Bonn Leaders Hear Report

BONN, Germany (AP)—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer reported to his Cabinet today on his discussions in Luxembourg with French Premier Edgar Faure.

The 73-year-old Chancellor and Faure took a cautious step toward saving the project to "Europeanize" the rich Saar territory by pledging that it must continue to enjoy full political freedom if it agrees to become a European territory.

The 860,000 German-speaking Saarlanders vote on "Europeanization" in a plebiscite Oct. 23.

There had been speculation that Adenauer and Faure would issue a joint appeal to the Saarlanders to approve the Europeanization statute. Adenauer once before issued a similar appeal but it did not budge the pro-German parties in the Saar from their fierce campaign to kill off Europeanization.

Apparently Faure and French Foreign Minister Antoine Pinay favored a new appeal signed by the leaders of the two governments. Reports from Luxembourg said Adenauer declined to sign. The result was the statement that the Saar Europeanization plan forms a part of a French-German understanding and pro-European policies.

DUNSMUIR—About 100 educators are expected in Dunsmuir for the weekend of October 8-9 to attend the annual conference of the California Association of Secondary School Administrators, region two. The sessions will be under the direction of Loren Wann, superintendent of Paradise Unified School District and regional director of the association.

"The Administrator and His Public Relations" will be the theme of the meeting. Deans of girls and school nurses will also attend the conference.

Judge Issues Speed Warning

DUNSMUIR—A warning to speeders was issued by Judge A. A. Smith of the Dunsmuir Judicial District, advising the speed zones in North Dunsmuir would be more rigidly patrolled and speeders more heavily penalized.

Too many motorists are using the new freeway as a speedway, Judge Smith said, despite clearly marked zones of 35 and 25 miles per hour. Pedestrians are complaining they cannot cross the highway safely within the town itself because motorists fail to slow down while approaching the densely populated area.

Judge Smith says he hopes rigid enforcement will avoid a serious accident.

Milk Cost Cut In Dunsmuir

DUNSMUIR—A reduction in the price of milk cards has been made possible at the Dunsmuir Elementary School through the efforts of the State Dairy Industry Advisory Board. The school has notified parents that the new price is five cents per half pint of milk, a reduction of one cent over the previous price. Milk cards good for 20½ pints of milk are now being sold for \$1.

A milk dispensing machine has been installed in the auditorium building to make milk available to junior high students. The dispenser keeps the milk refrigerated until ready for use and the fact that it is coin operated is expected to relieve teachers of the upper grades of bookkeeping duties.

Dunsmuir Check Case Continued

DUNSMUIR—Harold A. Weir, 50, of Kinston, was being held Tuesday in the Dunsmuir jail pending investigation of suspicion of complicity in a bad check case. His companion, John Earl McCulley, 55, also of Kinston, was being held in the Mount Shasta jail on the charge of issuing a bad check.

Both had been found guilty of defrauding an unkeeper in Dunsmuir judicial court on Monday on the basis of a complaint signed by Alex Kalugorovich, manager of the Traveler's Hotel. They were fined \$10 each on this charge.

Faure Fires Four Guallist Members

PARIS (AP)—Angered by their outspoken opposition to his North African policy, French Premier Edgar Faure fired four followers of Gen. Charles de Gaulle from his Cabinet today.

A fifth minister from the Gaullist Social Republican party, Public Works Minister Edward Corniglion-Molinier, remained in the Cabinet. Gen. Pierre Koenig, the defense minister, led the dissidents Faure kicked out.

Harvest Festival Plans Announced

DUNSMUIR—Plans for a "Harvest Festival" were made by the Merchant's Association of the Dunsmuir Chamber of Commerce meeting on Monday night at the Hotel Dunsmuir. Pennants in fall colors will be used by the participating merchants in decorating their stores and street decorations will also be used.

Mrs. Marie Glover, Charles Clements and Vic Petrovics were named to serve on a promotion committee for this event which will be held October 10th through 15th.

Congress Sets Navy Hearing

WASHINGTON (AP)—A House Government Operations subcommittee has set Oct. 24 for the opening of a hearing to "establish responsibilities" for the purchase of jet fighters which the Navy found underpowered for carrier service.

Chairman Holtfield (D-Calif.), announcing the hearings yesterday, told Secretary of the Navy Thomas "the best interests of the Navy and the public would be served by laying out the 'relevant facts.'" Thomas has blamed the difficulties with the F3H Demons on "inadequate" procurement procedures in effect under the previous administration.

The Senate Preparedness subcommittee announced sometime ago it was sending investigators to the St. Louis plant of the McDonnell Aircraft Co., which produced the fighters.

The Navy said tests showed the first 60 Demons produced did not have enough engine power for their weight. Several crashed, others were refitted with new engines and some were assigned to land bases.

Senate Opens Red Hearings

CHICAGO (UP)—A Senate subcommittee today opened hearings on Communist propaganda, including sex "girlie" magazines, which is flowing into the United States from behind the Iron Curtain.

Subcommittee investigators said Chicago is apparently one of the chief distribution points for the propaganda, which has found its way into colleges, universities and public libraries.

The hearings were to be conducted by Sen. William E. Jenner (R-Ind) and witnesses were to include customs and post office experts and officials of five foreign language newspapers in Chicago.

The newspaper officials were called to determine whether any foreign language publications here are parroting the Communist line, subcommittee investigators said.

Frank W. Schroeder, the subcommittee's chief investigator, said batches of glossy publications depicting "the milk and honey land of the Soviets" would be placed before the hearing.

Many of these publications place a strong emphasis on sex and shapely, scantily dressed girls, he said.

Others, Schroeder said, are devoted to farming, sports, science, Russian life, and Russian industries.

Previous hearings in New Orleans, New York, and Washington "have shown that millions of pieces of Communist propaganda are being distributed throughout the United States and that Chicago is one of the main distribution points," Schroeder said.

Federal law requires that such Communist propaganda be labeled as such, Schroeder said. But he said the propaganda turned up by investigators so far bears no such label.

The purpose of the hearings is to determine whether the Foreign Propaganda Act of 1950 should be revised or amended to deal with such propaganda, Schroeder said.
