

KU Pelicans, Tornadoes In Traditional Battle

Medford 11 Vows End To Modoc Field Jinx

Klamath Union High School's Pelicans, who have won, then lost on alternating weekends so far this year, come face to face with their arch rival the Medford Black Tornado tonight at Modoc Field in the first Southern Oregon Conference action of the season for both teams.

Kickoff time is 8 o'clock. Outside of the fact that it is a "must" for both teams to win, the Tornadoes will be gunning to snap a jinx held by the Whitebirds for the past 10 years. Not since 1945, when Medford won 51-0, have the Pelicans fallen to a Modoc team in a game played on Modoc Field. In 1947 the Medford club came the closest to stopping the Pels in a scoreless deadlock, but never have they topped the Pelicans with a triumph. Reports from the Rogue Valley city indicate their chargers are out for "blood" and have vowed to put a stop to the Modoc Field jinx.

Although Medford has failed to collect a win over a KUHS eleven since 1945 on Modoc Field, and dropped four of their last six meetings with Klamath teams, the Tornado football powers hold a lopsided 20-8-4 record over past Pelican gridiron teams. In the early rivalry between Klamath Falls and Medford, the Tornado grid machine did everything but sweep the fields with Klamath teams in posting such scores as 98-0, 54-0, 34-0 and 13 shutouts in the first 17 games played.

Coach Fred Spiegleberg's red and black chargers from Medford have worked their way to a three win, one loss and one tie record in their five games to date. Wins have been scored over Roseburg, Grater and Cleveland of Portland.

No Worry Seen For SV Games

SAN FRANCISCO (UP) — Two Californians who ought to know said today Avery Brundage needn't worry about Squaw Valley's preparations for the Olympic Winter Games in 1960.

State Sen. Harold T. Johnson of Roseville, who sponsored the initial bill allocating one million dollars to the games, predicted the Legislature would "speedily approve" a second loan if not a third.

"Gov. Goodwin Knight has appointed a very high type of commission, which is now making preliminary surveys of the area's needs for the games," Johnson said. "Until the studies are completed, the exact costs will not be known."

He estimated another \$1,500,000 will be necessary and predicted a bill appropriating this amount would have no trouble in the Legislature.

Johnson's remarks were made at the International Olympic Committee, that there was some concern about the financing and preparation for the games. He estimated the cost of the games at five million dollars.

Alex Cushing, who persuaded the IOC to award the games to Squaw Valley—in which he has an interest—said Brundage's remarks were "unfair."

"He's never come up here to Squaw Valley to look at what we're doing and he's never asked," Cushing said.

Cushing said all facilities for the games will be completed by Dec. 1, 1957.

"We have a French bobbed expert, six architects and 12 engineers up here working their heads off right now. We'll put on as fine a winter games as has ever been staged."

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UP) — More than 1,000 minor league baseball officials are expected here next month for the "most important" convention in the minor's history.

The subjects to be discussed will be quite varied, President George M. Trautman of the minor league organization said Thursday in announcing plans for the annual convention opening Nov. 23.

Trautman said the agenda hasn't been completed. He indicated transfer of minor league clubs and the televising of major league games in areas where there are minor league clubs would occupy much of the convention's attention.

while the loss and tie were handed down by Gresham and Milwaukie, two of the top teams in the state. Klamath on the other hand has dropped three games out of five losing to Boise, Eugene and Redding and winning from La Grande and Grant of Portland.

SOLID NUCLEUS
Eighteen lettermen were on hand to greet Spiegleberg this year to form a solid nucleus from which to build this season, and the addition of junior halfback Gary Riley, a transfer from Baker, made the Tornado picture sparkle just that much more. Riley, who is a stellar track athlete, gives Medford another top flight runner to go with halfback Mike Hawkins and fullback Dave Bosworth. Riley, Hawkins and Bosworth are probably starts for Medford along with quarterback Dick McLaughlin, a leading play caller and passer. Larry Guber is a possible last minute starter for Bosworth at the fullback position and will add 185 pounds to the already hefty Medford backfield, which outweighs Klamath's starting four-some 182 to 155.

In the line for Medford, starting positions at ends are slated to go to Dick Coppel and Jerry Gattin or Mike Stearns. At tackle Spiegleberg will probably open with Neil Plumley and Tom Cox, while Jack Gregory and Monte Holst are the nominees for the two guard spots. At center will be Garry Shaffer. Line standouts for the defending Southern Oregon Conference champions are Holst, Gregory, Coppel and Plumley, all of whom saw plenty of action last season when Klamath fell 13-0.

UP AND DOWN
For the up and down Pelicans, coach John McGinnis is expected to open with nearly the same line-up that has carried the bulk of the load throughout the first five games. In the backfield, Butch Kimpton will open at quarterback tonight with Donn Taucher moving from the signal-calling spot to a halfback position. Running mate of Taucher will be non-letterman Lee McGill, a junior halfback. The fourth starter in the Klamath backfield will be fullback Dave Leeling.

Up front for the Pels, line coach Harry Russell, who just this past week became the father of a bouncing baby son, will probably have Bill Fadorek and Larry Heat-on at ends, Jim McGee and Bob Harshbarger at tackles, Modesto "Mighty Mo" Jimenez and Roy Ropp at guards and Cal Tichenor at center.

In the line Klamath will have a slight four pound advantage over the visitors from Medford.

TRADITIONAL
Both teams seem to be at top shape for the traditional clash except for a few minor aches and pains. Medford's Hawkins is recovering from the flu and an early season ankle injury, but is expected to be ready to romp against Klamath this evening. Another Tornado gripper, Mel Morgan, a top flight defensive tackle, is a question mark for tonight's game as he is taking football easy after suffering a broken hand just before the Milwaukee game two weeks ago. McGinnis said Thursday that minor injuries have been cropping up all week long in practice sessions such as pulled leg muscles and ankle sprains. Jimenez, who has already missed two games this year came up with a touchy leg Wednesday evening, but the Pel mentor said he didn't think it was enough to keep the Pels' captain on the sidelines. Jerry Burke, a number one replacement for the Pels at end and quarterback is recovering from an ankle injury suffered last Friday at Boise when he was caught on the end of a clip thrown by a BHS blocker.

Both the Klamath Falls and the Medford High bands will perform at halftime of tonight's game in a preview of what may be seen at this year's shrine East-West game at San Francisco on New Year's Day. Last year both Southern Oregon high schools were represented at the shrine classic, and left football fans from all parts of the nation talking about the caliber of talent displayed under the colors of KUHS and Medford High School.

Rubarb Pops Between Kellert, Brooklyn Star

A late-sprouting World Series rubarb has popped up between Jackie Robinson and Frank Kellert—who until last Monday were teammates on the world champion Brooklyn Dodgers.

Kellert, dealt to the Chicago Cubs by the Brooks, told Sports Editor John Cronley of the Oklahoma City Daily Oklahoman that Robinson should have been called out when Jackie stole home in the first game of the series.

"I'm not, according to Robinson. 'The decision was right,' said Jackie. 'I was safe and pictures prove it. But it wasn't vital to the game.' The Yanks won it 6-3."

Jack added: "Kellert is entitled to his opinion, but this reshaping of a reflection on Umpire Bill Summers, who umpired a wonderful series."

Kellert, at bat when Robinson made his dash, said he clocked the play by standing in tight at the plate, making New York catcher Yogi Berra reach across the plate to make the tag.

Berra made a big squawk over the call, leading his teammates to observe afterward: "When Yogi grips, Yogi's right."

Eddie Lopat, long the "junk man" who helped the Yankees to pennants and world championships has been given his unconditional release by the Baltimore Orioles.

Lopat was sold to the Orioles by the Yanks for a reported \$10,000 July 30. The 36-year-old left-hander was 14 for the seventh-place Birds. His best year was 1951 when he was 21-9 with the world champion Yankees.

Rumor has it the Dodgers have lunked their plan to play seven games in Jersey City next season. Source of the report is "a high-placed Jersey City official." Reason: It will cost the city too much to refurbish Roosevelt Stadium.

Champaign Uses Quick TD Tactics
CHAMPAIGN, Ill. (AP) — Champaign's high school football team scored five touchdowns in six plays in the third quarter in its game with Danville Thursday night.

The touchdown parade started when halfback Bill Ohls returned Danville's kickoff opening the third quarter 91 yards. Then followed touchdowns on 43 and 46 yard passes, a 50 yard sprint around end and a romp of 32 yards on an off tackle play.

The final score was Champaign 33, Danville 6.

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Lopat, Joost Hit Road

Ed Lopat and Eddie Joost had their press clippings — and that's just about all — left of their big league careers today.

The veteran pitcher and shortstop, both of whom overcame physical shortcomings to become stars, were released Thursday by the Baltimore Orioles and the Boston Red Sox.

The Orioles announced that they were asking waivers on the 37-year old Lopat in order to give him his unconditional release. The Red Sox, meanwhile, announced they had given the 36-year old Joost his outright release. It'll be a surprise if either catches on with another big league club.

Acquired from the Chicago White Sox in 1948 on Joe DiMaggio's recommendation, Lopat appeared in five World Series for the New York Yankees and compiled a classic record of 4-1.

STAR FIELDER
Joost, a star infielder despite the handicap of wearing glasses, was a weak hitter when he broke in with the Cincinnati Redlegs in 1936.

After nine seasons in the National League he dropped back into the minors in 1946 but then returned to the big time with the Philadelphia Athletics.

With a revised stance Joost became a dangerous long-ball hitter in the American League for seven years. He then managed the Athletics before they were transferred to Kansas City.

The Red Sox picked him up as a free agent last spring but he hit only .193 in 56 games for them this year.

The Red Sox also announced the transfer of catcher Guy Morion to Louisville in the American League and the purchase of eight minor leaguers. They were shortstop Don Buddin, pitcher Jerry Casale and outfielders Marty Keough, Bob Jenkins and Gordon Windhorn from Louisville and pitcher Joe Albanese and Roy Timney and catcher Gerald Zimmerman from Greensboro.

ANNOUNCE DEAL
The Cincinnati Redlegs also announced a deal — the purchase of former minor league strikeout marvel Bill Kennedy from Seattle in the Pacific Coast League where he had a 1.91 ERA in 51 games.

Kennedy, now 34, struck out 456 batters in the Coastal Plain League in 1946.

The world champion Brooklyn Dodgers called up seven players from their minor league system and sent catcher Dixie Howell to St. Paul. Called up were first baseman Jim Gentile, pitcher Bill Harris and outfielder Bob Wilson from Montreal; shortstop Jasper Spears and catcher Mike Napoli from St. Paul and outfielder Dick Gray from Fort Worth.

Phillie Ace, Cards Tops In Serving Homer

NEW YORK (AP) — Philadelphia's Robin Roberts and the pitching staffs of the St. Louis Cardinals and the Kansas City A's set gopher ball records in 1955.

Roberts, who worked 308 innings the most in the majors, gave up 41 homers to shatter the previous high of 39. The former standard was set in 1948 by Murry Dickson, then of St. Louis.

Statistics compiled by The Associated Press also disclosed that the Cardinals' pitching staff allowed 185 homers. The previous record of 179 was set by Cincinnati hurlers in 1953. St. Louis pitchers also were the most generous in home run offerings in 1954 with 179.

The Athletics' mound crew allowed American League opposition 174 circuit clouts to erase the record of 154 set by the Detroit Tigers in 1953. A year ago when the club franchise was in Philadelphia, the A's also led in gopher serves with 141.

For the hard-working Roberts, this was the second consecutive season that he permitted the most home runs. In 1954 he was the pace-setter with 35.
