Highway Bids To Be Opened

The California State Division of Highways will open bids Wednesday on a 3.5 mile section of highway between Madeline and Likely in Lassen County. It is officially designated as extending from Sagehen Summit to Dry Creek.

The section begins about four miles north of Madeline. It covers the gap between two sections built in 1939. At that time some funds became available for constructing highways through public lands. The amount was not large but the highway commission allotted it to Lassen County and constructed three short sections north of Madeline. This eliminated sections of inferior alignment and four railroad grade crossings.

The present project closes a gap which existed in the previous improvement and was omitted because funds were not available for construction. The present road follows a general direction and is merely a series of continuous irregular curves. Both the alignment and grade follow the existing ground. This road was never constructed; it was an original trail, graded into a county road and taken into the state highway system in 1933. Since then it has had a light surfacing placed so as to be usable by traffic. The state does not even have a map or profile of this road.

The proposed location of the new section is more direct and lies generally to the east of the existing highway. The improvement will consist of a plant mixed surface 32 feet in width. This will provide two 12 foot traffic lanes with four foot shoulders. Under this is untreated base material six inches thick. All of this is supported by an imported subbase from six to 13 inches in thickness, depending on the character of underlying soil.

Spud Growers Watch Study

An official of the Klamath Potato Growers Association said that local growers would be interested in the results of a study the Kern County (California) Potato Growers Association plans to make on the spread between the producer's price for potatoes and the retail price.

Based on the concern expressed at meetings of the association, I feel that the growers here would be very interested in the outcome of this study," Walt Jendrzewski, secretary of the local association, said today.

The Kern County study will include the activities of transporters, brokers, jobbers, commission houses, wholesalers and retailers. The California group announced plans for the study last Monday. It said that members are "vitaly concerned with the question of certain abnormal price spreads in the distribution of their product to the consumer." The agency said that in some cases "the consumer pays a high price for our product while growers receive less than the cost of production."

Jendrzewski said that local growers have been concerned about this problem "for some time," but that the local association has no plans for any special study at this time.

The Kern County group said that it had been informed that Kern County Long White potatoes will be among the commodities included in the federal government's price spread study in 1956.
