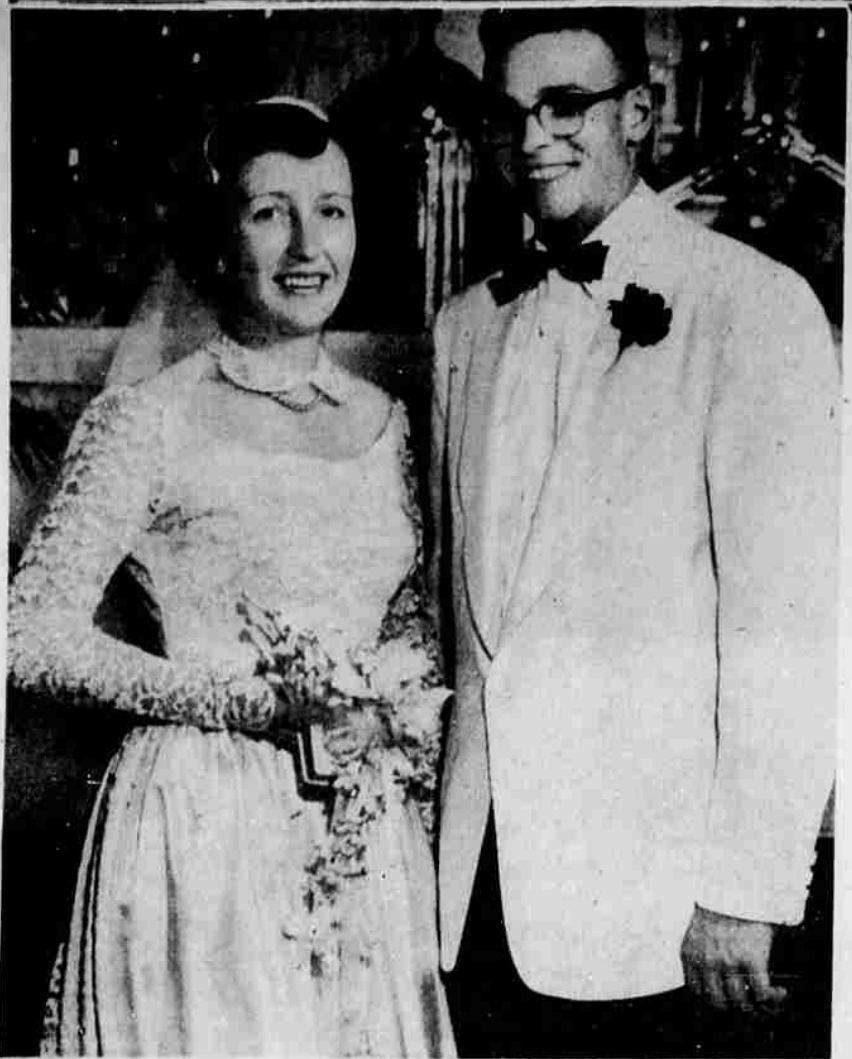

Over 300 guests witnessed the 2 p.m. marriage service, read by the Rev. John Phelan.
