Legionnaires Begin Frolic Today In Miami Convention

MIAMI, Fla. — American Legionnaires put aside the serious business of their national convention today to step out on parade.

If there was a sour note in the five-hour line of march, it came from the 40 and 8, the honor and fun-making organization.

The 40 and 8 nearly came to a parting of the ways with the Legion. One of its strongest complaints is that it wasn't allowed to parade as a unit. The parent organization insisted that 40 and 8 members split up and parade individually with their delegations. There was reluctant compliance.

Parade day came after a busy national convention opening at which Secretary of State Dulles promised that the United States would not disarm "unless we can be sure that others are doing the same."

Dulles, who flew direct to Denver from Miami for a meeting with President Eisenhower in his hospital room, actually said little that was new. He re-emphasized U. S. policy developed before the President suffered his heart attack.

He said the summit conference at Geneva gave President Eisenhower an opportunity to demonstrate, so that no one could doubt, this nation's dedication to peace.

"I refer particularly to his spontaneous offer to exchange military blueprints with the Soviet Union and allow them to verify the United States on a basis of reciprocity," Dulles told 6,000 delegates.

"We hope that the Soviet rulers will accept it. If they do accept it, in good spirit, then we can confidently move on to international measures to reduce and control the instruments of death."

Another major speech was delivered by George Meany, president of the American Federation of Labor. Meany said there was an "undemocratic trend" in the South.

He referred to the presently suspended Miami area hotel strike in which court injunctions halted picketing at 21 hotels, and declared the workers are being "denied by law and economic power the fundamental rights" to which they are entitled.

Meany devoted most of his speech to Russian relations. He said the Soviet rulers "are just as much on the offensive as ever before," and added:

"Looking realistically at Moscow's stirring of human rights at home and chain of conquests abroad, we of the American Federation of Labor have flatly turned down all propositions of exchanging delegations with the Communist countries."

AEC Schedules Nevada Tests

WASHINGTON (UP)—A new series of Atomic Energy Commission tests has been scheduled on the Nevada desert about Nov. 1—but this time there may be no atomic explosions. An AEC announcement indicated the tests will aim at learning whether atomic weapons can be accidentally detonated by fire or by heavy explosions of bombs or artillery shells.

If nuclear weapons prove safe under such circumstances, as believed, the only explosions presumably will come from more conventional devices.
