

Medics Reveal Palsy Clues

CHICAGO (UP)—A possible clue to the cause of some types of epilepsy, cerebral palsy, spastic paralysis and febrile convulsions was reported today by a team of University of Illinois researchers.

Dr. Frederic A. Gibbs and two colleagues said new findings with a "brain wave" machine suggest the possibility that certain neurological disorders of unknown cause may be late results of common virus infections of childhood, such as measles, mumps and whooping cough. They reported to the 24th annual meeting of the American Academy of Pediatrics.

The new studies "re-emphasize the need for finding improved preventive measures for common viral infections of childhood," Dr. Gibbs told a reporter, adding:

"Some important advances already have been made. And recent advances in the prevention of polio justify hope that prevention in the whole field of viral diseases will eventually be greatly improved."

The researchers said they had found evidence that encephalitis, or brain infection, commonly occurs in "supposedly uncomplicated cases" of measles and other prevalent virus infections of childhood.

The evidence showed up, they said, in "brain wave" machine studies of 700 children at Chicago's Municipal Contagious Disease Hospital.

They said that "fortunately" the number of cases in which the brain infection persists is small. But they added that in such persistent cases, convulsive seizures and neurological defects may show up several years or more after the child has recovered from his measles or other childhood virus disease.

In their report—made at a scientific exhibit at the academy meeting—the researchers said:

"By studying different types of virus infection and working with the youngest age groups it may be possible to pin the blame for some types of epilepsy, cerebral palsy, spastic paralysis and febrile convulsions on virus infections."

They said the "brain wave" machine offers a valuable aid to such work because, for one thing, "It makes the cerebral disorder evident, even when it is in a clinically silent phase."

Judge Cites S.F. Newsman For Contempt Of Court

SANTA ROSA (UP)—The San Francisco Chronicle said today it is confident that one of its reporters will be "ultimately vindicated" for refusing to disclose the source of a story he wrote on Aug. 14 about the Sebastopol apple strike.

The reporter, Jack Howard, 31, "respectfully declined" yesterday to disclose his source in the Sonoma County courtroom of Superior Judge Charles J. McGoldrick.

Howard involved a 20-year-old state law holding that a reporter cannot be held in contempt for refusing to disclose the source of any information procured for publication and published in a newspaper. McGoldrick ruled that the statute did not hold in this particular case and ordered Howard to answer. When Howard refused, he ordered him jailed for contempt.

Chronicle attorney John E. Schaeffer obtained a writ of habeas corpus from the Third District Court of Appeal in Sacramento. Howard was freed three hours after he was jailed on \$100 bail. He was ordered to appear in court Oct. 21 for a hearing.

In his dispatch, Howard told of a special meeting of the strikers, which had been addressed by Peter Andrade, a leader of the AFL Teamsters Union. Howard reported that Andrade had said the union would observe a court order to refrain from ordering its members not to handle "hot cargo."

Then he quoted Andrade as saying: "But as individual American citizens, anyone has the right to refuse to handle hot apples. And we're telling this to all union members in the west."

The California Association of Employers, representing the 11 struck canneries, tried to get this remark into the official record to back its arguments for a permanent restraining order against the union. It wanted to show that the union is violating the intent of the court order.
