Claims U.S. Will Keep "On Alert"

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles called on Russia Monday to accept President Eisenhower's military blueprint exchange and aerial inspection plan so the world can move toward disarmament and peace.

Dulles outlined the United States' position on disarmament a little more than two weeks before the opening of his talks with the Russian, British and French foreign ministers Oct. 27 at Geneva.

It was at the recent summit conference at Geneva that Eisenhower made his proposal to exchange blueprints and to allow the Soviet Union to fly planes over the United States on a reciprocal basis.
