Gordon MacRae Attributes Success To Self Confidence

HOLLYWOOD (UP)—A boyish, eager singer named Gordon MacRae today is one of the hottest "new" stars in Hollywood—thanks to his own salesmanship and a non-eager singer named Frank Sinatra.

After MacRae bowed out of Warner Studios, Hollywood observers pegged him as "washed up." But MacRae told today how by a fascinating combination of persistence and self-confidence he promoted himself into the two biggest musicals of many years—"Oklahoma!" and "Carousel."

"Why, even when Frank Sinatra got the role in 'Carousel' I never lost faith I would get the part," MacRae said. "I even kept my sideburns and my hair long."

MacRae is not one to sit by quietly and let people discover his talents. He won the part in "Oklahoma!" by buttonholing director Fred Zinneman and producer Arthur Hornblow. He says, with some bewilderment, "They wanted a lot of music testing other people."

"When I was doing 'Oklahoma,' I talked to Rogers and Hammerstein

about doing 'Carousel,'" he went on. "I thought I'd be a cinch for the part. I always hoped I'd do the picture. But they told me Sinatra had the inside track."

MacRae nonetheless wired Darryl F. Zanuck of 20th Century-Fox that the best man for "Carousel" was MacRae. Zanuck wired back that Sinatra was set.

MacRae revealed, however, even before the picture started he might ditch the role.

"I saw Frankie up in Las Vegas and kidded him, telling him that he ought to lay off 'Carousel' as it was an Oscar-type role, and I'd like to do one and he'd already done 'From Here to Eternity,'" MacRae said.

"Frankie said, 'Don't worry about it, Gordon.'"

Sinatra, as hinted, stalked off the location of "Carousel," claiming he hadn't bargained for the picture to be shot with two different cameras.

MacRae already knew the songs of "Carousel" because he sang them last spring at a fair in Dallas—another move designed to win him the picture role.

"I studied hard for eight years, making a lot of pictures at Warner's that were nice but didn't require any ability," he said. "They

were too busy building up Doris Day."

I watched MacRae do a scene for "Carousel," and several times he asked producer Henry Ephron, "Was that okay? Did you like that?"

Now MacRae is planning his next move. He wants a Broadway musical. "Also, Mr. Ephron is writing a picture for me—" he began.

"I'm producing one that might have a role for you," Ephron corrected him.

"—and I saw Jack Warner at a party the other night and put in a plug for 'Pajama Game,'" MacRae said eagerly.

Actress Improves After Operation

BOSTON (UP)—The condition of actress Katharine Cornell was described as "good" early today after an operation for a chronic lung abscess.

Officials at Deaconess Hospital said the operation on the 57-year-old actress yesterday was successful and there were no complications.

Miss Cornell said she expects to go on tour in November.

Ohio Turnpike Opens Tonight

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UP)—At one minute past midnight tonight cars and trucks start using the entire length of the 241-mile Ohio Turnpike that sweeps across northern Ohio, joining the Pennsylvania Turnpike.

A 22-mile section near the Pennsylvania line opened last Dec. 1. The 219 remaining miles will be the longest stretch of highway ever opened anywhere at one time.

The Turnpike cost 326 million dollars. It serves four heavily populated areas—Cleveland, Toledo, Youngstown and Akron—and a host of smaller cities. A motorist using the entire Turnpike will save three hours driving time.

It will cost \$3 to drive your family car the whole distance. The speed limit is 63 m.p.h. for cars and 55 m.p.h. for trucks.

U.S. Fish, Wildlife Chief Asks Duck Hunt Information

John L. Farley, director of the Fish and Wildlife Service, today urged all waterfowl hunters who have received registration cards with the purchase of their federal duck stamps to cooperate with the service by filling out and promptly returning the indicated portion of the form.

This year more than 700 post offices throughout the country have been furnished with double postcard forms which are handed to purchaser of duck stamps at these particular post offices.

One-half of the card is to be filled out by the hunter and returned at once to the service. The other half is to be retained as a sort of scorecard on which the hunter can list the numbers and kinds of waterfowl which he bags during the coming season, and the number of days he hunted.

"This sample of hunters who return the cards," said Director Farley, "will receive questionnaires at the end of the hunting season in which they will be asked to report their seasonal hunting success. It is highly important that all duck stamp purchasers receiving registration cards fill them out and mail them promptly. Cards from everyone contacted are necessary to make our sample representative of the entire hunting population."

Chief purpose of the survey, Director Farley explained, is to determine as accurately as possible the extent of the waterfowl hunting kill for the season in order that a proper balance between the harvest of these birds and the hunting regulations may continue to be maintained.

This annual mail survey was inaugurated on a national basis during the 1952 hunting season when 150 post offices cooperated with the service in handing out the card forms. According to Director Farley, it has potentialities of being one of the most progressive steps ever taken by the Fish and Wildlife Service in the matter of inventorying the annual harvest of waterfowl.

Lake County Free Mongol Pheasants

LAKEVIEW—Eighteen hundred Mongolian pheasants have been liberated in Lake County during the last 10 days, according to Boyd Claggett, local field agent for the state game department.

Hall of the birds were liberated in the Goose Lake Valley and the other half at Summer Lake. The birds, which were 10 weeks old, were brought from the Ontario Game Farm. Claggett said the roosters will be mature size for hunters when the season opens.
