Basin League Hears Report

Representatives from 31 city and county organizations met recently at the Community Lounge for the annual meeting of the Klamath Basin Civic Service League, Inc., which has for its project the Community Lounge.

Organizations contributing to the lounge are each entitled to two voting delegates at the annual meeting when directors are elected and reports made on the work. Mrs. Lee Holliday of Fairhaven, Mrs. Lawrence Birk of Klamath Falls and Mrs. George Williams of Merrill were re-elected for three years term.

The annual report on attendance at the Community Lounge, read at the meeting, showed that during the last year 12,810 persons from Klamath Falls used the lounge and 12,611 from the rural areas made use of its facilities.

Oregon people outside Klamath County coming to the lounge numbered 813. There were 2,128 from outside the state of Oregon who came as tourists or as shoppers from Northern California towns.

Seven guests from Canada and foreign countries gave the record a cosmopolitan touch. Many babies and small children were brought to the lounge to be cared for — clothes changed, fed, given a nap or a rest between shopping trips.

On one particular day, the matron was kept busy assisting with the warming of milk bottles when 25 babies were brought to the lounge in one five-hour period. A total of 3,553 children were guests of the lounge during the year.

Over all total attendance at the lounge was 23,419, an increase of 5,616 over the previous year. Attendance has more than doubled in the last four years.

Lena Dennis, president of the board of directors, called attention at the meeting to the fact that about 600 married men will be coming to the jet base here and that the league should extend the hospitality of the Klamath Basin to them by informing them of the services offered their families at the lounge.
