

Int-Sized Columbia Player Tops Offense

NEW YORK (UP)—Little Claude... he has netted 361 yards, picking up 129 yards last Saturday in 15 tries against Idaho. Jim Swink of Texas Christian, last week's leader, is second this week with 345 yards.

Joe Clements of Texas, last week's total offense and passing leader, has tumbled all the way to seventh and fifth, respectively. Clements, who suffered a head injury, was sidelined last Friday after only two plays against Southern California.

Pirates Capture Poll Lead

Gresham High knocked off Corvallis, last week's No. 1 team in the Associated Press high school football poll, and Marshfield of Coos Bay vaulted into the top spot in this week's voting.

Marshfield, with four straight wins, pulled its first place balloting from sports writers and broadcasters throughout the state. They gave the Pirates a point total of 184.

Gresham's tight win pushed it into third place—three first place votes, 147 points—just behind second-place South Salem, which pulled only two first place votes but had strong support for second on the list.

Pendleton pulled up a notch from fifth to fourth in the race for the state honors. Following in numerical order were Jefferson of Portland, Cottage Grove, Hillsboro, Central Catholic of Portland and Vale on the far eastern edge of the state.

Astoria dropped from the top 10 by taking a 20-0 licking from Central Catholic.

It was first show among the leaders for Central Catholic and the Vale team. The only 2-A rated team among the leaders, Vale, got there by consistent play. It has won 15 straight and its victories include one over 1-A Baker.

Also relegated to the ranks of the trailers was North Bend which dropped a 20-13 game to Coquille, another 2-A team.

Iverson has apparently recovered from a brain concussion suffered against Kansas two weeks ago. Gunnari suffered a "hip pointer" in yesterday's stiff offensive and defensive scrimmage as the Cougars prepared for their game with the California Golden Bears.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UP)—Coach Tommy Prothro of the Oregon State Beavers thinks his squad will break the Los Angeles Coliseum jinx when it tangles with the UCLA Bruins tomorrow night.

The Coliseum has a reputation for casting a sinister spell over teams of the Northern Division, but Prothro—former assistant to UCLA mentor Red Sanders—thinks he has it whipped.

EUGENE, Ore. (UP)—The University of Oregon Ducks plan to pass over Colorado's sturdy line when the two teams meet Saturday, according to Coach Len Casanova.

The early-season performances of Alan Ameche, George Shaw and several other rookies indicate 1955 may be a banner campaign for first year players in the National Football League.

Ameche, the All-America fullback from Wisconsin, and Shaw, last year's major college total offense champion at Oregon, made particularly successful debuts in the rugged pro circuit.

Shaw passed for three touchdowns and Ameche scored three by rushing to lead the Baltimore Colts to surprise triumphs over the Chicago Bears and Detroit Lions and first place in the Western Division. They scored or passed for all of Baltimore's six touchdowns in its first two starts.

Dick McCabe of the Pittsburgh Steelers, Ralph Thomas of the Washington Redskins and Alex Webster of the New York Giants, Taylor, former Kansas State star, caught a touchdown pass during the Rams' opening day victory over the San Francisco Forty-Niners, Mann, from Oregon State, made a 65-yard scoring run to help the Cardinals defeat the New York Giants, Watkins, a former Ohio

Stanford Coach Says Sparts Tougher Foe

Stanford's Indians, who bolstered the Pacific Coast's faltering football prestige with an upset victory over Ohio State, are set for still another game against a Big Ten opponent.

Coach Chuck Taylor, ever an optimist, declared: "I think we can beat Michigan State Saturday by playing one of our real fine games."

Taylor, who says he expects Michigan State to be tougher than the Buckeyes, refused this time to predict this week's strategy. Michigan State lost last week to Michigan, 14-7.

Six Pacific Coast Conference teams will be playing within their league this weekend: Washington State at California, Oregon State at UCLA, and Southern California at Washington.

In addition, Oregon will entertain Colorado and Idaho will play College of the Pacific, another non-conference team.

Coach Red Sanders at UCLA drilled the Bruins on defense against a spread formation he expects Oregon State to use Friday night. Tommy Prothro, a former aide to Sanders, coaches Oregon State in a Sanders-like single wing, and Sanders says he is "looking forward to the game."

Sooner Back Named Week's Leader By AP

One of the principal reasons why Oklahoma was able to whip Pittsburgh and keep football's longest winning streak going is through its 31st game last Saturday was halfback Tommy McDonald.

Tommy scored two touchdowns on runs of 49 and nine yards, raced 23 yards on a key play in another Sooner scoring drive and racked up an impressive 124 yards by rushing as Oklahoma turned back the big Eastern team 26-14. In addition he hit two of five passes for 39 yards.

In recognition of this fine all-around performance, the nation's sports writers and broadcasters participating in the weekly Associated Press poll Thursday picked McDonald as the season's first Back of the Week.

The experts had named Wisconsin's pass-catching end, Dave Howard, as Lineman of the Week against Iowa.

McDonald earned the designation by the narrowest of margins over a trio of brilliant pass-pitching quarterbacks, Clemson's Don King, Navy's George Welsh and Maryland's Frank Tamburello.

The sharpshooting quarterbacks generally claimed most of the attention in the Back of the Week balloting. Big Paul Hornung of Notre Dame, Len Dawson of Purdue and Fred Wyant of West Virginia all received considerable backing. Others nominated were Wade Mitchell and Tippy Vann, George Tech; Frank Pajackowski, Richmond; Bob Pascal, Duke; Pat Uebel, Army; Lenny Moore, Penn State; Jerry Gustafson and Bill Tarr, Stanford; and Bob Davenport, UCLA.

Webster, former North Carolina State back who played Canadian pro football in 1954, scored a touchdown against the Cardinals and has been about the only bright spot during New York's two losses.

Ed Bernet, another Steeler's rookie from Southern Methodist, made a promising pro start when he caught eight passes during his team's opening game triumph over the Cardinals.
