Spud Workers Call Issued

TULELAKE — Local labor will be urged to withhold the next few weeks to help harvest the Klamath Basin's potato crop. Announcement of a probable labor shortage was made today by Harold Black, Redding, farm labor placement representative for the California State Employment Service...

Some harvesting is now under way in fields of both Russets and White Rose. Peak of the harvest will be between October 10 and October 26. Housing accommodations at a nominal price are available in the Basin. The grower's association camp at Newell has adequate facilities for families and single men, and for house trailers...

Jenkins and Black in a joint statement said that the potato crop on an average is better than fair. Bulk of the fields will be satisfactory for workers. The wage scale, set by Tulelake and Klamath County growers' associations in recent session is the same as last year. Work permits for children 14-16 must be obtained at the labor placement headquarters in the office of the Tulelake Growers Association. Children of the migrant workers from six to 16 years of age may attend school at Newell. A grocery is being operated in the mess hall at the growers camp, Newell, for the convenience of the harvesters. The telephone number for the labor placement office is 7-2321.

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Burns Murder Hearing Slated

A hearing on the supreme court appeal request of James Quinton Anderson, convicted of the murder of Richard David Miller, Klamath Reservation show horse breeder, will be held next Monday in Burns. At that time, according to District Attorney Richard Beesley, the state will be represented by Attorney Charles Raymond of Portland, who acted as special prosecutor at the trial.

Defense Attorneys Herbert and Robert Welch of Lakeview, will present a bill of exceptions to Circuit Judge M. A. Biggs on which they are basing their appeal. They claim the jury which convicted Anderson of second degree murder, was allowed to read detective story magazine accounts of the murder while the trial was in progress.

The defense lawyers also contend the trial was illegal because Attorney Raymond and Frank Anderson, then Klamath County district attorney, failed to be deposed in Harney County. When an agreement is reached between counsel on the bill of exceptions, Judge Biggs will send the case to the supreme court. Forty days will then be allowed for both sides to file briefs with the high tribunal.

In the meantime, Anderson is being held in the Klamath County jail. He was given a life sentence by Judge Biggs.

UF Squadron Chiefs Named

David S. Troy and Arthur Rickbell, co-commanders of the advance gifts division of Operation Pair Share, this year's United Fund-Red Cross fund drive, have announced additional squadron leaders to assume duties in the city and county. The drive will blast-off October 17.

Klamath School Officials Plan Federal Aid Census

A census of students in Klamath Union High School and elementary buildings whose parents are employed locally on federal projects is to be undertaken to pave the way for possible federal aid to local school districts. Action on the census was instituted by KUHSS board of directors in session, September 25. Federal aid is based on a student percent basis. Boards of both elementary and high schools met in the high school.

An anticipated influx of students whose parents will be connected with the jet air base may qualify local districts for money from that source. The elementary board authorized preliminary excavation at the new Mountain View grade school site to prepare ground for setting during the winter months in anticipation of construction on the school building in the spring.

James Young has been appointed assistant principal at Mills School. Elnora McClellan was assigned to Riverside School for part of the year. C. C. Carlson, principal of the high school, distributed to members of the board a condensed summary of evaluations made in 1954 by the evaluating committee. Recommendations made by the committee will be studied at future meetings of the board.

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
