

College Football Hopefuls Fading

The show is just starting, folks, but for most of the nation's college football teams it ended almost before it began.

Perhaps eight teams still were in the running for the mythical national championship today with the season only one third completed. This is the earliest mass exodus from contention in years.

For the likes of Army and UCLA, disappointment came early. Both were rated potential champions before the season started but now they're in the back seat. UCLA still can win the Pacific Coast Conference title and play in the Rose Bowl, of course, but it is eliminated from consideration for the national crown because of its defeat by Maryland two weeks ago.

The big boy on the Coast right now is Washington, which has won four games without a defeat, in-

WSC Breaks Even With Bears 20-20

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Washington State College made the break pay off but had to settle for a 20-20 tie with California's Golden Bears in a Pacific Coast Conference football thriller here Saturday.

After losing three straight, the Cougars finally found the form that earned them a pre-season ranking of conference dark horse and fought the Bears on even terms from whistle to whistle.

California came from behind to tie the game with a fourth down pass that set up a touchdown in the closing minutes. Johnny Wilson, who scored one of the Bears' earlier counters, slanted off tackle from the 9 to deaden the store.

Arnie Pellier opened the scoring for the Cougars on a 41-yard pass from Bob Iverson in the first period. Bill Kramer and Dennis Rath added tallies on short plunges in the last half. Frank Sarno kicked two conversions.

Fumbles and penalties marred the game, played before 33,000 in Memorial Stadium.

While California held the edge in statistics, miscues cost them scoring chances. The bears gained 124 yards, rushing to 68 for Washington State and collected 22 yards passing on 15 completions on 26 tries. Washington State gained 139 yards on four completed passes in 12 attempts.

Otto Graham Pulls Game Out Of Fire For Browns

The champion Cleveland Browns, who are finding it tough going in the National Football League this season, can be mightily thankful for their powers of persuasion that enticed Otto Graham out of retirement for another year.

Graham, who had planned to retire this year after leading the Browns to nine straight division titles, sparked an 87-yard touch-

down march in the final minutes yesterday to defeat Philadelphia's tattered Eagles 21-17.

The victory gave Cleveland a 2-1 record and raised them to a four-way tie for first place in the Eastern Division with Washington, Pittsburgh and the surprising Chicago Cardinals.

In a radical shift of the balance of power in the Western Division, Los Angeles shares the lead with the frisky Baltimore Colts by virtue of a 17-10 decision over the winless Detroit Lions. The defending Western titlist now occupy the cellar with the Chicago Bears.

Baltimore defeated Green Bay's Packers 24-20 Saturday night and, like the Rams, sports a spotless 3-0 record.

In yesterday's other action, the Pittsburgh Steelers handed the disappointing New York Giants their third straight defeat 30-23. The San Francisco 49ers scored a 20-19 triumph over the Bears, and the Cardinals hung a 24-10 defeat on the Redskins, their first.

With the Browns trailing 17-14 on their own 13-yard line and 4 minutes and 13 seconds left, Graham gambled on a fourth-down pass and his end Dante Lavelli gave the Browns the winning touchdown. Graham also accounted for the other Cleveland touchdowns, scoring one and passing for the other.

In Sunday night contests, Buffalo nipped Springfield, 2-2, and Cleveland walloped Providence, 5-3.

Ken Hayden's goal at 7:30 of the final period produced the Browns' victory over Springfield. Other Buffalo goals were turned in by Enio Schlissel and Lou Jankowski, while Harry Pridemore and Bud Schinkel scored for the Indians.

At Cleveland, Joe Lind scored for the Barons to break a 2-2 tie in the second period, while Billy Ford and Cal Stearns added third period goals to wreck Providence.

Washington Grabs Breaks To Romp Over South Cal, Move Up In Poll Figures

SEATTLE (AP) — There has been a lot of football talk in recent years about giving the game back to the kids.

Last Saturday in the University of Washington Stadium the kids reached out and took it.

And Monday the Washington Huskies were tall in the Pacific Coast Conference saddle because a play that wasn't planned went for 80 yards, a touchdown, a 7-0 victory over Southern California and first place in the standings.

The break came like a stroke of lightning out of the dripping skies. For 53 minutes and 54 seconds two big and brilliant lines had dominated the play, bottling the enemy backs and gunning down enemy passers.

Freddie Robinson, Washington tackle and captain for the day, was a panther in moleskins. On both sides of him the Husky line was a wall, and neither rain nor Southern California could quench their fire.

Notre Dame, of course, now is very much in contention. Its 14-0 victory over Miami — a team that had been pointing for the game for two seasons — proved that. And quarterback Paul Hornung can handle himself with the best.

Oklahoma ran its winning streak to 22 games Saturday by downing Texas 20-0. The Sooners have left their toughest foes behind.

Maryland, No. 1 in the Associated Press poll, and Duke, the two behemoths of the Atlantic Coast Conference, don't meet. Both would like to get to the Orange Bowl New Year's Day, and if they both go undefeated, the conference will select the team by vote. Maryland probably would get the bid since Duke played there last Jan. 1.

The Terps won their fourth straight by smothering Wake Forest 28-7, while Duke clubbed William and Mary 47-7. Maryland tangles with North Carolina this week. Duke has a tangle in Ohio State. The Buckeyes walloped Illinois 27-12.

Georgia Tech, the class of the Southeastern Conference, had its troubles eking out a 7-0 victory over Louisiana Tech. Its big test will come two weeks hence against Duke.

Howie Fox, Ex-Pitcher, Stabbed To Death In Brawl At Texas Tavern

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) — Howie Fox, who pitched for three major league baseball clubs, was stabbed to death after he ejected three young men from his tavern in the early morning hours yesterday.

Two college students and another man were booked by police. Charges were being prepared today. Witnesses said Fox was stabbed three times in front of his tavern and died crawling toward the door.

His bartender Hubert Callahan, 40, was critically slashed. Booked for investigation of murder were John J. Strickland, 20, a San Antonio College student, booked as material witnesses were Jack G. Allen, 21, also a student at the college, and Mark Beloit, 27.

Strickland had a severe cut over his right eye, caused, he told police, when he was struck by Fox with what looked to him like a miniature baseball bat.

All three made statements to police. Officers pieced together this story:

After the fight in front of the tavern, Strickland's companions took him to City-County Hospital, where several stitches were taken above the eye. Then he went to a downtown hotel.

Late in the day, he left and police found bloody clothing in the room. Strickland then returned with his companions and a hotel clerk told them they were wanted by police. They went to the city jail.

The 6-foot-3, 195-pound hurler pitched for Cincinnati in 1944 through 1946 and again from 1948 through 1951. He was with the Philadelphia Phillies in 1952 and the Baltimore Orioles in 1954. The past season he pitched for the San Antonio Mission, a Baltimore farm club, and had three wins in eight assignments. His best year was 1950 when he won 11 and lost 2.

Fox was a native of Coburg, Ore., and broke into organized baseball with Ogden, Utah, of the Pioneer League in 1943. He also played for Birmingham of the Southern League in 1947 and 1948 and with Syracuse of the International League in 1947. He was a World War II veteran.

Babe Back Again Following Surgery

TAMPA, Fla. (UP) — Babe Didrikson Zaharias is "back in there swingin'" today — only three months after her second cancer operation.

Mrs. Zaharias, felled twice by cancer in the last two years, served dramatic notice Sunday that she intends another comeback when she slipped out of her house to play nine rounds of golf. The Babe crossed the street from her house to the course with Betty Dodd of Atlanta, Ga., and looked surprisingly like her old self.

"I set out to play three or four holes at the most," Mrs. Zaharias said. "But I got feeling pretty good and was playing well, so I went on."
