

## Weed Honors Pioneer Trail

**WEED**—A historical plaque and monument was dedicated Sunday morning 12 miles north of Weed. It marks the point where the Military Pass Road from Fort Crooks, near MacArthur, merged with the old Applegate trail out of Oregon. The Applegate trail was originally used by Hudson's Bay trappers and was the first wagon trail into Siskiyou County.

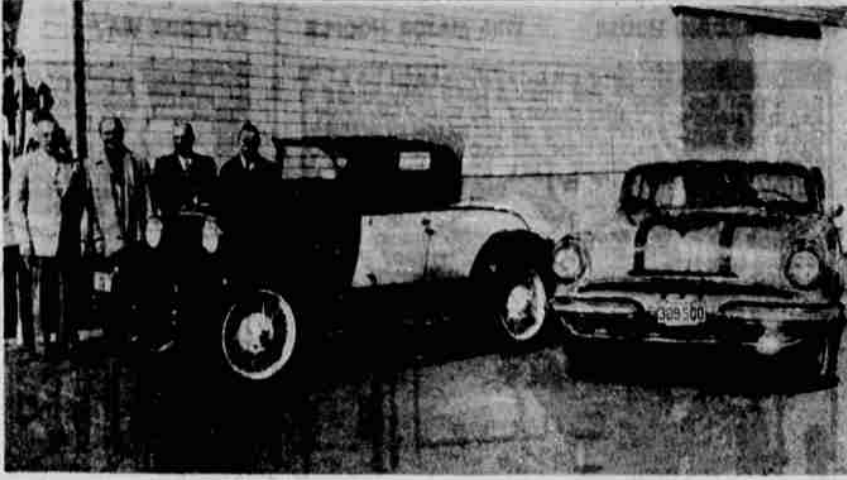
The Military Pass road was so named because soldiers stationed at Fort Crooks assisted pioneers over the trail that opened the wagon route into the Shasta Valley and Yreka area from the south. It was the main trail used before the road over Scott Mountain to Sacramento was completed. It extends around Mount Shasta on the east and south into the McCleod River, Modoc County and Sacramento Valley.

Principal speakers at the 11 a.m. ceremonies were Joe Allen of Dorris, chairman of the Siskiyou County board of supervisors; Dr. Aubrey Neasham, historian for the California Department of Parks and Beaches; Walter Pollock of Yreka, president of the Siskiyou County Historical Society; and George Schrader of Mount Shasta, former president of the historical society.

The plaque was unveiled by Mrs. Anna Dreyer, Little Shasta, and Dr. Neasham. Mrs. Dreyer is the daughter of the late Stephen Soule, who traveled across the plains and entered Siskiyou County via the Military Pass Road in 1861 and settled in the Little Shasta area. Ancestors of Dr. Neasham traveled over the road into the Scott Valley country and were among the early county pioneers. Many pioneers in this section entered the county by the way of the wagon trail.

Boy Scouts of Troop 32 of Yreka, Dugan Barr, Richard Hayes and Gordon Dunham, formed the color guard. Paula Harris of Yreka placed a floral spray at the base of the monument at the close of the ceremonies.

The historical marker was placed by the California State Park Commission, the Siskiyou County Historical Society and the county of Siskiyou.
