose Bowl last year for the Pacific Coast Conference's annual shellacking from the Big Ten, it is doubtful that that club could carry the water pail for the powerhouse that has run wild through its first two opponents this year.

In Jon Arnett, the talented halfback, the Trojans have a man who has scored 43 points in the first two tilts—and looks like he might run wild every time he gets the ball.

The Trojans are one of four major unbeaten teams remaining after two weeks of play on the West Coast and appear to have the best chance of any going through the year with a perfect season.

However, just
