Hotel Tenant Dies In Fire

SAN FRANCISCO (U)—A four-alarm fire called "of arson origin" caused the death of one man and injury to several tenants Tuesday at the Polk Hotel at Polk and Turk Streets.

The victim was not identified. He suffocated on the top floor of the five-story building. Lt. George Kelley of the arson squad said the fire was definitely "of arson origin." He said the fire, which did an estimated \$275,000 damage and routed 36 tenants into the streets in their night clothes, started in the lobby. A can found in the lobby has been sent to the laboratory for analysis.

Fire Consumes Langell Hay

LANGELL VALLEY—A stack containing 200 tons of baled hay owned by Louis Randall on the farm he operates under lease from W. D. Campbell, was destroyed by fire Monday afternoon. Mrs. Randall discovered the blaze about 1 p.m. and called for help. Neighbors responded immediately and were able to haul away about 30 tons of hay before the wind changed, turning the fire back into the stack and preventing further salvage. Hunters in the area came and helped and two fire departments, the Bonanza volunteers and the Klamath Falls Suburban Fire Department, responded. The suburban department sent the Klamath County truck with Raymond LaMarche in charge and it remained until this morning. Irrigation water had not been turned off and the sprinkling system could be diverted as well as water from the irrigation ditch through the farmyard used by the fire trucks.

The nearby granary which was full of oats was undamaged. Residential buildings were across the road and beyond the fire danger. The hay, most of it first cutting, was valued at approximately \$8,000 and was partially covered by insurance, Randall said.
