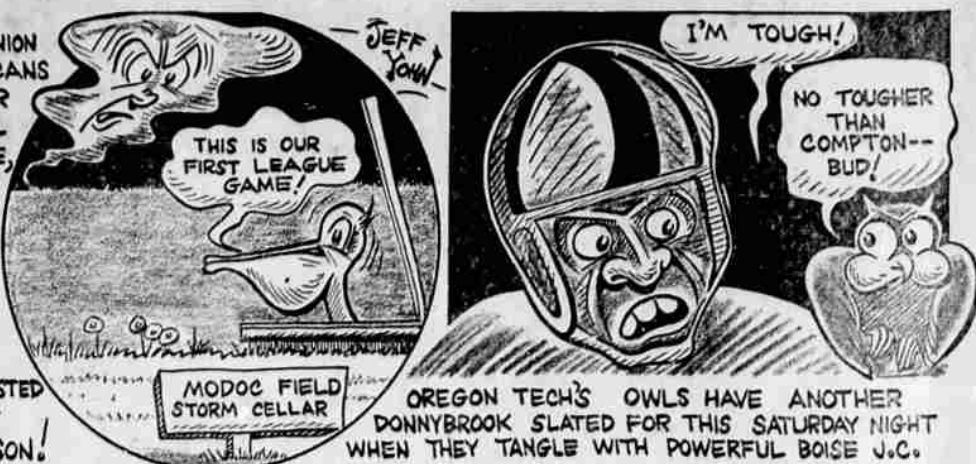

Medford, Boise Next For Pels, Owls

Medford's Black Tornadoes and the high flying Boise Junior College Broncos will invade Klamath Falls this weekend for Friday and Saturday night clashes with the Klamath Union High School Pelicans and the Oregon Tech Owls.

Friday evening at the Modoc Field turf, the Tornadoes will meet the on-again, off-again Pelicans in the opener of the Southern Oregon Conference football race, and what is expected to be another rockum-sockum traditional meeting between the two schools.

In the second half of the week-end's twin-bill of football excitement, the winless Owls from the Mile High Campus draw another of the nation's leading junior college teams when they go against the battling Broncos from Boise. In last week's Williamson rating system, Boise was listed number six.

Coach John McGinnis' Whitebirds will be striving to return to the victory which has been a hot and cold proposition so far this season, in hopes of making a bid for district honors. A loss to the Tornado grid machine this Friday evening would all but count the Pels out of the district race, even though they have other contests against Grants Pass and Ashland.

Not only will the conference standings be in the picture come Friday evening, but the traditional rivalry between the Medford and Klamath football squads has always been hot and heavy, and this year's battle is not expected to change.

Last year Medford blanked the Pels 13-0 and went on to represent the SOO in the state playoffs. The record for past Klamath-Medford meetings gives the Tornado teams an edge over the Pels 20 wins to eight, with four other games ending in ties. The series dates back to 1923 when Medford won the first scrap 20-6. Seventeen of the 20 losses suffered by Klamath teams, have been shutouts. The widest margin of a Medford win came in 1927 when the Tornado blew to a 98-0 triumph, while Klamath's big win came in 1943 when they rolled up a 40-7 victory.

Coach Fred Spiegleberg's Medford charges will be led by 18 returning lettermen including hard-running halfback Mike Hawkins and stellar lineman Monte Holst. The big loss the Tornado suffered by last spring's graduation was all-state back Alton Stone, but with Hawkins' ball carrying abilities and the signal-calling of quarterback Dick McLaughlin and Elterback Francis, the red and black football power of Southern Oregon

has again proven tough. So far this season Medford has a 3-1 record with wins over Cleveland of Portland, Roseburg and Grater. The loss and the deadlock suffered by the Tornadoes were in games with Gresham and Milwaukee, two of the topped ranked teams in the state prep circles.

Boise Junior College, always a top-drawer in past meetings with the Owls, will be another big-name opponent for the Mile High Owls.

Last week, Compton's Tartars blasted the Owls off Modoc Field with a 60-7 win, and the clash with Boise promises to be no "softie" for the Tech eleven.

The Broncos, who lost only one game last year, that a 7-6 tilt to Compton in the Polato Bowl game, will have 11 lettermen on hand when they take the field against the Owls Saturday evening. Joe Chuhua, a 214-pound center, and Lyle Cole, a 225-pound tackle will

lead the strong Boise line, while the backfield chores will be spearheaded by halfbacks Dale Chatterton and Ken Cluch, fullback George Korn and quarterback Ray Clayton.

Coach Lyle Smith is expected by Boise football followers to produce another representative team to equal last year's record of nine wins, one loss and one tie, that a 26-26 deadlock with Ricks. Besides the list of 11 lettermen, Smith has a flock of promising first-year men that will strengthen the Bronco picture.

This week's practice sessions for the Owls will be devoted mainly to defense against the multiple offense used by Boise and the passing game of their own. In the Compton game, Tech ground game was stopped cold, leaving the Owls at the mercy of the overpowering Tartars.

This will be the sixth meeting between the two schools, and in the series, Tech has yet to beat a Boise squad. In 1930 Boise won 53-6, and last year the Broncos walloped the Owls 35-7.

Irish Not Lions In Sight Of Midshipmen

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (UP)—Navy's unbeaten midshipmen have a football date with Penn State next weekend, but you can't blame them for looking ahead a few weeks to Notre Dame.

It has been 11 long years since Navy last beat the fighting Irish, who undoubtedly rate second only to Army as the Middles' big objective opponent. But Coach Eddie Erdelatz realizes the folly of looking past both Penn State and Pennsylvania if the academy is to achieve a perfect season and high national ranking.

"I don't have to tell the boys that shrugging off Penn State and Pennsylvania in anticipation of the game with Notre Dame would be suicide," Erdelatz said today. "They know it. They must take each game in stride—the way a good team always does."

Erdelatz whose teams have been beaten by Notre Dame in every one of his five years as head coach at Annapolis, believes this year's squad has not yet reached its peak, despite last Saturday's impressive 21-0 triumph over Pittsburgh.

Erdelatz is reluctant to single out any players chiefly responsible for Navy's success, but it is impossible to overlook the work of

quarterback George Welsh and end Ron Beagle.

Welsh, a 164-pound split-T master from Coaldale, Pa., calls plays with the instinct of a professional gambler and passes with the nonchalance of a man flicking away a cigarette. In three games, he has clicked on 25 out of 41 passes for 50 yards and three touchdowns, who undoubtedly rate second only to Army as the Middles' big objective opponent. Trabert Expected To Go Pro

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Amateur tennis champion Tony Trabert is expected to turn professional today.

Promoter Jack Kramer said the signing awaits only completion of attorneys' studies of the fine print in the contract and "I don't expect anything to hold up the deal."

Kramer expects not only to bring Trabert, the U. S. and Wimbledon champion, into the pro ranks but also the Australian Davis Cup ace, Lewis Hoad and Ken Rosewall. Signing this trio, rated as the world's three best amateurs, would constitute the biggest pro tennis raid in history on the simon pures.

Kramer's attorney and Trabert's brother Marc, a Cincinnati lawyer, were going over a few revisions each side asked in the proposed contract. Marc Trabert flew here yesterday.

The promoter declined to give the actual amount offered Trabert but said the amateur king will get more than Australia's Frank Sedgman, did when he turned pro. Sedgman got a \$75,000 guarantee against percentage of the gross that carried him somewhat above that figure.

Kramer said publicity over the Sedgman offer "cost me, as Tony just had to look back at the news stories to see how much Sedgman got. Naturally, he asked for more. And will get it. From now on I'm playing it like they do in baseball. Let there be speculation only."

As for Hoad and Rosewall, Kramer said he has had several telephone calls from Australia "which lead me to believe that the two will sign." Reports are that Hoad and Rosewall have been offered \$50,000 each.

Perez Looks For Title Contenders After Boxing Win

NEW YORK (UP)—Former featherweight contender Lulu Perez, whose new strength and punch as a lightweight gave him a thrilling TV victory over gallant Bobby Courchesne Monday night, said today, "Now bring on any of the lightweight contenders."

It was sick and stamina in his debut as a lightweight, rather than his unusual speed and skill, that earned Brooklyn Lulu the unanimous 10-round decision over aggressive and superbly game Courchesne of Holyoke, Mass., at St. Nicholas Arena.

Today 23-year-old Lulu was invited back to St. Nicholas for another TV fight sometime in November and he was being considered for a bout at Madison Square Garden because he had wrapped up Monday night's decision by staggering Courchesne in the 10th round.

Perez weighed 135 pounds, the heaviest of his career, for his comeback victory. Courchesne scaled 131½, but said he could fight best at about 129.

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Campanella, Kaline Mentioned For Honor

NEW YORK (UP)—Brooklyn's Roy Campanella and Detroit's Al Kaline look like good bets today to win baseball's most valuable player awards, but in this corner the nod would go to the Phillies' Robin Roberts and Cleveland's Al Smith.

Don't be surprised that one of the American League champion New York Yankees may not take the trophy in their circuit. They simply didn't have a solid streakout and their votes figure to be split among as many as six performers.

Campanella, on a bounce-back season in which he led the Brooks to their first world championship, probably gets the winning total in the National League.

It's part of Roberts' hard luck, although you also can make a case for such as Duke Snider and 20-game winner Don Newcombe of the Dodgers, National League batting champion Richie Ashburn of the Phillies and Willie Mays of the Giants with his 51 home runs.

But you'll have to look long and hard to find a player with more right to the most valuable award than Roberts. He has been absolutely amazing with what, through most of the last six years, has been a mediocre ball club.

WINNER
Last season was Roberts' sixth straight as a 20-game winner and his third straight as a winner of 23 games. Before that he won 28 and in the two years before that captured 21 and 20.

The most valuable player award is voted in each league by 24 writers, three from each major league city. This voting is supposed to be completed before the World Series, but usually isn't. Thus Newcombe, off his disappointing series work, probably will get a very small vote. Snider tallied off at the end of the season and was out-hit by the workhorse Campanella. There also is a general feeling that as Campy goes, so go the Dodgers.

Talks makes him the big choice. In the last three years the American League most valuable player has not been from the circuit's pennant winner. The reason is a general feeling that as winners have been split too much, winners have been split too much.

Yogi Berra won it last season when the Cleveland vote was scattered. Al Rosen of the Indians copied it in 1953 when the vote for the winning Yankees was well distributed and Bobby Shantz of the A's took the honors in 1952 when the same thing happened.

THAT WAY
It could work that way again, with arguments as to whether Berra, Hank Bauer, Whitey Ford, Mickey Mantle, Tommy Byrne or even Gil McDougald was the team's most valuable player.

Kalime thus well could win the coveted award and it wouldn't exactly be a case of sneaking in because the Detroit outfielder did lead the American League in hitting with a .340 batting average. He was a fine performance but Smith's looks even better here.

The Cleveland utility man was a one-man bench — although he never had time to sit on the bench. He was the only Indian to play in all 154 games, playing third base as well as all outfield positions, and rated high in every department. He did much to keep them up there as long as they were.

But if my guys, Smith and Roberts, don't win it, they'll have a lot of high class company. As example, Babe Ruth didn't get it the year he hit his record 60 home runs. Which makes you wonder how wrong the voters can get.

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Stanford Capable Of Pushing 'LA — Taylor

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—According to the "formless" charris, Stanford's erratic Indians are due to knock off mighty UCLA this week and Coach Chuck Taylor warned today that they can give the Bruins a rough time "if we play up to our capabilities."

Stanford opened the season by facing College of the Pacific 33-14, dropped a shocker to lightly-regarded Oregon State 19-0, bounced back to stun Ohio State 6-0 then folded before Michigan State 35-14.

This off-and-on performance was a key topic at yesterday's meeting of the Northern California Football Writers' Association where a little needling also was tossed into the program.

"Chuck, we should have scheduled you for the second, fourth or sixth games instead of your opener," Coach Jack (Moonie) Myers of COP told the flustering Taylor via an amplified long-distance call.

TAYLOR CONFIDENT
After similar repartee, Taylor indicated that there was no chance of his men choking up even if they are facing an outfit that belted them 73-0 last year and has been rated better this season in some quarters.

"I couldn't tell much about the kids' thoughts while we were flying home from East Lansing," Taylor grinned. "They were all too busy studying. But they can give anybody a battle. And this might be a good game since it is our cue to win again."

Coach Lynn Waldorf of California declared that the 29 penalties called during Saturday's 20-20 tie with Washington State were "too many," but pointed out he was not criticizing the game officials.

Waldorf characterized next Saturday night's game in Portland

against Oregon as "an interesting contest between young teams." He said this was the first game in history that Cal has played at night but there would be no work-outs under the arcs.

"Most of my boys played high school ball at night and I don't want to break up the present routine," the big man explained.

Coach Bob Bronzan of San Jose State said the fact that he was giving his club a couple of days off didn't mean he was taking New Mexico "lightly."

PREPARATION
"The men worked hard for Arizona (Tempe) State even when they had a bye and have earned a little blow," Bronzan said.

He said that Saturday's 27-20 victory over the Sunbeams was due to the intense preparation that went on and "one of the rare times that a formula actually worked out as planned."

He rated Joe Ulin as possibly the best 200 pound fullback in the country and sang the praises of quarterback Tony Teresa and end Clarence Westman.

"Westman will be among the top 15 in the National Football League draft if he keeps on as he did against Arizona State," Bronzan said.

Off the cloth—Jack (Moonie) Myers, COP—Oregon State "will be the first single wing team we ever have faced and we expect a lot of difficulty." Vic Kelley, UCLA publicity — UCLA has come along better than Coach Red Sanders expected. . . . Joe Verdell, San Francisco State—"The Fat Western Conference is tougher than last year and we're better even if the Cal Aggies did beat us 27-7."

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53-54 Migratory Stamp Sale Down

WASHINGTON (UP)—Federal duck stamp sales totaled 2,181,566 during the year ended June 30, continuing a downward trend first noted during the preceding 12 months.

Director John L. Farley of the Fish and Wildlife Service said sales fell 89,864 below the 2,271,430 reported by the Post Office Department for 1953-54. They compared with a record 2,296,628 stamps sold during 1952-53.

California reported the largest sale last year, at 176,881 stamps. Then in order came: Texas 151,851; Minnesota 143,886; Michigan 129,937; Wisconsin 127,358; and Illinois 110,367. Sales in other states were under the 100,000 mark.

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
