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Friend, Pierce Lead ERAs

NEW YORK (AP)—The 1955 baseball season was not a complete bust for the Pittsburgh Pirates after all. They had the National League's earned run leader in Bob Friend, their 24-year-old right-hander.

And that's not all. Friend becomes the first major league pitcher in history (earned runs were first tabulated in 1912) to finish on top in ERA while performing for a last-place club.

Figures compiled by the Associated Press revealed today that Friend gave up 43 earned runs in 300 innings for an earned run mark of 2.84. He had a 14-9 won-lost record.

Lefty Billy Pierce of the Chicago White Sox paced the American League with a 1.97 earned run average. He yielded 45 earned runs in 266 frames while winning 15 games and losing 10.

Friend, who produced 2 shutouts and had 9 complete games, is the first Pirate hurler to lead in earned run averages since Cy Blanton topped the National League with 2.59 in 1935.

Bob Buhl of the Milwaukee Braves finished second to Friend in the National. He permitted 73 earned runs in 302 innings for a 3.21 ERA. Buhl won 13 games and dropped 11.

Don Newcombe of the world champion Brooklyn Dodgers was third with 3.23. Warren Spahn, the Braves' veteran southpaw, was fourth with 3.26. He was followed by Robin Roberts, Philadelphia Phillies, 3.30; Johnny Antonelli, New York Giants, 3.33; and Joe Nuxhall, Cincinnati, 3.47.

Whitely Ford of the New York Yankees was runner-up to Pierce in the American. He permitted 74 earned runs in 254 frames for a 2.62 ERA. He had 18 victories against 7 setbacks.

Early Wynn of Cleveland was third with 3.22. Then came Frank Sullivan, Boston Red Sox, 2.91; Herb Score, Cleveland, 2.95; and Billy Hoelt, Detroit, with 2.99.

Pierce, 28, produced 6 shutouts and 10 complete games. His earned run mark is the lowest in the majors since Hal Newhouse of Detroit finished with 1.94 in 1946.

Tom Gola Out With Fracture

HOULTON, Me. (UP)—Philadelphia Warriors' promising rookie Tom Gola said today a broken bone in his right hand "won't keep me out of basketball very long."

"I'll be ready to play again in a month, even if the doctors said it might take six weeks for the break to heal," the collegiate "player of the year" last season said.

Gola broke a bone in his right hand Tuesday night in an exhibition game with the Boston Celtics.

"It's a bone between the knuckle of my middle finger and the wrist of my right hand. It won't bother my shooting once I get the cast off," he said.

Gola, who starred four varsity seasons at LaSalle and was a three-time All-American, said he injured the hand as Boston center Easy Ed Macauley pivoted for a shot.

"My right hand hit the ball and I heard something snap," he said. "I didn't think much about it at the time, but my hand began to swell and I had to leave the game."

55 Waterfowl Outlook Good

PORTLAND (AP)—Good luck is in prospect for waterfowl hunters if the build-up of ducks and geese in Oregon continues until the Oct. 22 season opening.

The State Game Commission reported Tuesday that the northern flights are beginning to wheel in at the marshlands of Klamath, Lake and Harney counties.

Some smaller build-up of waterfowl population has also been noted in the Willamette Valley and on the coastal plains.

The latest flyway count shows 32,000 birds at Summer Lake, with snow geese, white-fronted geese, baldpate, and green wing teal predominating. The early flights are arriving at Klamath, Willamette and coastal points have been mostly of pintails, baldpate, shoveler and mallards.

The commission asked hunters to be on the lookout for banded birds and to return the information to proper authorities. About 3,000 birds have been banded in the past month.

Wins Seen For Nation's Big Three

The nation's "Big Three" of college football—Michigan, Maryland, and Oklahoma—will register easy victories this weekend.

That's the prediction made today by the wizards of odds, in their hard-eyed survey of big gridiron games coming up this Friday and Saturday. In fact, they make every member of the top 10 teams in the country a favorite—except Duke, the No. 10 team, which is a one-point underdog to Ohio State.

Michigan, which seized the No. 1 spot in the national ranking by drubbing Army, 26-2, last Saturday, opens its quest for the Big Ten championship this week against three-time loser Northwestern. Despite some doubt that injured star end Ron Kramer will play, Michigan is a whopping 21-point favorite.

Here's how the odds-men regard the other favored teams in the top 10: Georgia Tech (No. 5) seven over Auburn (No. 17); Texas Christian (No. 6) 10 over Texas A&M; UCLA (No. 7) 19 over Stanford; Wisconsin (No. 8) six over Southern California on Friday night; and unscored-on Navy (No. 9) 13 over Penn State.

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South: Alabama three over Tennessee; Wake Forest seven over North Carolina State; Kentucky seven over Mississippi State; Florida seven over Louisiana State; Mississippi 13 over Tulane; West Virginia 21 over William & Mary.

Midwest: Marquette one over Cincinnati; Iowa seven over Purdue; Illinois seven over Minnesota; Colorado seven over Kansas State; Missouri seven over Iowa State.

Southwest: Texas three over Arkansas; Rice six over SMU; Houston 13 over Oklahoma A&M.

West: Denver two over Utah; Washington State seven over Idaho; Oregon three over California; College of Pacific six over Oregon State.

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
