

MOROCCAN TRIBESMEN RETREAT

In The Day's News

So that we may deal realistically with the facts of life, which is always advisable, let us recite here this morning in chronological order a series of events that began in Denver late yesterday afternoon.

The Sunday evening medical bulletin from Fitzsimons army hospital reported President Eisenhower "a little tired and not feeling as well as usual." The bulletin added that he was given a mild sedative to help him fall asleep more easily.

When the change in the President's condition was noted, the news was telephoned at once to Dr. Paul Dudley White, one of the world's foremost heart specialists who has been in constant consultation since the chief executive's heart attack.

In commenting on the change, Dr. White said: "It makes us suspicious that there may be something behind it. But," he added, "the President may be all right later" (when he awakens).

The news this morning is reassuring. The hospital bulletin says the President's condition remains satisfactory and that he apparently has suffered no complications.

The bulletin adds that he awoke "refreshed and refreshed" and visited with Mrs. Eisenhower during breakfast. For his morning meal, he ate a slice of cantaloupe, an egg, two strips of beef bacon, a slice of whole wheat toast and a glass of skimmed milk.

It was added somewhat later that he may sign additional government papers this week, possibly even today.

All of which is wonderful.

Let us now get on with our sequence of events.

Remember that it began late yesterday afternoon. Remember that modern communications are so nearly perfect that within a matter of minutes the news of the President's condition was known all over the world.

Remember that this bulletin came at a time when stock exchanges all over the world were closed. People were left to reflect on the possible consequences of an unfavorable change in the President's condition.

That brings us up to today.

When the New York Stock Exchange opened this morning, it ran into a wave of selling. Prices fell one to three points in many instances, and some losses went on out to six points at the worst. Volume mounted swiftly as the selling progressed and prices fell.

What does that mean?

It means that people feel widely and generally that if President Eisenhower should be removed by death or total disability from the scene of world events the future would be far less bright and beautiful.

It can have no other meaning.

Now for the moral.

Let us suggest it in the form of a question.

Have we reached the point where we put too much dependence ON ONE MAN?

I don't know.

But I can't escape the feeling that we are approaching the point where we place too much emphasis upon the executive branch of our government (which is headed by one man) and too little emphasis upon the legislative branch, which is composed of MANY men. We are coming to think of the President as all-important and of the congress as relatively unimportant.

History teaches us that is a dangerous trend.

I think we'd better begin to think of the supreme importance to us of getting the ablest men we have into the congress.

Park Wading Pool Finished

CHLOQUIN—A small swimming pool with an adjoining wading pool has been completed at the Chloquin Community Park. It is announced by president, William Lorenz. Walks and dressing rooms will be built during the fall or spring so that the area will be open when good weather arrives in 1956.

The pool, although only 16 by 34 feet and comparatively shallow, will allow many youngsters to play in the water, and it is hoped that money-making events in the future will allow the construction of a larger pool for the area, Lorenz said.

The Gun-Crete Company of Salem and Portland did the cement work on the pool, which has a valuation of \$1,200.

Uranium Ore Shipped Today

LAKEVIEW—Three cars of uranium ore were loaded this morning by the Lakeview Mining Company, owned by Thorburn Brothers, Grand Junction, Colorado, destined for the Vero Chemical Company, Salt Lake City.

The ore, which came from the White King and Lucky Lass mines, was loaded by a tractor loader into three bottom-dump gondolas. Ed Johnson, mine superintendent for the Lakeview Mining Company, said this will be the first shipment of uranium ore to leave Oregon.

Fence-The-Canal Groups To Face Council Tonight

As scores of citizens planned to appear before the city council Monday night in an attempt to have a fence placed along the A canal, which has claimed 50 lives since it has been in operation, it was reported that parents of the latest victim of "death ditch" are planning to sue the United States government.

Mrs. Kathryn McDonald, chairman of the Fence-the-Canal Committee, announced that C. Gerard Davidson, former assistant secretary of the interior, now a practicing attorney in Portland, has agreed to represent the parents of Patrick Callahan, 3, who perished in the canal last week. The parents are Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Callahan, 1201 Crescent Avenue.

Mrs. McDonald said she conferred with Davidson in Portland Saturday.

"Mr. Davidson said he would try to come to Klamath Falls Monday in time for the council meeting to talk to Mr. and Mrs. Callahan. Their purpose in wanting to sue the government is merely to see if responsibility can be fixed for safeguarding the canal."

Attorney Davidson, while in the interior department, made a personal investigation of the canal hazard shortly before the outbreak of the Korean War. He recommended the canal be fenced.

Efforts to have the canal fenced were made when hostilities developed in Korea.

Mayor Paul Landry Monday morning reiterated his statement that some action must be taken to protect the children of Klamath Falls from the canal.

Representatives of all civic and fraternal organizations have agreed to send a representative to the Monday night council meeting.

Lake Deer Hunter Shot

LAKEVIEW—Charles Drinkwater, Lakeview distributor for Associated Oil, is in Lakeview Hospital as the result of the first reported deer hunting accident in this area.

Drinkwater and his 8-year-old son, Richard, were hunting about 6:30 a.m. Sunday in the north Crane Creek area about 12 miles south of Lakeview when a shot came across the canyon and hit the shale next to their feet. Drinkwater pushed the boy to the ground and dropped on him to protect him. He waved his red hat on the end of his gun, and shouted for several moments. After waiting until he thought it was safe, he stood up and another shot was fired which hit him in the thigh.

His calls for help were finally heard by his wife and older son, Charles Jr., who were hunting farther up the canyon. With the help of another hunter, they drove a pickup truck to within 150 yards of the accident.

Dr. Drinkwater was taken to the hospital in the truck, using a makeshift stretcher.

Hospital authorities today said his condition is satisfactory. The bullet went completely through his leg and he lost considerable blood on the way to medical aid.

Dr. Drinkwater said it was reported that at least 24 other hunters were on the hill at the time of the accident. So far the hunter who fired the shot has not been located.

Dolphin Pounds Up Fishermen In Surfside Battle

TOKUSHIMA, Japan (AP)—A huge 1,600-pound dolphin knocked out one man and roughed up 20 more before it finally was clubbed to death in a bloody 30 minute fight Monday.

Fishermen discovered the ponderous sea mammal, more than 15 feet from head to tail, thrashing about in shallow water behind a sand bar.

Two waded in and tried to lasso it. The dolphin knocked one cold with a massive wallop of its tail and partially stunned the second.

Eighteen other fishermen jumped into the fray. The giant fish knocked them about in the surf for 30 minutes before it was killed.

CELEBRATION
SEOUL (AP)—South Korean pilots sent U.S.-built jet fighters screaming over the heads of 20,000 spectators Saturday as the South Korean air force celebrated its seventh birthday. Several pilots dove their F-86 Sabres through the sound barrier to produce super-sonic booms for the thousands of Koreans who lined the Han River.

The attending doctors at Fitzsimons Army Hospital where Mr. Eisenhower is a patient were alert to changes in his condition, but their mid-morning report allayed anxiety in the White House staff that the President may have taken a bad turn during the night.

The White House shortly after 10 a.m. (MST) disclosed that Mr. Eisenhower was subjected to a thorough medical examination at 4:25 a.m. today.

He was examined again after he awoke at 7:10 a.m. in the realization that any word on Mr. Eisenhower's condition could have a mercurial effect around the world, the doctors took their time in releasing the news of the President's mid-morning condition.

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Yankees Win Third To Tie Series 3-3

NEW YORK (AP)—A five-run explosion in the first inning, highlighted by Bill Skowron's three-run homer, and Whitey Ford's four-hit pitching gave the New York Yankees a 5-1 victory Monday and tied the world series at 3-3. A knee injury forced Brooklyn's Duke Snider out of the game in the fourth inning.

The final game of the series will be played at Yankee Stadium Monday at 8 a.m. (PST). Left-hander Tommy Byrne, winner of the second game for New York, will oppose southpaw Johnny Podres, victor in the third game.

Snider injured his left knee in the third inning when he stepped in a hole in the outfield while chasing Skowron's fly. He was replaced by the bat by Don Zimmer in the fourth.

Death Claims Mrs. Massey

Mrs. Bertha Johanna Massey, 68, wife of a prominent Klamath Falls physician, Dr. George A. Massey, died at the family home, 1987 Esplanade, Sunday, October 2. She had been ill since last May.

The outbreak came on the heels of Sultan Mohammed Ben Moulay Arafat's departure from his palace in Rabat to a villa in the international zone of Tangier.

In leaving, Moulay Arafat delegated his seals of office to a cousin, Moulay Abdallah Ben Moulay Abdel Hafid. This apparently was a concession to French colonialists who had bitterly fought the government's ouster of the Sultan.

In an effort to quiet aroused nationalists, Pierre July, French minister for Moroccan and Tunisian affairs, termed the delegation of powers an "intermediate" step. The French resident general for Morocco, Gen. Pierre Boyer de Latour, in a broadcast asked all Moroccans to support Abdel Hafid "for the moment" as a symbol of unity.

Nationalists termed the Sultan's action illegal and urged that France go ahead immediately with its original plan of naming a three-man agency to take over powers of the throne.

The guerrilla attacks in the eastern Atlas Mountains and near the border with Spanish Morocco were the first serious outbreaks since the uprising of Berber tribesmen Aug. 29 in which more than 100 French and 1,000 Moroccans died.

Like the Aug. 30 attacks, the fighting there
