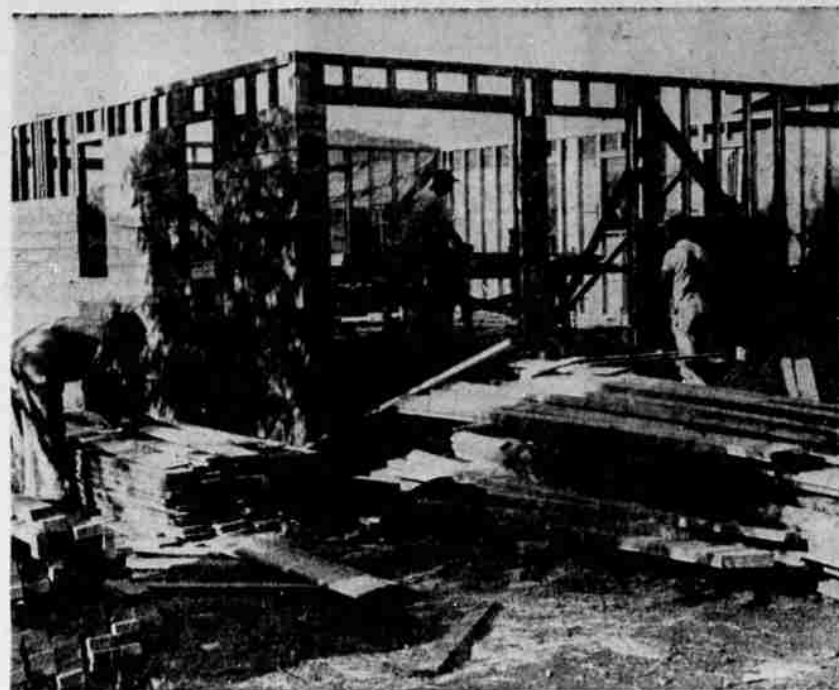

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Women Hear Ski Lift Plans

DUNSMUIR—The building of a chair lift on the slopes of Mount Shasta will mean an estimated 300,000 people will spend an extra day in Siskiyou County yearly. Chapman Wentworth, chairman of the steering committee of the lift development organization, told members and guests at a Business and Professional Women's Club dinner Monday night.

About 70 per cent of ski lift revenue comes from summer tourists. Wentworth told the group, emphasizing that Mount Shasta is an attractive scenic landmark visible for hundreds of miles and people have asked for 20 years for a means of easy access to the mountain.

Initial resurfacing of the John Everitt Memorial Highway which leads from the town of Mount Shasta to Panther Meadows near timberline will begin next July. The road work will be a three year project. Hopes are high that construction of the chair lift can also begin soon.

Hans Sarbach, sales manager of the Heron Engineering Company of Denver, has been invited to tour the proposed site. His firm specializes in chair lift construction. A local team will devote the weekend to preliminary survey work.

George Schraeder, a retired U.S. forestry official, has been retained as executive secretary for the development committee and efforts have been initiated to raise \$5,000 locally to finance the groundwork for the development.

Mrs. Emma Smith, president, welcomed about 40 members and guests. Among the distinguished guests were Mayor Fred Lloyd, Patricia Meroux, of Mount Shasta state health and safety chairman for the BPW, Grace Pickthorn, state BPW by-laws chairman and district music chairman; and Marjorie Young, city councilwoman.

Mrs. Meroux spoke on the history of the BPW federation. Miss Young told of the BPW project to aid small businesses with data and counseling.
