Dodgers Climb To Lead In 5th Game

NEW YORK—The Dodgers used three circuit clouts—two by Duke Snider—coupled with the magnificent relief pitching of lanky Clem Labine to down the hapless Yankees 5 to 3, and take a 3-2 lead in the seesaw 1955 World Series.

The two homers by Snider and a two run circuit by Sandy Amoros offset the homers by pinch-hitting Bob Cerv and Yogi Berra and lifted the driving Brooklyn team into the happy position of being within one game of the first world championship in their history.

A cheering, noisy partisan crowd of 36,796 fans at Ebbets Field—largest crowd ever to attend a contest in Brooklyn—saw the home team make good use of the long ball.

The Dodgers were in the process of masterfully rewriting the history of the diamond. The records show that no team in the history of the seven-game series that had dropped the first two games has managed to come back to take the big payoff.

The Bums, shortenders in seven previous fall classics, dropped the first two games of this one at Yankee Stadium. Sunday's victory was their third in a row at their own park, a place ironically enough, they want to vacate.

Yankee pitcher Bob Grim, a Brooklynite in Yankee clothing, was the unfortunate that Amoros and Snider belted their homers from.

Amoros, a pint-sized Cuban who has difficulty speaking English, banged a two-run homer off Grim in the second inning and then proceeded to strike out in his next three appearances.

The mighty Duke led off the third and fifth innings with sky-scraping blasts over the right field screen and, in addition to supplying the victory margin for the second straight day, the powerful center fielder made a few alterations in the record books.

Unbeaten Army, Michigan Clash On Saturday: Buckeye Upset Surprise

There'll likely be some changes in the positions of the nation's top 10 college football teams this week but it's almost a lead pipe cinch that two of the honored group will clash head-on at Ann Arbor Saturday when the unbeaten forces of Army and Michigan come to grips.

It'll be the only game bringing together members of the top 10 on the basis of last week's rankings. And there was nothing in last Saturday's results, except for the 8-0 beating handed eighth-ranked Ohio State by Stanford, that indicated there'll be any great shifting.

The Buckeyes, however, could see their lead eroded because of their defeat by the unheralded Indians. The game still was the talk of the gridiron world today as most of the nation's major teams prepared to settle down to races in their respective conferences.

Stanford held All America Hopalong Cassidy to 37 yards rushing and made a touchdown at the end of a 72-yard drive the first time they gained possession of the ball. Michigan, ranked second behind Maryland, just managed to squeak past Michigan State 14-7 after romping over Missouri in its opening encounter. But the Wolverines figure to give the backfield-weakened Cadets the test that Penn State failed to furnish. Army, an easy opening game winner over Furman and then ranked sixth, breezed past the Nittany Lions 35-6.

Georgia Tech, No. 3 and probably the class of the South, breezed past Southern Methodist 20-0 in its opening encounter. Notre Dame blanketed Indiana 19-0 with quarterback Paul Hornung running 33 yards for one touchdown and pitching seven to sophomore end Dick Predergast for another. The Irish ranked fourth.

Oklahoma (No. 5) made its 21 straight victory over Missouri back Pitt 26-14. UCLA (No. 7), beaten the previous week by Maryland, took it out on Washington State 55-0. Southern California (No. 9) downed Texas 19-7 Friday night and Texas Christian (No. 10) made a strong bid for Southeastern Conference honors with a 26-0 decision over Arkansas' defending Razorbacks.

Besides Stanford's triumph, the only other game that resembled an upset was Clemson's 26-7 walloping of Georgia. Not since 1914 had the Tigers beaten the Bulldogs.

Navy remained an Eastern power with a 26-0 blanketing of South Carolina.

Indians Highlight PCC Play

Stanford's Indians, already authors of one of the better upsets of the young season, carry the Pacific Coast Conference football torch into Big Ten territory this week in the highlight game of another full schedule.

The Indians, who bewildered the Buckeyes of Saturday with a 6-0 victory on Saturday, fly to East Lansing, Mich., to take on surprising Michigan State in the top intercollegiate tilt. The Spartans put up a tough fight before bowing to mighty Michigan, 14-7.

Three conference contests and a pair of non-league outings complete the weekend PCC slate.

UCLA's Bruins, rebounding sensationally from their defeat by Maryland a week ago with a 55-0 pasting of woeful Washington State, entertain Oregon State Friday night at Los Angeles. The Beavers had an open date Saturday.

Two unbeaten teams, Southern California and Washington, collide at Seattle in the feature game of the PCC card. The Trojans, who opened with a pair of conference triumphs, lamed Texas, 19-7, in an intercollegiate last week. The hungry Huskies, surprise team of the loop, trimmed Oregon, 19-7 on the heels of their Minnesota crusher.

The third PCC clash, despite its early date, might decide last place in the conference. Neither California, 27-7 winner over puncheonless Pennsylvania, nor Washington State is going anywhere and the loser at Berkeley is almost a cinch for the cellar.

In non-conference billing, Oregon hosts Colorado of the Big Seven at Eugene, and Idaho, loser by 47-14 to Arizona, entertains independent College of the Pacific, 27-13 winner over Cincinnati, at Moscow.

Pro Grid Stars In Limelight

Led by a couple of yearlings, the frisky Baltimore Colts are kicking up their heels in the National Football League.

The youngsters, Alan Ameche and George Shaw, have accounted for all the Baltimore touchdowns in a surprising season in which the Colts find themselves in a three-way tie for the lead in the NFL's Western Conference after whipping Detroit 28-13 over the weekend.

The Colts, like the Green Bay Packers and Los Angeles Rams, have 2-0 records, and the Colts meet the Packers Saturday night in the best game on the NFL card.

Green Bay kept pace by shellingacking the Chicago Bears Sunday 24-7, while the Rams cut it as close as humanly possible with a 27-26 victory over Pittsburgh, achieved on Les Richter's 33-yard field goal just as the gun sounded.

Washington, another surprise package, leads the Eastern Conference with a 2-0 mark after its wildly-exciting 31-30 squeaker over Philadelphia Saturday night. In other games Sunday, Cleveland's powerful Browns crushed back after an opening loss to San Francisco 38-3 and the Chicago Cardinals upended New York 28-17.

A record crowd of 40,000 watched in awe at Baltimore as the Colts manhandled the Lions, after all, the team had won only three games a year since coming back into the league in 1953. And these were the mighty Detroit Lions, whom they'd never beaten.

But Ameche and Shaw were not in the league during the past two seasons, and apparently they were too busy playing college ball — or studying — to read about the Lions' prowess.

In any event, Ameche bowled two yards through the line for one touchdown and added another on a 52-yard gallop.

Rookies Of Year Told By Scribes

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Bill Virdon, St. Louis Cardinal outfielder, and Herb Score, southpaw pitcher of the Cleveland Indians, are the major league's Rookies of the Year named by The Sporting News after a poll of sports writers.

Virdon, 24, received 57 votes of 92 cast in the National League while the 27-year-old Score polled 71 of 103 in the American League, the national baseball weekly reported Saturday.

Score set a new strikeout record for a rookie with 244 to top the old mark of 227 set in 1911 by Grover Cleveland Alexander. Virdon had a .381 batting mark with 13 doubles six triples and 17 homers.
