Medford Steel Furnace Built

MEDFORD — Installation of Southern Oregon's first electric furnace for the manufacture of steel and steel products, began in the White City industrial area this week.

The furnace is the first of several to be installed by Laughlin Alloy Steel Company, established here to manufacture alloy and special steels and steel castings for a variety of industries.

Rebuilt by Green Electric Furnace Company of Seattle, the furnace was shipped here early this week and installation began immediately, under the supervision of J. N. Laughlin, company president; Thomas B. Laird, executive vice president; and David Trudeau, machine and foundry department manager. The furnace pit and new building housing the furnace were completed some time ago, and the special transformer used in the operation, weighing 20 tons, is also on hand and ready for installation.

According to Laughlin, the new furnace has a capacity of 10,000 pounds of metal, and can produce five tons of carbon or stainless steel every two and one-half hours. Scrap steel and low grade native ores such as chromium, manganese, and tungsten will be utilized in the Laughlin operation.

Golden Trout Growth Told

Angling for the beautiful golden trout, once just a dream to Oregon anglers, may soon become a reality according to recent surveys made by the Oregon Game Commission.

The colorful golden, a subspecies of rainbow, has now become well established and boast good populations in several Willamette Mountain areas. Investigations of Swam and Baby Long lakes by Will Brown, regional supervisor, and Homer Campbell, northern fisheries agent, showed that the golden trout planted by the commission by aerial lift as young fry in 1953 had grown 5 to 7 inches in length and were in good physical condition.

Unmistakable coloration is typical of the golden trout. The ordinary rainbow spotting is found on the upper parts of the body, but the red stripe along the lateral line is more brilliant and wider than on the rainbow. Bright red-orange with white edges. The flesh is also red-orange, similar to that of the blueback or kokanee found in Willamette Lake.

Golden trout, under good environmental conditions, reach a length of 18 to 20 inches and a weight of three pounds or more. The average length over most of its range is from 10 to 14 inches.

Golden trout were also planted in 1953 by the commission in Hobo Lake by aerial lift and in West Eagle Creek by pack string. In 1954, Wood and Razz lakes were stocked by aerial lift. A mid-September survey is scheduled to determine the status of golden trout in these bodies of water.

Hobo, Wood, and Razz lakes, because of their accessibility, will remain closed to angling to give the golden trout a chance to grow, reproduce, and multiply. West Eagle Creek and Swamp and Baby Long lakes are open for fishing but entail a long arduous pack trip.

Refreshments were served by chairman of the home economics committee, Clara Scott, and her assistants, Anna Weatherby and Elsie Quinn.

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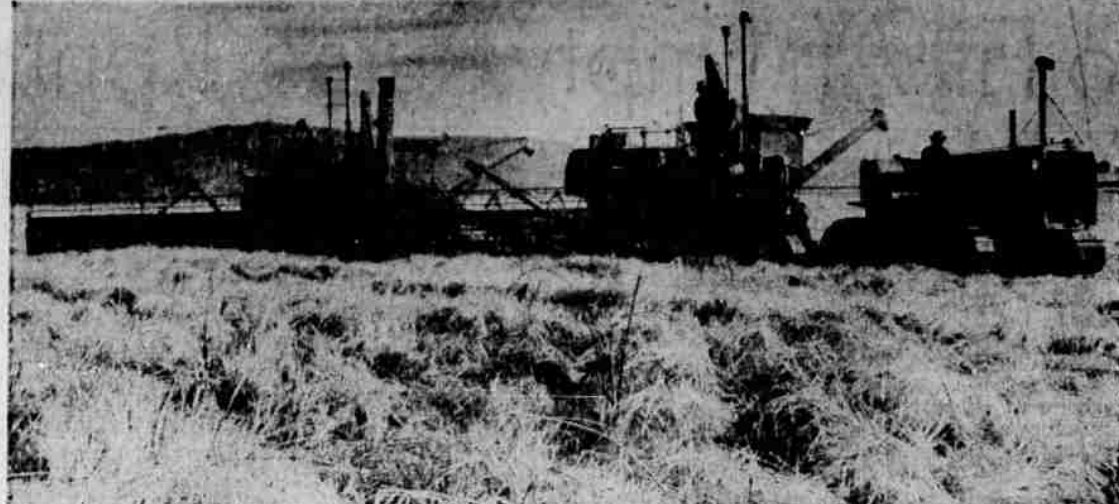
