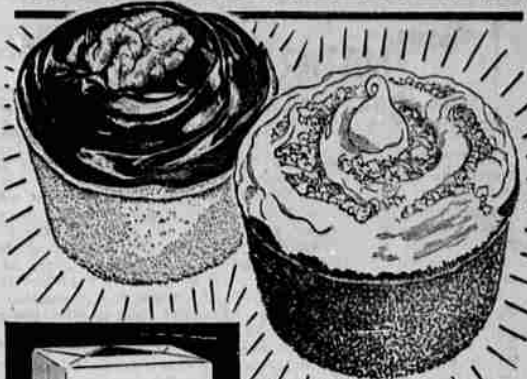
Death Takes John Pearch
