Apartment Fire Takes Four Lives

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — A wind-whipped fire that jumped from an unfinished apartment building to two west end rooming houses killed at least four persons here shortly after dawn Tuesday.

Coroner Glen McDonald said the bodies of the four were found on the top floor of a rooming house which was occupied mostly by elderly people. The victims were unidentified.

The blaze occurred in a heavily populated district. Early and unofficial estimates of damage ran to \$200,000 or more. It took firemen more than an hour to bring the fire under control.

Many of the rooming house occupants fled to the street in their night clothes.

Four Testify For Tom Bayes

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — Four former prisoners of war testified on behalf of Cpl. Thomas Bayes Jr., 32, yesterday during his court martial of charges of collaborating with the enemy while a POW in Korea.

Lloyd L. Roberts, 27, Minneapolis, who led off the defense case after three weeks of prosecution testimony, reiterated yesterday that he "did not remember" seeing Bayes make enemy propaganda recordings.

John R. Kirby, 25, former Marine from Pittsburgh, Pa., testified that he had never seen Bayes treated any differently than any other POW. The prosecution has attempted to prove Bayes cooperated with the enemy to get special treatment.

George T. Walden, 31, Tulsa, Okla., said he had never heard Bayes make disloyal statements, and Harry Felks, 23, Huntington, W.Va., said he had heard Bayes argue "for our side" with the Chinese.

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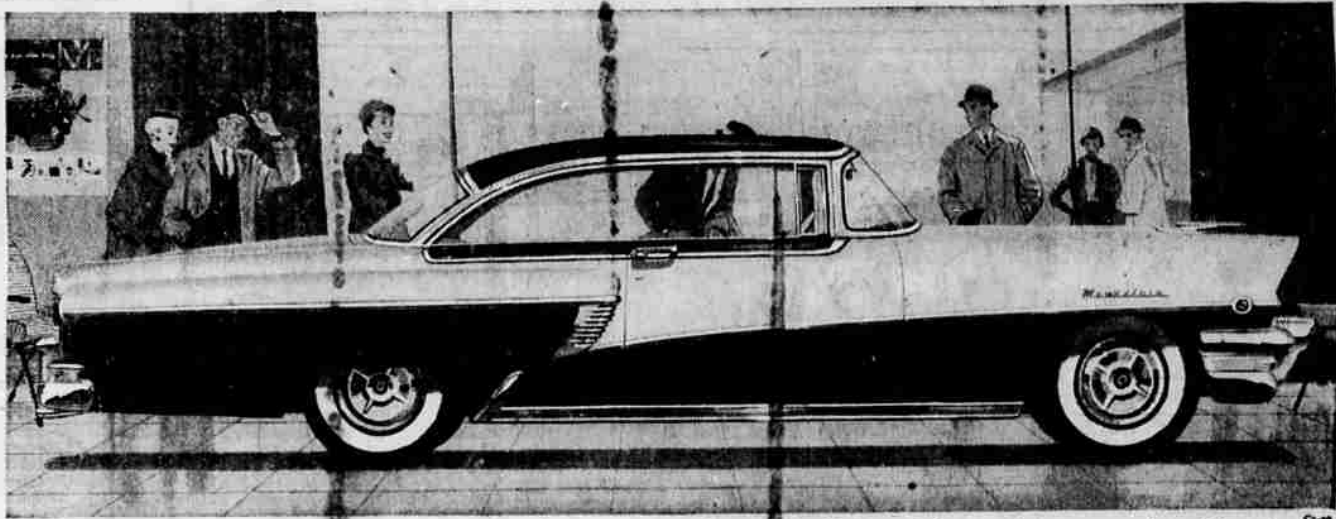
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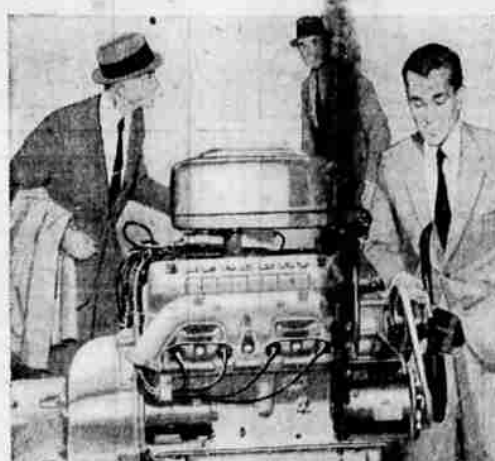
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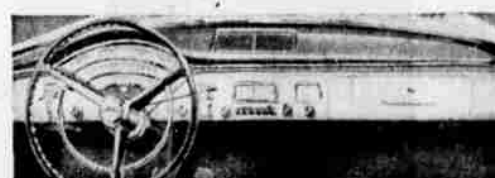
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23 Years Ago
