Water Committee Hears Witnesses

SAN JOSE (UP) — An interim committee of the Legislature planned to hear testimony today from Rep. Charles Gubser, Gilroy Republican, on water shortage affecting three counties.

The committee, headed by Assemblyman Harold K. Levering (R-Los Angeles), is gathering evidence of a shortage of water in Santa Clara, San Benito and Southern Alameda counties.

Other witnesses scheduled to be heard today, besides Gubser, include former Rep. Jack Anderson of San Benito County, sponsor of a tri-county water authority program, and state and federal officials.

ASC Prepares Potato Plans

The Klamath County ASC office is prepared now to take applications for livestock feed diversion of potatoes.

Applications are forwarded to the state ASC office in Portland for issuance of 30-day diversion authorization. The applications must be accompanied by a surety bond. Copies of instructions and forms required are available to growers and feeders at the Klamath County ASC office located in the Tower Theater.

Claims for diversion payments are to be made on a special form on which a Federal-State Inspector certifies quantity of potatoes meeting specifications and on which he certifies that the potatoes have been chopped, crushed or sliced. Potatoes over two inches in diameter which grade U.S. No. 3 or better are eligible for a diversion payment of 50 cents per cwt. The payment rate is reduced to 40 cents per cwt. on January 1, 1956, and to 30 cents per cwt. on April 1, 1956.

Participants are cautioned that no payments will be made in connection with potatoes diverted prior to approval of their application or in the absence of an inspector. Applications for diversion should be made several days in advance of anticipated diversion.

Slavs Report U.S. Wheat Shipments

BEIGRADE, Yugoslavia (UP) — The Yugoslav government says the United States is going to ship it 300,000 tons of American surplus wheat.

The government's Weekly Economic Review said last night the wheat agreement was reached during the recent visit of Robert Murphy, U.S. deputy undersecretary of state. The Review added that Murphy assured the Yugoslavs they would get considerable quantities of other American surplus farm products.

President Tito's government was reported especially interested in importing cotton.
