Vet Trainee Jobs Open

A civil service examination for veterinarian trainee has been announced for filling positions paying \$3,970 a year. Jobs to be filled are with the Agricultural Research Service of the Department of Agriculture and are located throughout the United States.

Appointments to these trainee positions will be made to junior agents of veterinary medicine for on-the-job training during their summer vacation period. When the student trainee is graduated from a veterinary college, he will be eligible for a position with the Agricultural Research Service as veterinarian, \$4,390 a year.

To qualify, applicants must have completed four years of veterinary medicine, one year of which may have been in pre-veterinary medicine. Competitors will also be required to take a written test.

Applications must be filed not later than November 1, 1955, with the executive secretary, Board of Civil Service Examiners, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington 25, D.C.

Further information and application forms may be obtained from post offices throughout the country or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D.C.

Lassen Road Bids Opened

ALTAMONT — The California Division of Highways has opened bids on a three and one-half mile section of highway between Madeline and Lassen in Lassen County. It is officially designated as extending from Sagehen Summit to Dry Creek.

Harris Brothers of Sacramento submitted the low bid of \$201,993.30. This section begins about four miles north of Madeline and covers the gap between two sections built in 1929.

At that time, some funds became available for construction of highways through public lands. The amount was not large, but the highway commission allotted it to Lassen County and constructed three short sections north of Madeline, thus eliminating sections of inferior alignment and four railroad grade crossings.

The present project closes a gap which existed in the previous improvement and was omitted because funds were not available for construction.

The proposed location of the new section is more direct and lies generally to the east of the existing highway. The improvement will consist of a plant mixed surface 32 feet in width to provide two 12-foot traffic lanes with four-foot shoulders.

Under this is untreated base material six inches thick. All of this is supported by an imported sub-base from six to 15 inches in thickness, depending upon the character of the underlying soil. Character of the underlying soil, expressed, considerable satisfaction that this link connecting previous construction is finally getting underway.

This project was not included in the current budget, but will be built from funds accrued through bids falling below estimates from which the highway commission was able to make an allotment for the construction.

WEED — The rummage sale sponsored by the Weed PTA, was the biggest and most successful of any sale previously held in Weed by the local unit.

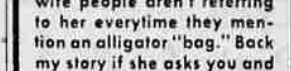
The total sale dividends amounted well over the previous years and with the aid of the membership drive now in progress the budgeted program for the year will be guaranteed.

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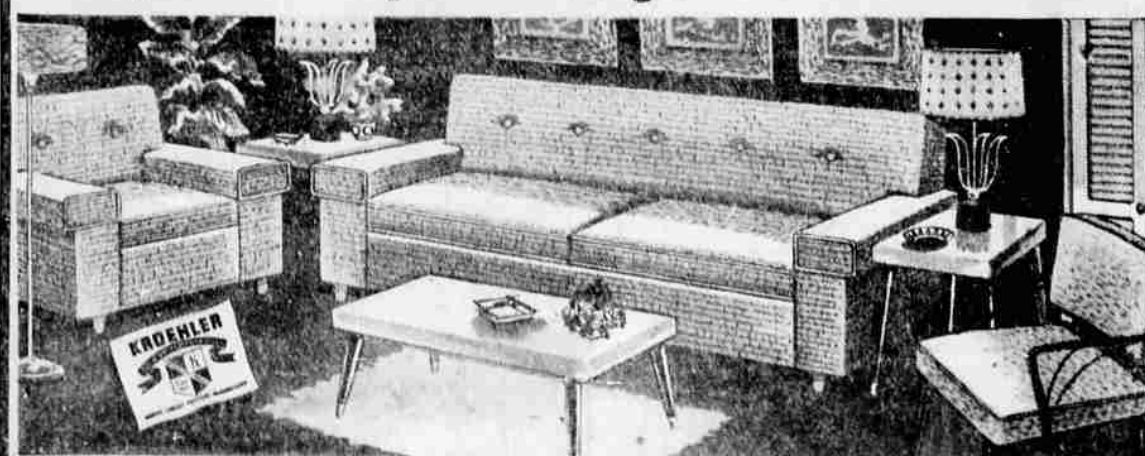
